Star Route Farm is on the market. There is a community coalition forming to find funding to purchase it to insure its future availability for Community, organic farming, and educational use. This is our concept for a suggested proposal:

Star Route Farm C.O.R.E. Proposal (Community, Organics, Resource, Education)
C. – Community Access and Sustainability

- * Preserve and protect this fertile land for Community use in the manner in which it has been maintained for the past three decades.
- * Provide access as open space for the Community to enjoy, including a path from the school to Mesa Park.
- * Provide alternatives for access to and egress from Bolinas should lagoon flooding and tidal surges make that necessary as a result of climate change

O. – Organic Food Production

- * Keep Star Route Farm in operation, continuing to provide the community with organic produce
- * Lease land to local organic farmers
- * Create and maintain a Community Garden

R. – Regenerative and Restorative Resource for Area Resilience

- * Preserve areas for wildlife habitat including bee sanctuary
- * Restore Pine Gulch Creek and maintain healthy wetlands
- * Provide farm to table sustainable practice

E. – Education

- * Expand Bolinas/Stinson elementary school campus for outdoor education and possible future building site if that should become necessary
- * Host elementary school, high school, university, and public courses on agriculture and nature immersion
- * Provide test site for biodiversity, crop development, and right size farming.

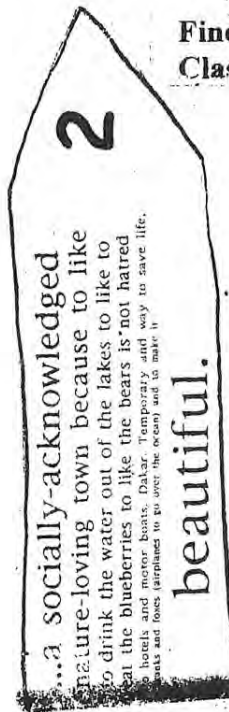

PARTICLE FEVER: FILM SCREENING & DISCUSSION TO BENEFIT KWMR

Imagine being able to watch as Edison turned on the first light bulb, or as Franklin received his first jolt of electricity. For the first time, a film gives audiences a front row seat to a significant and inspiring scientific breakthrough as it happens. Particle Fever follows six brilliant scientists—three theorists and three experimentalists—during the launch of the Large Hadron Collider, marking the start-up of the biggest and most expensive experiment in the history of the planet. Filmed over four years, from before the collider turned on in 2008 through the successful discovery of the Higgs in 2012, Particle Fever was directed by Mark Levinson, a Bay Area filmmaker with a PhD in Particle Physics from UC Berkeley, and produced by David Kaplan, a professor of Particle Physics at Johns

Hopkins and also a graduate of Berkeley. The film was edited and mixed by long-time Bolinas resident Walter Murch, who will be available for a Q&A after the screening.

Planned Feralhood's current abode is
 going to be fumigated. Our fencing will
 have to be pulled away from the house,
 and our sanctuary cats will need safe
 refuge during the toxic tenting and re-
 pairs. We have a couple irons in the
 fire, but have not secured a place for
 the cats yet, and Kathy would love a
 place to stay where she could keep a
 couple of her special needs cats with
 her. Planned Feralhood must find a
 place to hold around 30 cats for two to
 three weeks, give or take a few days,
 by September 28. A portion of a barn,
 perhaps some stalls that could be
 fenced in would be good. We could
 kennel the cats individually, and/or let
 them have the room to roam inside the
 temporary enclosure. An outbuilding,
 garage, or fenced area that we could
 cat-escape-proof are other possibilities.
 We would install, then remove any
 fencing materials; and do a complete

 own digs.

Another possibility would be indi-

 cats. We could set up in kennels if nec-

HELP KEEP BOLINAS WEIRD AND BUY THIS LEGENDARY BAR

One of the oldest continually-operating saloons in California is up for grabs. Smiley's Schooner Saloon in the surf town of Bolinas recently hit the market with an asking price of \$1,499,999. That's enough for a two bedroom condo in San Francisco's more desirable neighborhoods, or "one dollar under 1.5 million," as the realtor describes it.

The bar, hotel, and music venue is known among musicians for gigs that come with a free room and rowdy crowd, and to music fans as a place where you could catch artists like Devandra Banhart, Michael Hurley, or Sparrow's Gate. Smiley's is one of several points of local pride in Bolinas. It opened in 1851, which, as their website points out, is before Abraham Lincoln was president, or "Jingle Bells" was a song.

But there would be a catch to owning this piece of libational history. Whoever buys Smiley's will be expected to carry on the tradition. So, sorry speculators, but no condos.

"It's being sold as a bar-hotel," Don Deane, the current owner, told me. "I'm selling the business and the buildings in the use that they've had for over 100 years now."

This fits in with a long-standing tradition of Bolinas residents fiercely protecting their culture despite the Marin County beach town increasingly becoming a destination for artistic San Francisco ex pats. Street signs directing drivers to the town have been known to mysteriously disappear, and a New York Times reporter was warned earlier this year that his tires might get slashed. One Bolinas musician said he only returned my phone call to discourage me from writing about Smiley's (a request as sure to elicit disappointment as telling a police officer to search everywhere but the trunk).

Bolinas songwriter and musician Jeff Manson, who until recently hosted "some of the strangest, freest, open mics you'll ever see" at Smiley's, said people in Bolinas don't have anything against outsiders. They just want the town to stay as unique and awesome as it already is. Manson sees Bolinas' current residents as beneficiaries of hippies who came to help clean up after the 1971 oil spill, and then stayed to create their own ideal community.

"When a business turns over, it doesn't necessarily go to someone who holds those same egalitarian beliefs," Manson said, which is why locals can be prickly about selling to someone from out of town, or talking to reporters. "It's often seen as hating on outsiders, but I think it's just people who want to see the project of Bolinas succeed."

For now, at least as far Smiley's is concerned, the project is safe. Deane is content to wait for the right buyer. He listed the property for sale back in 2011 and then decided to keep it. This time around, he says there has been plenty of interest and lots of rumors, but nothing is settled.

"It's 'been sold' about 20 times in the last two months," he told me. "There is a current offer being considered, and there are others in the works."

When asked if there was any chance Smiley's would get turned into condos or a shopping mall, Deane responded with something rare in real estate reporting: a simple, straightforward answer.

"No," he said. "I can promise you that."
