Almost Nothing

Fascinating to hear Eric Karpeles read from his new book *Almost Nothing, the 20th-Century Art and Life of Józef Czapski* at the Library.

The book is a biography of the Polish artist Józef Czapski. But it's also a narrative of Eric Karpeles' search for the story of Czapski. It's a compelling narrative woven around the fate of Poland in the 20th Century, caught between Hitler and Stalin.

Despite the arc of history and the tragedy of the times, *Almost Nothing* is still a study of the life of an artist. Eric mentioned in a previous *Hearsay* article that he and Czapski spoke the same language - the language of painting. Eric's descriptive analyses of Czapski's paintings make especially enjoyable reading. Eric goes so far as to detail his own technique of looking at paintings (arm's length, close, from across the room, close again, etc.) and he writes colorfully about the artwork's aesthetic attributes (colors, paint handling, subject material, etc.) He repeatedly stresses how important it is to look at the real painting and not be content with a reproduction.

Asked why he had titled the book *Almost Nothing* Eric referred to the following paragraph:

During the run of an exhibition of his paintings in Warsaw, Czapski was interviewed by a newspaper reporter who found his subject matter strange: "Lonely people, deserted café tables, faces half-concealed in the metro, minute daily events glimpsed in passing."

Seemingly negligible objects "like a bedside table with a single piece of string on it" were cited. Called on to justify such inconsequential presences, Czapski replied, "Each time it is almost nothing. But that 'almost nothing'" signi es everything."

Boboman

For his 77th birthday party at the Community Center Jan Broek asked me to hang an old painting of mine, a painting from the early 80's titled "Boboman" based on the Fool card of the Ryder-Waite Tarot. The painting is a big banner that tells the story of *Life in Bolinas 40 years ago* (or thereabouts)

Boboman is a youthful self-portrait with mustache and dark curly hair. Wearing a Bolinas Border Patrol t-shirt and holding a Stratocaster guitar Boboman is about to step off the cliff above Agate Beach at the end of Poplar Road.

Boboman's companion, the little dog offers up a bottle of Jack Daniels and a shot glass. In the background cannabis plants wave their feathery fronds. In midair hangs a magic, multicolored guitar pick.

Boboman's right hand holds a paintbrush - painting his own frame of reference as he journeys along the edge of the cliff. His brush hand is assured and graceful, one can only aspire to such artfulness.

From the upper left corner streams the beautiful pink Lovelight, illuminating Boboman's face. The Lovelight symbolizes a connection with the Goddess and the Divine Feminine here in Bolinas.

Boboman and the Fool are similar because they both choose to "journey close to the edge" Living in Bolinas is one such journey — living literally close to the edge.

The little dog serving whiskey, the cannabis plants, the broken string on the guitar and the black widow spider refer to the pitfalls of living close to the edge. So many obstacles impede the Fool's journey.

The Fool will fail but Love will prevail.

I love the memory of Boboman and I love Jan Broek for asking me to revive that memory.

Jan, Boboman, and me - we are still Bobomen - beautiful fools stumbling along Life's edge.

*Caring for one another is our village at its best.
It's Mimi who needs us now...*

