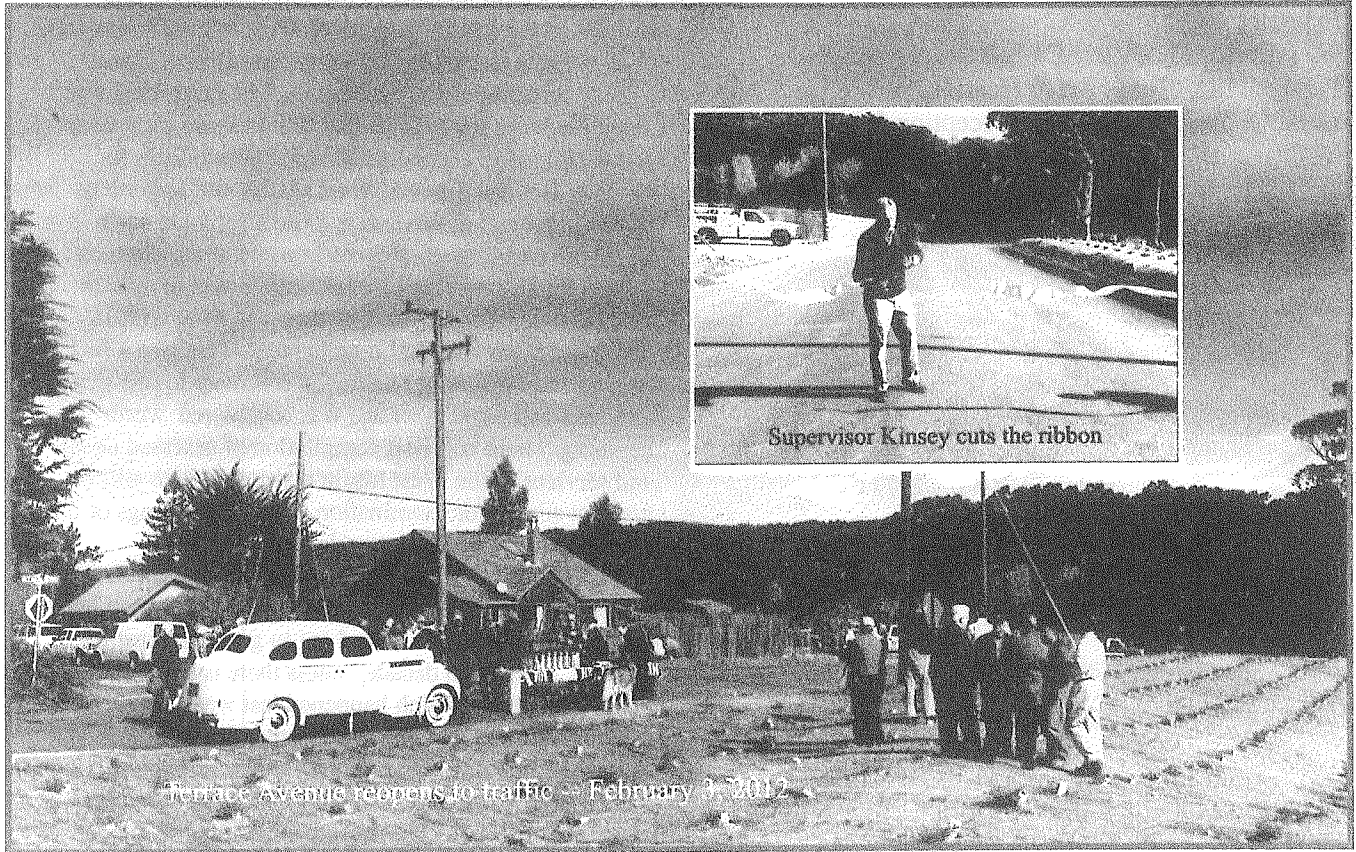

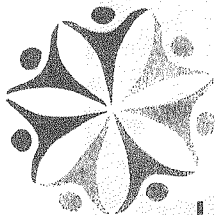

MEETINGS, MEETINGS, MEETINGS. On Tuesday there was a joint meeting of the superintendents and trustees of the school districts of West Marin. It was an open meeting, facilitated by Mary Jane Burke, Marin County Superintendent of Schools. The discussion was about the ways it might be possible to share programs and personnel to expand educational possibilities for Nicasio, Bolinas-Stinson, West Marin, and Lagunitas students, providing services at more affordable costs. There are part time employees in some of the districts that might be available to work some hours in needed areas in other schools, sharing their expertise and providing them with full employment. This was a fact finding/brainstorming meeting, a followup to one that was held last September and was considered worth pursuing. There will be a compilation of assessed needs and services in the West Marin districts, which will be made available for examination at future meetings of the west Marin trustees and superintendents.

