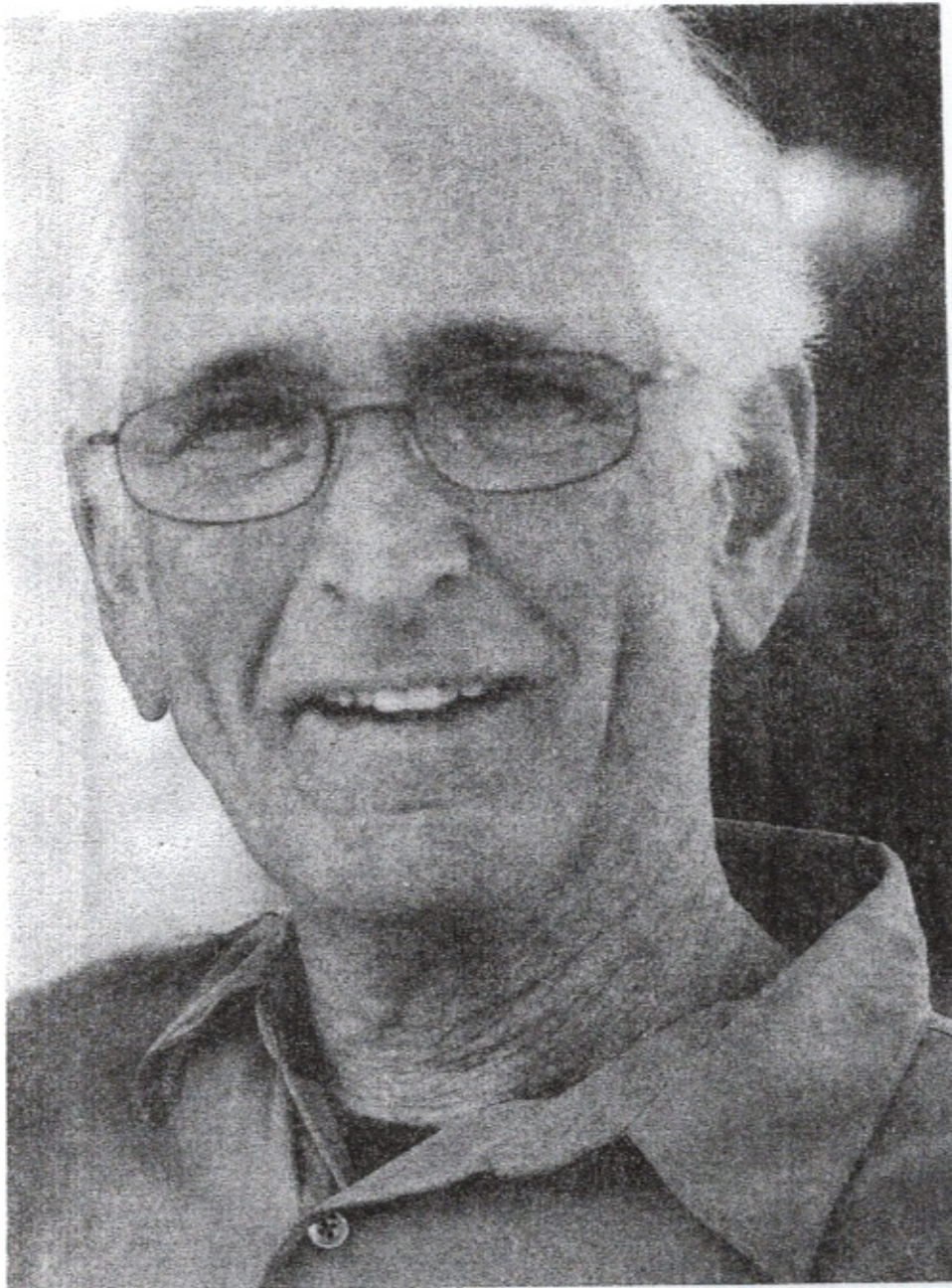

Nature Notebook By Loretta Farley

The autumnal equinox, the first calendar day of fall, approaches on Saturday, Sept. 22 with equal hours of daylight and darkness. It is closely followed by the full moon on Sept. 24, this year's harvest moon, traditionally providing extra light for the fall harvest in many communities. The Cree people of Ontario call it the rutting moon, for the many species of deer—like our tule elk—that breed this season.

Winter brings the annual gray whale migration along the coast, but fall brings humpbacks. Reports of humpbacks from Bolinas and the lighthouse, as well as the Monterey Bay, have added extra excitement this year. They may cooperatively forage for krill, herring and other schooling species in small groups of two to three and then move on to other groups. The seafood diet builds up fat reserves that they live off of during the winter. Humpbacks are distinguished from other whales by the light-colored patterns on their flukes, their long flippers and the lumps, or tubercles, on their head and jaw.

A shiver of sharks—leopard sharks, that is—is sometimes visible behind the Inverness Store and along the west side of Tomales Bay. The sharks travel on the high tide into the shallow mudflats along the coast to eat worms and clams, digging in the mud for innkeeper worms and grabbing clams by their siphons (or necks) and yanking them out of their shells. Leopard sharks, common in the bay and the Pacific Coast, are so named because of their mottled skin.

