05/25/2018 - 1:30pm to 3:15pm The Stuart Dynasty: A 17th Century Soap Opera Following their Tudor cousins, the Stuarts reigned for four generations over the 1600s, the most turbulent century in English history: civil war, a time without a king, plague pandemics, and witch hunts ran alongside the Scientific Revolution. England was transforming from a medieval monarchy into a modern state. Living soap opera lives, the Stuart kings and queens, colorful, dramatic, and controversial, gave us riveting stories as they rode the roller coaster of the 17th century.

Charlene O'Rourke, MA completed a Master's in English and, to be practical, chose a career programming mainframe computers for the finance industry. In retirement, she was finally able to return to her first love, 17th century poetry. This led to a dedicated delving into the history of the period and a fascination with the stories of the extraordinary people who invented our modern world. She has taught popular courses on Early Modern England for four years to the students of Sonoma State University's OLLI program.

CHARLES LENHOFF EULOGY

Well what can I say? As I sit here alone welling up and dumping buckets of tears or trying not to drench the paper. It was a long night at the hospital, felt like an eternity and it's only been three days. It feels like an eternity since I saw him last. We were very close to one another and better friends than ever since the time I quit drinking: 19 years ago. Which is a big deal in getting through the rough road I have to travel. And I know it will get smoother eventually. Well, where to begin? After being by his side while I comforted him through the night until the morning of Mother's Day. In the condition that he was in internally as well as sedated by morphine he could still hear my words of comfort. He cried three times so I know he was hearing me and feeling my love so deeply. It took all of my focus and attention, so by the time 8 am rolled around the doctor on duty came to talk to his significant other Tommye Jarvis and I. The doc said that there is a very slight chance he would make it through the surgery and if he did make it through he would be in a wheelchair and partially vegetablized.

My dad wasn't the kind of man who would want to live like that. He would rather be on horseback than in a wheelchair. He was a true cowboy and a solid Philadelphia Eagles fan through and through. An All-American who wore his heart on one sleeve and his pride on the other one. Anyone who knew him knew this about him. He was a hard worker and worked hard right up till the end. Even when he had no feeling in his legs when he fell down at the catering job that he was on he apologized to the people for ruining their dinner. So Tommye and I decided together to have the doctors pull the plug on life support after the pastor and I prayed together and gave my father the last rites. Tommye and I had the doctors pull the plug. From 8 a.m. until 9:45 a.m. on Mother's Day, May 13, 2018, he was born May 5, 1949. So, after his last breath, I turned to Tommye and said "my Dad always said, 'it's hard to soar with the eagles when you're surrounded by turkeys." and I pointed out the window of the second story of the hospital where he was lying in bed across the parking lot and the cross street that goes by is a big marsh and straight out the window above the marsh was a bald eagle. Hovering, diving; hovering and diving; and hunting, three times and flew off. It was very spiritual and reassuring. My dad cried three times, the eagle hovered and dove three times and flew off. It meant a lot to me to have witnessed that and I am glad that Tommye saw it too.


My father was disliked by few and loved by many. He was an icon and a legend as well as my hero. It would take two of me to fill his shoes so I won't even try. I was thankful to have gotten to perform a song with him at the Bolinas Community Center before this happened. It was recorded on video by Mary Siedman and put on You Tube for anybody and everybody to see. Even though I knew I will never get to hear the whistle he and I shared calling each other if we were looking for one another. And I will never get to hear his voice again. But I will always get to watch the performance and hear him sing. Forever etched in the internet. And that is a precious treasure. Go to You Tube, type in Charles and Rob Lenhoff sing 'Father and Son' by Cat Stevens. Enjoy! And I thank everyone for all your support. And my love and many blessings go out to the fire department, EMTs and all the medical staff at Marin General Hospital as well as Mary Siedman for the video recording. Also, the pastor Father Bill Thornton for giving my father the last rites. Thank you all for helping my father go easy. Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle! Whistle!



Nature Notebook By Loretta Farley

A new moon this week brings extreme low tides during the morning daylight hours, with Friday and Saturday, May 17 and 18 at the lowest points, at 7:26 a.m. and 7:57 a.m., extending through Tuesday morning. Good time for beachwalking!

The first tule elk calf of the year has been born in the free-ranging herd near Limantour Beach. Calves should be appearing soon in the Tomales Point herd. As is true with harbor seal pups and black-tailed deer fawns, elk calves may be left on their own as parents forage nearby. A single youngster is usually not in distress, but just resting and hiding from predators as they await Mom's return. Both black-tailed deer and tule elk deliver their young at this time of year, when grass and brush food is most abundant.

Speaking of abundant grass and brush for animal foraging, as we move to the long dry season of summer, preparing for wildfire is on the to-do list. Clearing defensible space by mowing and weeding, brushing off roofs to remove leaf litter and pruning to create a fire break are all part of living in West Marin. Many native plants are adapted to fire, burning at the surface but resprouting from their roots. Bishop pine cones are opened only in fire, allowing the seeds to disperse.


WHAT HAPPENED 5-21-18 Monday Morning Recap Week in Review from Jennie Pfeiffer

We have a beautiful, sunny & still morning this morning, a happy relief from the intense, crazy-making blow of yesterday. It's a good morning to reflect on avoidance as a useful tool in the life-skills toolbox. And reflect I did, as I avoided getting down to column writing and its looming deadline, as I watered and weeded in the garden. There are so many useful tasks that can be accomplished while avoiding starting the intended project. But it can be carried too far towards unhealthy distraction, I considered, as I started arranging the tools in the garden shed, which wasn't at all on the "To Do" list for today, in fact not on the list for the past 10 months. It's interesting how some of those "life- skills" can go "negative" on a person, and though the garden shed looked better, the page was looking pretty blank.

Here, then quickly, is a bit of school news, to pass on in the few minutes I have left myself for writing. Tuesday's special Bolinas-Stinson School Board meeting was a long look at Board Policy 4211, composition requirements for the screening/interviewing committee for principal hiring. There was a good bit of input from staff, both certificated (teachers) and classified (support staff), and from parents and community members. This hiring of a new principal presents us with an opportunity to look at what we envision for school leadership. The meeting was 5 ½ hours of scrutiny of every suggestion for possible changes in BP4211. At the end of the night there was a unanimous agreement by the Board of Trustees as to the makeup of a screening/interviewing committee: 2 Board members, 2 certificated, 2 classified, 2 parents, 1 community member, 1 eighth grade student, 1 confidential employee (office personnel) and the Superintendent. I feel confident they will do due diligence and bring to the Board the best possible recommendation for our new principal.

Politics, otherwise, has included quite a bit of large advertisements in the mail, extolling the virtues of the various candidates running for public office. Voting is coming up upon us and I am still considering candidates. Here is some of my thinking so far: absolutely Mary Jane Burke for Marin County Superintendent of schools (she has been outstanding for many years); Delaine Eastin for Governor. I am a total fan. What an educator! What an amazing public servant! She is smart, articulate, competent and compassionate, and has proven herself as a qualified elected state official as a State Assembly member and two terms as State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Also, I agree with Frank Egger when he says: "I'm voting for the only progressive/liberal in the Lt Gov race, one with a proven track record as an elected official, former Richmond mayor Gayle McLaughlin". She is listed on the ballot as no party preference and I don't see that as a bad thing. As a leader of the Richmond Progressive Alliance, an organization that defeated Chevron's candidates and was part of a progressive majority on their City Council, she worked tirelessly with Richmonds's progressive council, quietly moving forward in an excellent way - not just good ideas, but good action.


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