Friday was the December meeting of the Bolinas Lagoon Technical Advisory Committee, which had been postponed until this month. I try to get to at least two BLTAC meetings a decade, unless there is a red flag about something, which happened last week. when I saw an article from Cella O'Connor in the Hearsay. It seems there is an effort being made by County agencies to bifurcate BLTAC into two groups, which might take oversight of Bolinas Lagoon projects from the greater BLTAC purview, (more local) into greater governance by governmental agencies. At least that is my understanding, which is shaky at this time, and will require more attention on my part to allow me to grasp the politics of what is being proposed. Right now, I am paying attention to our local watchdogs, Cella O'Connor, Ralph Camiccia, Rudi Ferris, Gary Page, Scott Tye, and Joe Mueller. They were not enthused with this new proposal, and more conversation is necessary. There is another scheduled meeting coming up in March, at which time corrections will be made on the proposal, and a new schedule for the year's meetings will be made. 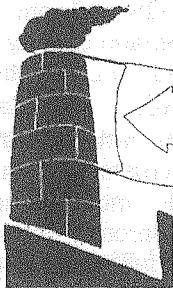

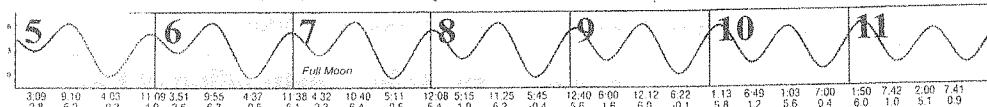

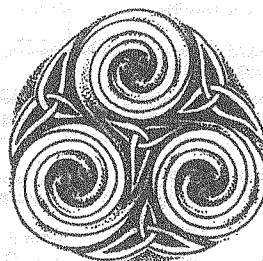
THREE MORE GREAT THINGS ABOUT THIS PLACE...

Already looks like bad year for ticks

Ticks are taking over the coastal foothills right now. Some days are like a horror film, with Dracula bugs everywhere — in the high grass, on the low-lying limbs of chaparral — waiting for a victim to brush by so they can jump on for the ride.

It's the worst season I've seen for ticks in 10 years and among the worst in 30 years.

It isn't localized. The Ventana Wilderness near Big Sur on the Monterey coast has so many ticks this winter that it's like an invasion force has commandeered the countryside.

At Half Moon Bay, Montara and in Marin, it's much the same. On the Point Reyes National Seashore, especially the Coastal Trail out of Palomar near Bolinas, some days are like an epidemic. Yet the worst area could be the coastal hills near Pescadero.

The Sierra foothills are also loaded with ticks right now, most at elevations from 800 to 2,000 feet in landscapes with high grass near creeks.

Maybe it's the weather: just enough rain to get things going, warm most afternoons, great conditions not only for ticks, but for hiking, biking and dog walks. The twain thus meet.

Ticks usually hang in grass and brush from ground level up about 18 inches, so if you stay on the trail or ranch-style roads and keep your dog

close, you can avoid them. If you stray through grass and brush, they'll come aboard. A tick's favorite trick is to work its way up and nail you, often at the hairline at the back of the neck.

I've brushed off dozens of ticks and pulled off many on my hikes, and all told over the years, hundreds from my dogs. They don't bother me much.

But ticks make many people feel creepy. The best trick I know is to wear synthetic hiking pants, tuck them into your socks and spray Permethrin-based repellent on your lower pants, and DEET on your socks and exposed skin. When you get home, change your clothes in an empty bathtub (so you'll see if any ticks fall out), check your backside in a mirror and wash your clothes.

For dogs, brush them out immediately. Search around their neck, ears, face and

Dealing with ticks

Prevention: Wear synthetic hiking pants, tuck in socks, spray with Permethrin-based repellent.

Dogs: Vaccinate for Lyme disease. Apply tick/flea repellent, like Frontline Plus, to back of neck.

Crawlies: Ticks tend to crawl a while, which gives you a chance to brush them off before they can attach themselves.

Extraction: Tweezers are often best for removing ticks, although you may be able to pull some out if they are not burrowed into the skin, especially the large brown coastal ticks. Search webmd.com for "tick bites" to get home treatment advice.

Lyme disease: After pulling a tick, place it in Ziploc bag. If half-dollar size red welt later appears, go to doctor (bring tick in bag).

At home: Change clothes in bathtub and shake to see if any ticks fall out. Brush out dog and examine thoroughly outside, especially around neck, ears, face and shoulder/front leg pits.

shoulders.

If a tick gets its hypostome into you or your dog, make sure to get all of it out, especially its claw-like mouth, for which tweezers are sometimes necessary. Then apply Campho-Phenique, Neosporin or similar treatment on the bite.

If you're worried about Lyme disease, rare but debilitating, put the offending tick in a Ziploc bag for doctors to test later, if necessary. Within a few days, if you see a half-dollar size discoloring around the bite area, the usual warning sign, head to the doctor. Quick treatment with antibiotics is the remedy.

For dogs, apply a repellent to the back of your pet's neck. We use Frontline Plus, advertised to kill and repel ticks and fleas and to be water-

proof. We also vaccinate our dogs for Lyme disease.

My record tick day was on a gentle hike with my parents in the hills near Pescadero. In an hour, my dog picked up more than 100, I brushed off dozens from my pants and pulled off a half dozen. Yet my mom, wearing polyester pants, got none. Nothing scientific about it, but the empirical evidence is compelling.

For people not oriented to the outdoors, the idea of a tick crawling on them is a real-life horror movie.

But they shouldn't stop you from enjoying your adventures, not for one minute. Once you get used to them, the little guys are even kind of cute. Yeah, sure. Not.

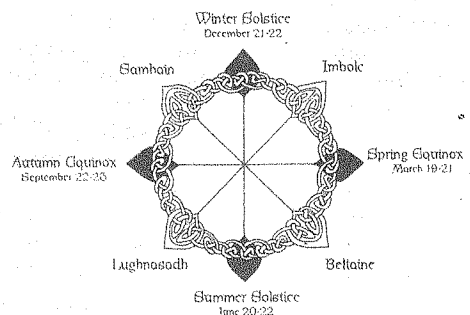
