Go to Health – Health Insurance for Everyone

T.R. Reid wrote a brilliant book in 2010 – *The Healing of America – A global quest for better, cheaper and fairer health care*. He examined industrial democracies around the world and explained their different yet effective health care systems. By a variety of means, they achieve nearly universal coverage and good outcomes. If you don't have time right now to read a book – albeit an entertaining one – as the health care debate is being discussed in the Supreme Court, here's a short cut. Fareed Zakaria has written a two page article in the March 26th issue of *Time* that summarizes many of the issues. The requirement that everyone buy health insurance – called the individual mandate – is at the center of the constitutional controversy. Government subsidies would be given to help those without sufficient funds to buy insurance.

Reid and Zakaria both point out that Switzerland, a business-friendly democracy, had a system like ours 20 years ago, with private insurance and incomplete coverage. People without insurance went to emergency rooms, insurers rejected people with pre-existing conditions, and costs were mounting. The country decided that to make health care work, everyone had to buy insurance. They reformed their system in a way similar to Obama's proposals. Now, 20 years later, everyone is insured, the quality of care is high, and costs have moderated. I can attest to this, as I visit my sister in Switzerland every year, and have seen her in the hospital there. The care is excellent. Taiwan is another with a free-market economy that decided to create a universal health-care system in the mid 1990's. It studied all existing models and decided against private insurers, and for a single payer system that is effective and very low cost. "The Swiss and Taiwanese found that it is imperative for everyone to be covered by health insurance to keep costs down and provide a system where everyone has basic care.

Reid writes that the Swiss have an ethic of 'solidarity' that helps maintain their unity despite having 4 official languages.

Solidarity means community and equal treatment. Everyone should have equal access to vote, have a jury trial, an old age pension, a good school system and a good health care system. Some people have much more money than others in their capitalist system of government, but everyone has their basic needs for health care met.

Zakaria writes that we have "the most expensive, least efficient system of any rich country on the planet." Chronically ill patients, 5% of the population, account for 50% of our health care costs. Their care drives up insurance premiums if they are insured, and federal, state and local health care costs if they lack insurance. Universal coverage would bring healthy people into the system and thereby result in lower average premiums. A downside to Obama's plan is that it maintains the connection between employment and health care that is inefficient and a burden on American business. It is hard for companies to be competitive globally when they are paying large amounts for their employees and former employees. German, Canadian, Japanese and British companies pay next to nothing in health care costs, in comparison.

I hope our country can edge away from rugged individualism into more solidarity, with passage of universal health care. Stay tuned throughout the week as it is debated at the Supreme Court.

MONDAY MEETING REPORT 3/26/12

SATURDAY NIGHT'S COMMUNITY CENTER ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING POTLUCK, was well attended - about 50 community members bringing some amazing pot luck dishes. *Midnight on the Water* played as people arrived, and after dinner, there was a bit of business with election of Board members, the annual financial report, and copies of the new *BCC Bulletin* were passed out along with the Mission Statement, which was set to music by StuArt - a first in my experience of many years of nonprofit annual meetings. The hall looked cozy and inviting with a warm fire, beautiful flowers decorating the long tables which were covered with bright cloths and were surrounded by friends chatting in lively conversation, enjoying the large variety of delicious food. It was a very comforting way to end a most poignant day, a day of remembrance of two of our long time town members who recently passed away. There was a celebration of the life of Ray Marcotte, a gathering that was moved from the family compound on Elm to the Firehouse, so the hundred or so people who came to pay respects, could visit and eat, sheltered from the rain. The Marcotte family has been in Bolinas so long that there are many lives that have been touched by them, especially Ray, through his many years working at school, his volunteer firefighting days, Rod and Boat Club, Lions club, White caps, and through his three sons, Mike, Steve, Greg and their extended families. Seeing so many friendly faces from years past, so many children now grown with kids and grandkids, made it a very moving occasion.

With his family in attendance, Charles Fox was laid to rest Saturday morning at the Bolinas Cemetery. He had slipped away Thursday night, after years of a courageous battle with MS, the longest recorded survivor of this debilitating disease, I overheard someone say. He lived his inspiring life with gusto, enthusiasm, dignity, and love of a good joke, in spite of the setbacks his illness presented. Just recently finishing another manuscript, he is a testament to the tenacity of the human spirit. Such a remarkable life he has led and such remarkable care Veronique, his wife and long time companion, has provided. All best love to her and his children, grandchildren, and extended family. There will be a Community memorial for him at a date yet to be determined.

The other gatherings of the week were more mundane, just the ongoingness of life. Monday evening parents of the school's 4th graders had an opportunity to sit in their childrens' seats and hear their teacher give an excellent lesson on creative and expository writing; Wednesday morning at Marin Office of Ed there was an update on the still dismal school financial picture; then an afternoon workshop on math for the parents of the school's English Learners; and Wednesday night was the Public Utility District meeting at the BCPUD office. Report there was that the County has put off for a year the paving of Wharf Road through Horseshoe Hill. Also, the Board has rejected the donation of the Kidson property along the fallen portion of Ocean Parkway at Terrace.

So if you can judge a community by it's many meetings, love of good music, great potlucks, enthusiastic dancing, and supportive celebrations honoring births and deaths, this town is one of the best. jp

Ad Hoc Facilities Needs Committee

The school board has received a recommendation from school administration to expand its mission to encompass PreK-8 by providing facilities for preschool and including preschool in our educational program. The Board of Trustees has authorized the formation of an ad hoc committee to review the facilities needed for the Bolinas-Stinson Union School District to implement the recommendation.

Its purpose is to evaluate facilities and recommend any modifications or additions needed to school buildings and grounds. The committee will meet as often as necessary to develop recommendations for the Board regarding current and future facilities based upon enrollment and educational program needs.

Committee Composition:

- 1 administrator
- 2 certificated staff members
- 1 classified staff members
- 2 parents
- 1 community members at large
- 1 Board member

Committee Charge

The Facilities Needs Committee will be charged with the following:

- Work with a facilities consultant to develop a District facility needs list related to the administration's recommendation to include preschool in BSUSD's educational program.
- Solicit input and feedback from the broader school community about any proposed modifications to buildings and grounds.
- Incorporate information from an exploratory feasibility study regarding possible general obligation bond funding for recommended facilities projects

Timeline

The Facilities Needs Committee, an ad hoc committee, will meet as often as necessary in order to

provide the Board with a report and recommendation at a special meeting on 5/17/2012. If

necessary, the Board will authorize expenditure of funds to contract for the services of a facilities consultant with expertise in the area of facilities assessment and planning. The committee will provide the board with a proposal for use of a consultant, including cost and scope of work, for their consideration and approval. The Board will receive the committee's recommendation with the intention of taking action to implement all or part of it at their regular meeting of 6/05/2012.

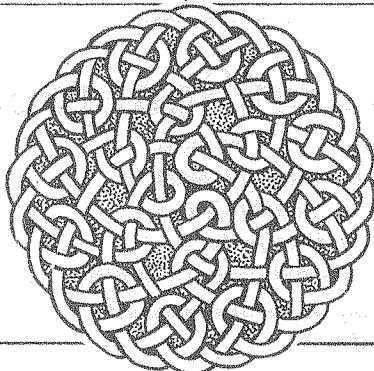

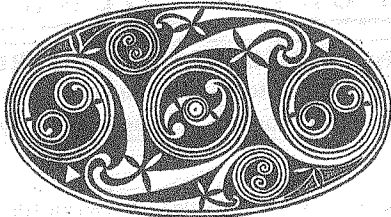
