WEEKLY WRAP & RECAP 9/9/13

Out in the global world, it was a week of politics, as we wonder if we're going to be involving ourselves in yet another war in yet another country. It's difficult and complicated, but the bottom line is that I don't see how it can make any possible sense to kill people who are killing people, in order to show them that killing people is wrong! There have been trials in the world criminal court for acts of atrocious violence against humanity, so how about that as an option here? What if there was a world wide outcry that gassing children and their parents is wrong! Duh. It seems most everyone is doing non stop texting these days, so how about a massive, world wide text to these perpetrators of ghastly crimes against innocents, demanding they lay down their weapons, chemical and otherwise. There is no end to using violence against violence. It is long past time to get to the negotiating table. That's what the United Nations is supposed to be for, so let's use it in a real way.

Speaking of Labor, the big upside of the week was our local Labor Day downtown party. The food was yummy, and mostly local, the music was also local and excellent, and the silent auction brought in much needed money for the Bolinas Community Center and allowed our local stuff to keep circulating. All a big win!

There's fabulous local art everywhere in town, so be sure to check it out. Chris Whitefield is exhibiting in the Bolinas Gallery, and there is also a new exhibit at the Murch's local farmstand of work by Vanessa and her brother Vincent Waring.

If we could just keep it local and not have to pay attention to the bigger world, we would be in great shape, but alas, pay attention we must, or find ourselves in even greater peril.

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Birds on California Island Rebound after Rats Eradicated

A decade after tens of thousands of invasive rats were removed from Anacapa Island—an ecologically significant island off the coast of southern California—populations of rare seabirds are rebounding. There has been a four-fold increase in the number of Scripps's Murrelet nests, and two species never before known to nest on the island, the Cassin's Auklet and Ashy Storm-Petrel, are now nesting.

Anacapa is part of Channel Islands National Park, which comprises five of the eight Channel Islands found off the California coast. West Anacapa has long been the home of the world's largest breeding colony of California Brown Pelicans.

The non-native rats that threatened all of these bird species were first reported on Anacapa in the early 1900s. Later research found that the rats were eating 70 percent of the eggs of the once-common Scripps's Murrelet, which is now a threatened species in the state of California. The rats also ate native deer mice, reptiles, insects, intertidal invertebrates, and a wide variety of plants.

To restore balance to the island ecosystem, black rats were removed in 2001 and 2002 using an aerial application of rodenticide bait. Some of the world's leading island experts and scientists from the United States, Canada, and New Zealand assisted project partners from Channel Islands National Park, Island Conservation, and the American Trader Trustee Council (composed of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) in the project's rigorous planning process.

Rats have ravaged island ecosystems all over the world and are the single-largest cause of bird extinctions on islands. Researchers have found that they are also responsible for half of the world's reptile extinctions.

Go to Health: Changing the Rules

Changing the Rules is the title of my forthcoming novel, which I am self-publishing through Amazon. I am hoping that it will also be available through the local bookstores

The novel is set in the early 1950's, when women who had been employed during World War II, (Rosie the riveter), returned home to resume more traditional female roles. College girls debated whether to be someone themselves, or live through a man. Fear of communist infiltration in the United States was rampant, led by Senator Joseph McCarthy. Men were drafted to fight the Korean War. Racism and anti-Semitism were an accepted part of the dominant culture. My novel concerns a young woman who graduates from college, and falls in love with a brilliant but domineering man. They are part of the 'bohemian' subculture of their day. Her struggles to define herself, go to medical school, understand the dangerous world of illegal abortion, find sexual fulfillment, and find her calling are the subject of the novel. Although I drew from my personal experience in writing this book, it is not a memoir but a fictional recreation of the times. In light of the restrictions on contraception and abortion in many states today, it is a cautionary tale.