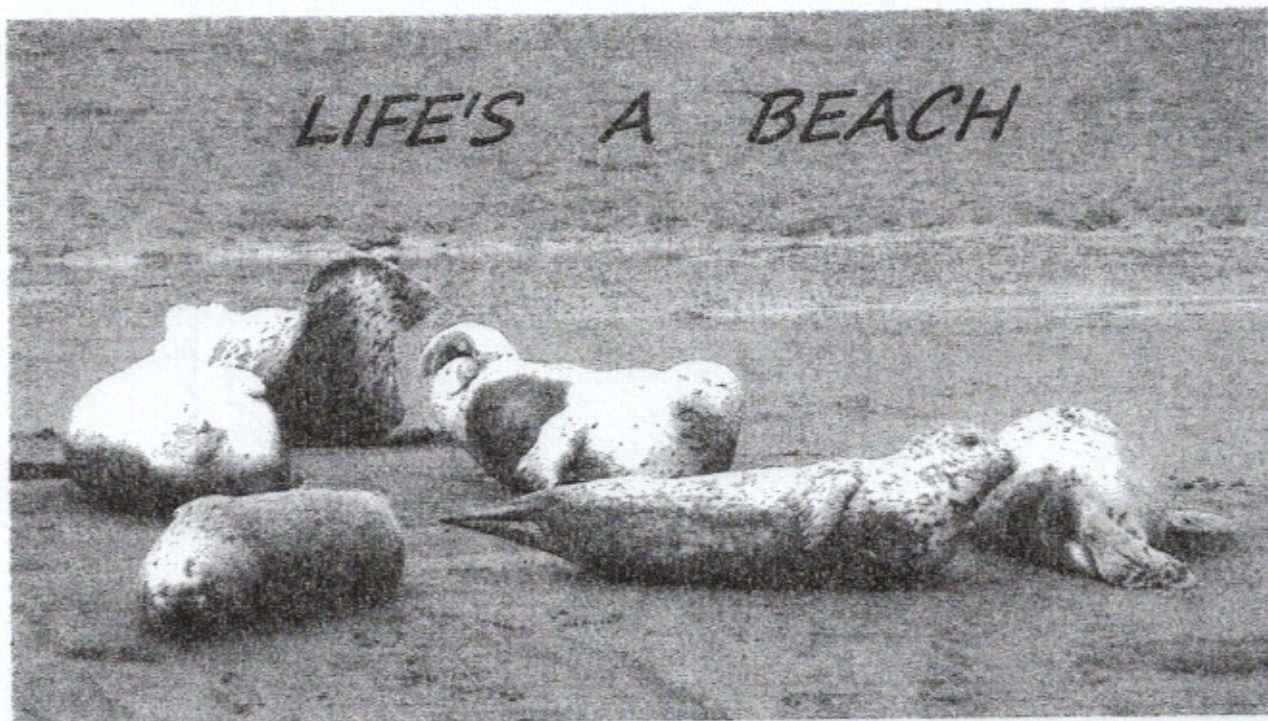

Plastic Pollution – What Can You Do?

First comes knowledge. When I read Jennie's column last week about Ned's sister Laurie Riley not buying plastic, I was galvanized. People are changing from despair into action! Several long conversations with Laurie have taught me what an individual, and better yet, a group, can do. Here goes, with many thanks to Laurie.

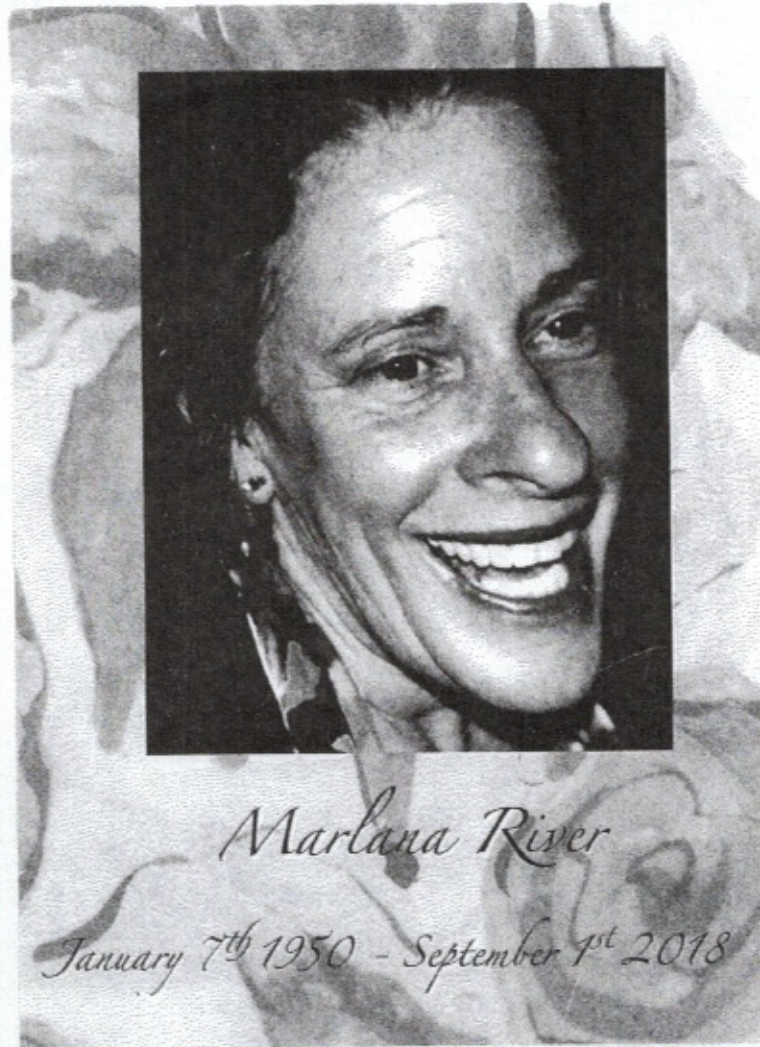
China is no longer accepting our plastic waste for recycling. Huge amounts are piling up at recycling centers, and much of it is going into landfills or just sitting with no place to go. These centers will not be able to accept the mounds we are creating, and side effects will be toxic to the environment. Remember the saying – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle? We must Reduce and Reuse starting now. Recycling has become a very difficult predicament.