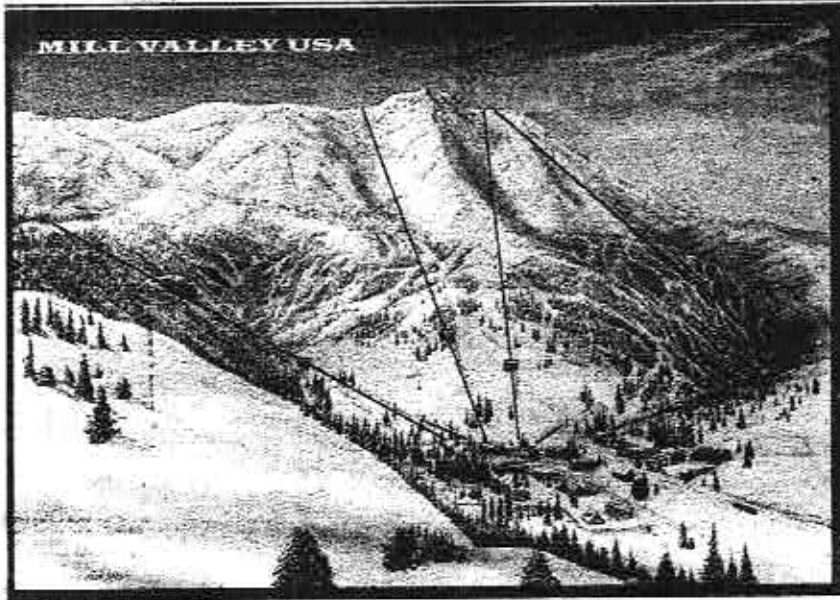

About the Artist



Llewellyn Ludlow is an artist from Mill Valley who currently lives in the wild kingdom of Bolinas. A stripped-down version of his sublimely hilarious re-imagining of Mt. Tam and Mill Valley as a Tahoe-like ski town (above) is our cover illustration this week. It's a Marin Winter Wonderland!

Ludlow's art is available around West Marin—prints of his Mill Valley ski mecca for sale can be found at Proof Lab, the Depot Bookstore, Two Neat and Ohana Bowls Acai Cafe in Greenbrae. llbro.com is his website; prints can be ordered there too.

He's led an interesting life: At an early age Llewellyn fell into a tide pool at Stinson Beach, and when his parents snatched him out of the water, he had a look in his eyes that told his father Lynn, "Neptune had claimed him, and only lent him back to us for a little while."

A longtime surfer and artist, Llewellyn paints both familiar scenes of West Marin and of the ocean he loves. His paintings decorate many a Marin home, and his mural at Proof Lab Station in Tam Valley is a beloved iconic landmark that gives color to the area.

The depiction of Mt. Tamalpais as a snowy ski mountain was a project

that took him over two years to complete. "I wanted to spark the imagination of those who, like me, look up at Mt. Tam and wonder what it would be like as a premier ski mountain."

He sent along an artist's statement too:

"To explore the vast world of imagination, sight and sound, and to give something back to a planet that has given so much.

"My objective is to bring awareness of the earth's beauty through unique perspectives, color combinations and a truly direct connection with our planet.

"Art to me is as important as life; life breathes art.

"Often caught up in our daily lives, we sometimes forget how much beauty and design the earth holds. We, the product of this divine art, should never let go of this pure source.

"My art is constantly reaching for this rich mixture of earth and imagination.

"As a living embodiment of this synthesis composed of mostly water, I feel especially drawn to the ocean. I love to carve my personal signature across the waves by surfing. Painting the ocean and earth to me is no different." *

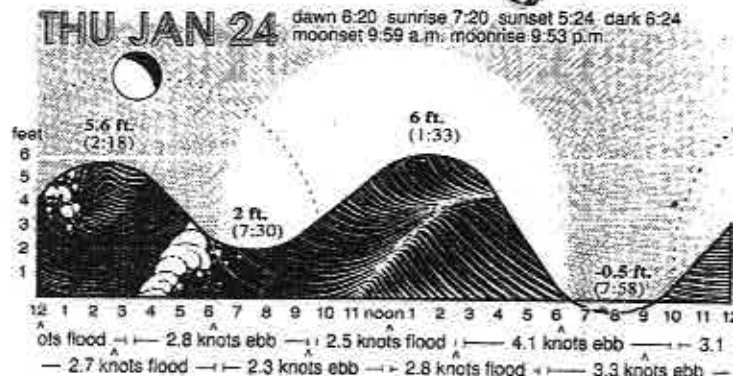
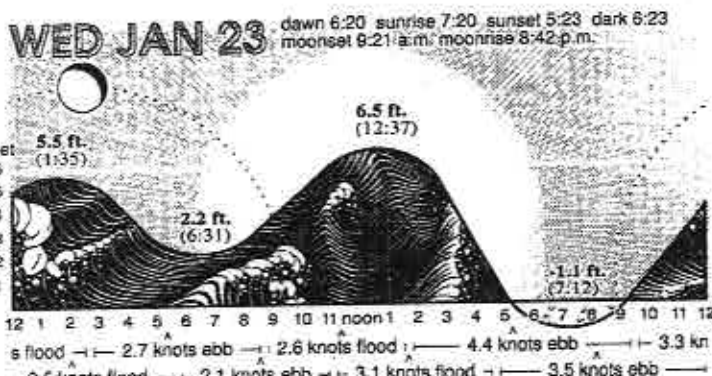

