

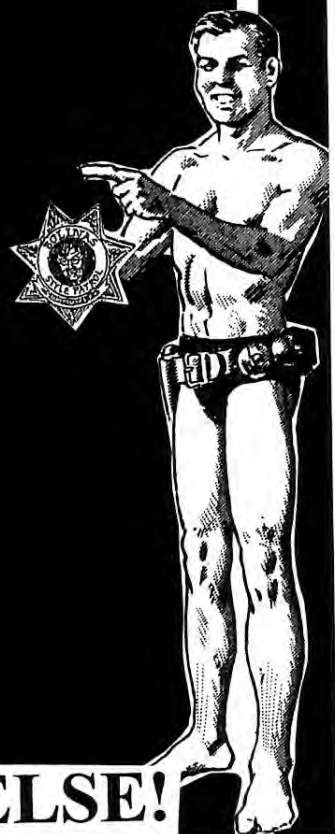

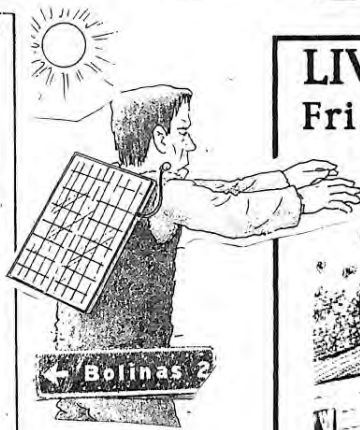

## My thoughts on Measure B

Because many people continue to ask me questions about Measure B, I have decided to publish my thoughts about it. I am opposed to *the current version* of the bond measure. This is a difficult decision, and I want to tell you my reasons.

The Board has not done enough due diligence. It is true that the bond has been on many board agendas. That does not mean that there have been many hours of discussion by the Board. Most of the time has been presentations to the Board from advisors and committees. In my opinion, what the Board should have done prior to placing this measure on the ballot is to have taken this information and then have frank, detailed discussions about primarily two things: What we need and how much it will cost. Those questions have not been addressed.

Even as an elected Trustee to the Board, I can't tell you what the money will be spent on at this time. As an attachment to the resolution authorizing the ballot measure, the Bond Project List has 22 line items of possible projects. Some are specific and would be mandated by State and/or Federal authorities. This includes health and safety upgrades, and ADA compliances. Some are too vague. Examples include "Expand current instructional and storage space", "Renovate current science facilities", and "Improve student access to instructional technology". Now, to be clear, these are all worthy projects. They and the others should have been discussed further, and presented in more detail to the public prior to the ballot.

The process was rushed with an artificial deadline. From the beginning, there has been this insistence from some board members that time is of the essence. That the bond should be placed on this November's ballot, or it will never happen. A recent mailer stated, "What will happen if Measure B does not pass? If Measure B does not pass, our classrooms and school facilities will continue to deteriorate". I don't accept this line of reasoning. I believe that the Board could better serve the school community by taking the needed time to look closely at this monumental decision and come up with a more detailed plan. By identifying needed projects and corresponding cost estimates, you, the voters, would have a better understanding of the measure, and thereby make a more informed decision.

The \$9,000,000 was presented by the committee without any real debate from the Board. The reason given by the committee was that's the maximum the school district can legally get. In my opinion, that's not how any agency should ask for money from the public. Asking for nine million dollars causes each property to be taxed at \$30/\$100,000 of assessed value. Asking for less money would cause the tax rate to go down. Here is one of the common misunderstandings that people have talked to me about. The nine million is a cap. It is how much the district could spend, not necessarily would spend. But with no cost estimates or specifics to the Bond List, I can't tell you if we would spend that much, or where it would be spent. Once the District starts to borrow money though, the tax rate will be \$30/\$100,000. Again, more specifics would make for a far better ballot measure.

I am voting No on Measure B because I do not think *the bond on this ballot* has gone through the steps necessary if the school wants to ask residents to fund \$9,000,000. The school does need a bond to do improvements that we cannot do within our current finances. I wish the Board had done the work necessary for me to support this bond. Unfortunately, I can't say we did.

I will not tell you how I think you should vote. That is for each of you to decide on your own. If you are satisfied with the level of detail presented so far, then vote Yes. If, however, you would like to see a more specific plan, then vote No to the current measure. If Measure B fails, then it simply means that it fails. Nothing more, nothing less. I can't tell you if Measure B will pass. I believe that you support the School District. I do know that if presented with a clear, concise, specific ballot measure, you would vote overwhelmingly in favor of it.

As a graduate of the Bolinas-Stinson Union School District, and one who has always advocated for the better education of our students, I find it very difficult to support a \$9,000,000 school bond measure that fails to define exactly how it "will improve the quality of education" for our students. The only, very general, reference to education in the ballot measure is that it will "improve student access to instruction technology." This is an item that should already be being addressed with monies received from our current property taxes.