Pollution of the oceans is an enormous problem. Over 5 trillion pieces of plastic currently litter the ocean,, accumulating in in 5 huge 'gyres' throughout every ocean. The biggest one is between Hawaii and California; the large and tiny pieces of plastic therein are killing fish, ocean mammals, birds and even plankton.

Enter Boyon Slat, a young Dutch inventor, entrepreneur and Aerospace Engineering student dropout who founded the company - The Ocean Cleanup. He is 24. He has developed and built a floating device that has sailed through the Golden Gate heading for the gyre. Slat estimates that they will deploy 60 of these free-floating barriers in the ocean by 2020. They hope to remove 50% of the Great Pacific Garbage Patch in 5 years. The free-floating barriers are made to withstand harsh weather conditions and constant wear and tear. After two decades they hope to have collected 90% of the trash in the patch. The Ocean Cleanup has raised \$35 million so far in crowd funding, with generous donations from Marc Benioff of Salesforce and Peter Thiel of Paypal.

Obviously it is important that we humans throughout the world reduce the millions of tons of plastic that we discard yearly. Scouring the beaches for waste is a good approach. Changing our buying habits is also necessary. Take note of the plastic bags you now have, and reuse them over and over. Don't take new ones; use your own cloth bag to go shopping. Try to avoid packaged foods, which almost always come in plastic. Make cloth baggies to use when you buy in bulk. Never accept a plastic straw for your drinks; you can find reusable ones in many places, including at the store cited below. Compost your food waste – it's easy to do and you will be rewarded with great soil for your garden. Jennie Pfeiffer is a 'master composter' so you can give her a call for suggestions. For a store that has a great many products made without plastics, including tooth brushes, straws, deodorants, cosmetics and lots of kitchen ware, visit packagefreeshop.com. They are based in New York, but have plastic-free shipping. Shipping is free for orders over \$50. Look over their selections – it may work for you. The founder of this store is Lauren Singer, who has a blog called Trash is for Tossers, and has put all the trash she has produced in the past five years into a 16oz mason jar!

Intentions are not enough

Your Aug. 8 article on the Marin County Sheriff's Office's drone program lists many good reasons for the acquisition of drones and many good words from the Sheriff's Office, but these are not the same as good policy. Despite many assurances about intentions to protect privacy, the drone policy does not do so.

Marin is not the first county in California to use drones and the policies of other counties often include specific prohibited uses. Marin's policy has no prohibited uses. The list of approved uses includes broad categories such as "public safety," which could include legally protected gatherings such as protests and rallies.

Some counties prevent the use of video taken for an approved mission from being used later for other purposes by requiring that any part of a video that does not contain criminal evidence for the approved mission be deleted. The Marin policy allows video to be kept indefinitely and has no restrictions on the sharing of video with other local, state or federal agencies. There is no prohibition against using night vision or facial recognition technology and no requirement for public reporting on drone missions.

Good intentions are always appreciated but guarantee nothing. Good policy approved by our Board of Supervisors is the only way to know that our privacy is protected. The current policy can be seen at MarinSheriff.org under "Publications." Click on "Policies and Procedures" and find "General Order GO-05-32, Small Unmanned Aerial Systems" under the General Orders category.

I just returned from an exciting BETO BARBEQUE at the Matson's homestead and I want to send thanks their way. It was an amazing fund-raising event to help Beto O'Rourke replace Ted Cruz as a Texas Senator this November. Megan Matson has been working full time on this campaign and the enthusiasm was high at this well-attended gathering of "resisters". The food was outrageous: great barbeque and a bodacious groaning board of varied veggies, artfully transformed into super salads constructed from healthy home harvests.
