



School Board Candidate Statement - Stephen O'Neal

Dear Neighbors,

I am running for a seat on the Bolinas Stinson School Board. As I don't believe in making important decisions with limited information, you can go to www.VisionForCommunity.org to learn more or feel free to contact me.

My wife, Nui, and I are parents of three young children ages 3, 5 and 5. We moved here with considerable intention, to raise our children in a small community, in a natural environment, and where virtually all the children went to the local public "community" school.

Addressing the housing problem for school staff and families is a major focus of mine. There are not enough kids and the trend has not been good. Eventually, with no kids, there will be no school.

Other priorities will be to increase parent involvement (especially Spanish speaking) and to help raise the academic bar in any areas we fall short. We're a small, agile school that can implement creative ways to effectively monitor individual student progress and offer everyone a well-rounded, solid educational experience.

With all our children in the lower grades, I have a great view of the daily comings and goings on the Stinson Campus in particular, where almost half the students are. I also like the idea of further uniting these two unique towns, so it seems prudent to have at least one board member representing the Stinson Beach community.

As for my background, I grew up in Peterborough, New Hampshire and moved to the Bay Area in 1990. I have lived in Berkeley, San Francisco and on a houseboat in Sausalito that we designed and built. I have worked for myself as a designer and contractor, created two tenancy in common communities in San Francisco, and had a number of entrepreneurial adventures. Over the years, I've employed about 250 people full time, from whom I have learned a great deal.

I've also worked closely with former leaders of Burma's '88 generation uprising, co-leading the protests when the Olympic torch came through San Francisco. They directly inspired me to later work for the UN in Burma, and in 2008 helped get me into the country at a time when it was closed. I led initial assessment teams after a major humanitarian disaster, precipitated by Cyclone Nargis.

Personally, I'm passionate about learning, evolving and helping others. I think a lot about what true community (www.visionforcommunity.org/on-community) really is and how I can help cultivate it.

In my experience, great ideas emerge from committed people, with differing backgrounds, openly and thoughtfully working through, and often disagreeing on, important issues in an effort to get the deepest understandings and the best outcomes. To my mind, this community has a vast amount of untapped potential.

VOTE NO ON MEASURE X

The Measure:

"Shall the County of Marin enact a resolution pursuant to Marin County Ordinance 3662 to include Brighton Avenue, Park Avenue and Wharf Road in downtown Bolinas as County roads on which there shall be no overnight parking of vehicles, except for automobiles, motorcycles and pickups, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m.?"

This measure's prime motivator is the elimination of overnight camping in vehicles.

Homelessness is a grave and massive problem and is increasing every day across the country. What we as a socially conscious community can do as an immediate alleviation, an actual - if partial solution to homelessness is to allow people who have mobile homes to live in them. A mobile-home is a home! To vote against this measure is the simplest, singular gesture that is effortless. There has always existed in Bolinas a homeless and transient population, many of whom become known by name and respected. This is an intrinsic component of our colorful ways; this exclusionary ordinance runs counter to our town's time-honored character. With the rest of the country closing its shutters, we have thus far retained the distinction of being the haven of a rare free spirit. During the drafting of the Bolinas Community Plan in 1974, a constant consideration whenever a major change was being discussed was whether it would "damage the existing character?" [of the town] (p.21, BCP). Our town's character is based upon the inclusion of all who wish to remain peacefully here regardless of their economic standing.

Acceptance engenders peace. Crime is bred out of dejection and alienation. As a self-governing and largely crime-free community, we don't need this ordinance. A Mobile Home Is a Home. Vote NO for No Homelessness.

n what experts are calling a classic case of "opposites attract," the town of Bolinas was recently sold to Donald Trump for an undisclosed price reported to be in the large eight figures.



Deadly disease is taking rising toll of sea lions

Hundreds of California sea lions have been stricken by an often deadly bacterial infection and are washing ashore daily up and down the coast, raising fears among biologists that an already soaring death toll could continue to rise.

Veterinarians at the Marine Mammal Center in the Marin Headlandsso far this year have treated 220 sea lions for the malady known as leptospirosis, a pathogen that causes liver fail-

The outbreak, to date, is the second-largest since state officials began keeping track of the infectious disease in 1970, but the numbers are growing. The sick and dying sea lions were -