Stagecoach days

In the early years following the Gold Rush about the only way to reach the town of Bolinas was to navigate the treacherous waters of the Golden Gate and sail northward along the coast. Bolinas was the largest port in Marin County, and schooners from San Francisco would transport timber, copper, lime, beef and numerous dairy products from the coastal ranches and mines to the growing population of the city. The Bolinas lagoon was still navigable for ships and the bustling town had two hotels, restaurants, taverns, a shipbuilding yard and, remarkably, almost two-thirds of the population of the county. However, within 25 years the lagoon would silt up, partially because of all the logging in the area, and Bolinas would see its position as an important port and shipping town replaced by Sausalito, Tiburon and San Rafael. When the railway reached Point Reyes in the 1870s, Bolinas and Stinson Beach

(then named Willow Camp) had traded their mercantile past for a future economy based on camping and recreation. The problem for these campers and vacationers was how to get there. Besides an expensive and often harrowing boat ride from San Francisco, there was only the old Miwok trail accessible by horse or foot that connected San Rafael to Bolinas over Mount Tamalpais. After the San Rafael to Olema road was completed in 1865 another road was constructed 14 miles south to Bolinas, used by travelers on foot, horseback and wagon. However this route was nearly 35 miles long and required an overnight stay. In 1877 prominent West Marin ranchers and citizens convinced the County Board of Supervisors to help fund the construction of a road that would connect Bolinas to San Rafael. Henry Gibson operated the first Bolinas Stage Line starting in 1879 from a stable across the street

from the County Courthouse in San Rafael. The trip took three hours and cost \$1.50. Robert Cottingham bought the line from Gibson in 1882 as well as running a stage from Sausalito to Willow Camp that had begun in the early 1870s. Leonard Nott, a driver for Cottingham, purchased the stage line in 1886 and operated it for four years when Albert Sayers and his brother Wallace took over both the Sausalito- and San Rafael-based stagecoaches that ran to the coast. By 1913, better roads, the automobile and a rail line to Willow Camp had replaced the horse-drawn conveyances, and the stagecoach era passed into history.

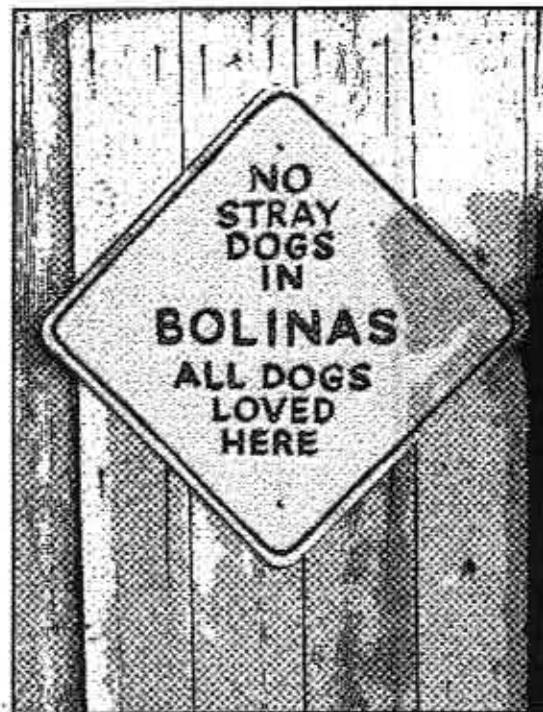

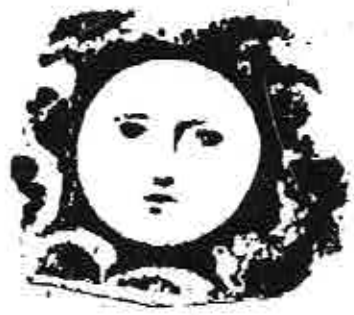
