

Go to Health: Beyond Seven Billion

Nearly 80 million people are added to the earth's population each year. Relentless population growth affects many of our current problems, from food scarcity in poor countries, water shortages, pollution, habitat loss and species extinction, climate change, degradation of the oceans and lakes, and human & animal suffering. The welfare of humans is deeply linked to nature, and our propensity to ignore this has been disturbing.

Population Connection (formerly known as ZPG - for Zero Population Growth) is an organization working to understand the reasons for population growth. Its goal is to educate the public - including policy makers - on solutions to the problem, including access to voluntary family planning, education for girls as well as boys worldwide, and ensuring social justice for women and the poor.

In the February issue of The Reporter (the magazine of Population Connection) the theme is child marriage. There are 10 million child brides every year, having children while children. Child marriage is defined as the marriage of a person before the age of 18. The practice is most common in sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia. In Mali, 71% of girls are married before they turn 18. In Bangladesh, the median age of marriage for girls is 15, and 4 out of five girls first meet their husbands at their weddings, according to The Reporter. Child marriage can have serious health implications - in Africa, pregnancy related deaths are the leading cause of mortality for 15-19 year old girls. Many girls have sex before their first period. An estimated 100,000 girls each year develop a fistula, or opening, between the bladder and vagina because of obstructed labor. As a result, they leak urine constantly and can become social outcasts. There are heroic doctors and nurses who spend their lives on surgical repair of this problem, but the hospitals and know-how for fistula repair are

Archbishop Desmond Tutu is hopeful that the practice of child marriage can end in a generation. He has said "I am confident that change can happen very quickly. No woman who has had the

benefit of staying at school and marrying later in life can inflict child marriage on her daughters."

National Geographic published an article on child marriage in the June 2011 issue, with arresting photographs.

John Bongaarts, a demographer at the Population Council and the National Academy of Sciences, calculates that if the average age of childbearing increased by 5 years, future population size could be reduced by 15-20 percent. This is a striking finding. If readers want to help with this issue, they can visit Population Connection on line, or call them at 800-767-1956. Population Connection has classroom curricula for teachers of social studies and environmental studies that are used in the US and all over the world.

The issue of access to voluntary family planning has been at the top of the news recently here at home, with Obama's push to give women free access to birth control through their insurance policies. Nicolas Kristof, writing in the New York Times on Sunday, Feb. 12th, aptly calls it 'pelvic politics'. I see it as a woman's issue, a man's issue, and a big environmental issue as well. The Sierra Club has declined to take on US population growth directly and forcefully, fearing being criticized as racist. I prefer the stand of the Center for Biological Diversity, which is working to save a vast diversity of wild animals and plants, to secure a future for all species hovering on the brink of extinction. Toward this end, among other educational programs, they hand out endangered species condoms, and have a 'hump smarter hotline' (800-628-2399) to 'make sure that this one roll in ** the sheets doesn't push some poor creature into extinction'. They point out that 50% of pregnancies in the US are unplanned, and more people conceive a child on New Year's eve than any other time in the year. Obviously, there are ways to talk about population and the environment without being racist. Wake up, Sierra Club! We could all use some new thinking on these issues. Despite our smaller families, our lifestyles make us part of the problem. Sadja Greenwood, MD back issues at



This installation, framed in copper, is a story in images and words about a journey of healing after a severe heart attack. The story begins with Chiron, the mythical centaur who had a permanent wound in his knee; chronic illness can feel like a similar, neverending wound. The forty images and narrative convey a surprising story of alchemical transformation. Dreams, stones, pelicans, and eggs were all participants in this journey. In this long process of dealing with mortality, Steve has constructed an underground stone cave, a labyrinth, and a stone retreat space in the birch forest where he lives. A book on his experience, Heart Attack and Soul in the Labyrinth of Healing, was published in January 2011. Robert Bosnak, author of Tracks in the Wilderness of Dreams, writes about this book

When the heart stops a world comes to an end. The work of Steve Parker shows us that there is life after the end, after the heart has been attacked by death, and survived. In his remarkable reports and stunning paintings, we are moved to witness the transition from his life before to his life after as it forges its way to renewal.

A reception for the artist will be held in the gallery immediately following the New School event with Stephen Parker and Michael Lerner -Jung, Art and Healing.



MONDAY MEETING REPORT 2/13/12

From Jenniepfeiffer@earthlink.net IT WAS A BUSY WEEK OF MEETINGS & GREETINGS. Monday afternoon there was a West Marin Transportation Action Group (TAG) meeting in Point Reyes at the Dance Palace. It is the beginnings of a coalition of groups from the areas of West Marin not being adequately served by Marin Transit, particularly The West Marin Stage. The cancellation of Stage service between Bolinas and Point Reyes, has brought together an independent coalition of activists, working together to put in place a transit system that can work for those communities not now being served. There has been a large van purchased by West Marin Commons through the efforts of Jack Kramer and the people working with the Pt. Reyes Station West Marin Commons. This is a start, but the van needs seats put in and once the seats are installed, will need a class "C" licensed driver, plus development of a scheduling plan. There is much organizational work to be done, but it is a start. Lauri Puchall and I were there representing Bolinas - Anny Owen, who has been the Green Team point person in town and has been a County liaison, was unfortunately not able to attend this meeting. The other groups represented included: Doris Pareas, Luana Pinasco, along with Bob and Melinda Bell, of Dillon Beach, working for a long time on the Tomales area Transit needs, trying to overcome a catch 22 which is the fact that the closest town folks need to reach from that end of Marin is in Sonoma County (Petaluma) and there has been repeated response from various agencies that anything leaving Marin entering Sonoma is a Sonoma issue, and vice versa; Chloe Cook with Marin Social Services mentioned that the county repeatedly points to Trip Tick as the solution to transportation needs in West Marin, yet, this is not a county program and it is limited to seniors and those with long-term disability or illness; Over-the-Hill-Gang and other West Marin Commons online groups encoungall to join in order to demonstrate the need (numbers of people) and the initiative being shown to solve transportation needs. For a description and to join any of these groups go to http://www.westmarincommons.org/site/?page_id=52 or Google West Marin Commons. I will try to post the

next meeting time and place in the Hearsay calendar. Tuesday night was a marathon Bolinas-Stinson Union School Board of Trustees meeting, starting at 6:30 and going to 11:00pm. The evening started with a lovely tribute to retired long time school special education teacher, Linda O'Neil who unfortunately passed away this past year. The school Bell Tower was dedicated to her in memory of her many years of service to the district. There were comments from distinguished guests and former students and employees of the district including Sarah Pusty, Erica Rettle, Steve Aikenhead, Matt Lewis, and family and close friends of Linda's. The bell was rung in her honor and we moved on to a long and in depth conversation regarding the question of whether or not, in light of the increase in size of the 1/2 class, to renew the lease of the Stinsons Beach Preschool that presently rents a classroom. There were over 50 pieces of correspondence to the Board on this matter, the most I have ever received during my time on the Board. The outcome was a 4-1 vote to extent the lease for one year while all proposals put forward are given full consideration, including a massive project plan from principal Leo Kostelnik to build a gym, science lab, performance stage, expanded art shops and two new classrooms on the Bolinas Campus, turning the Stinson campus into an Early Childhood Education Center, serving a District pre-K, and Kindergarten program. Something this major will require in depth study, and there will need to be a short term plan put in place while this conversation happens. Yurt anyone?