It may be true, that a few improvements are necessary to meet ADA requirements, of which I am totally in favor, but it seems to me that the school very recently received modernization upgrades. And, through all the literature that I have read regarding this ballot measure, I have yet to see any mention of a master plan for this bond money.

If there is a problem that needs fixing, or an educational improvement that is needed to enhance the learning of our students and keeps them on par, or above par, as to what is taught to their peers, then I am in favor. But, before you get my vote, I need to know the details and how much it is going to cost! I am not accustomed to handing over the money first, and then finding out the details later.

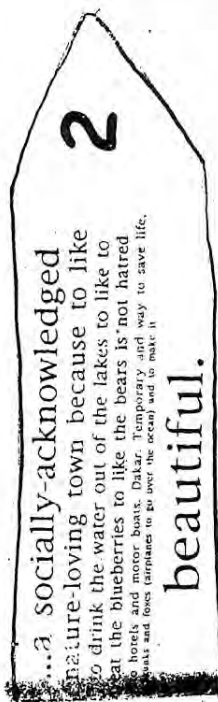
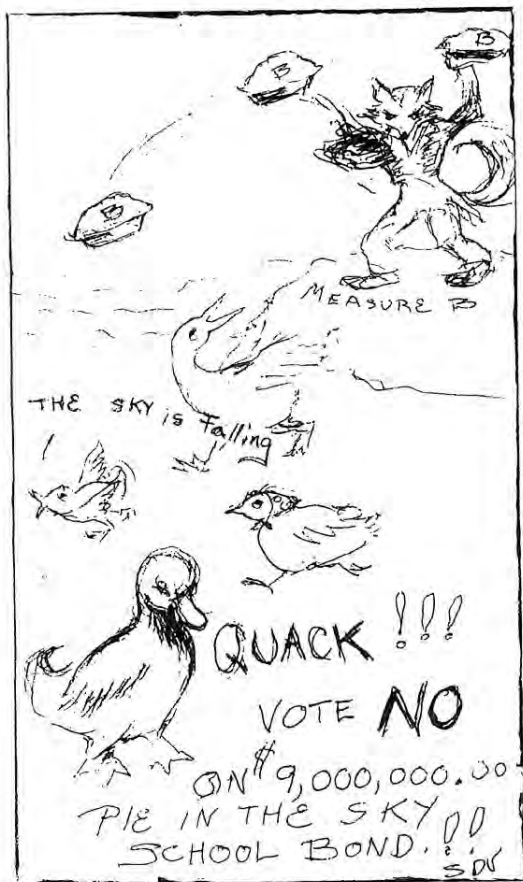

Warren writes a description of how he sees the Land Fund:

A COUNTERPLOT LAND FUND

A nonprofit revolving fund, the New Land Fund has been created to aid much needed land reform in this country. Twenty-two hundred eighty farmers per week for the last twenty years have been relinquishing their farms. Agribusiness oligarchies increasingly control the land, production, and marketing of the US's food supply. The soil is depleted by chemicals and monoculture. Pesticides are threatening numerous species of wildlife. Mining and clear-cutting are raping the land of natural contours and erosion protection. Leapfrog development blights our open spaces. The story goes on without a sufficient counterplot. The New Land Fund is an attempt to change the story by:

1. Challenging the notion that land itself (apart from improvements made on it) ought to be owned and speculated on.

2. Aiding people in finding ways to live on and farm the land organically, ecologically, responsibly, and joyfully.

The New Land Fund proposes to achieve these two objectives by establishing a revolving fund which would purchase selected parcels of land for individual farmers or communities wanting to move onto it and work it. Upon purchase, the NLF will lease land to individuals until the land is paid off. Once it is paid off, the individuals on the land will be able to lease it back from the NLF in perpetuity for a token rent. Alternatively, those living on the land could establish their own nonprofit corporation similar to the NLF and receive title to the land.

The NLF sees its function as driving a small wedge into the present structure of land ownership, speculation, and misuse. It seeks to find people who not only want to stay on the land or go back to it, but who also identify strongly with the need to organize locally at a political level to effectively challenge outmoded building codes, subdivision requirements, patterns of speculation, and traditional patterns of energy consumption. The NLF seeks to create a heightened awareness of the potential relations between land and human community.

*The Heronry of Martin Griffin Preserve*  
**SCIENCE STAFF OBSERVES NEST SUCCESS ACROSS BOLINAS LAGOON**

The number of nests initiated in the heronry at ACR's Martin Griffin Preserve declined dramatically in 2013, and none of those nests fledged any young.

In 2014, two Great Blue Herons flew low over the colony site on January 29. No other herons or egrets were seen in the canyon, and no nests were attempted.

In contrast to the events at Martin Griffin Preserve, the colony site across the lagoon, near the town of Bolinas, saw a dramatic increase in the number of nesting Great Egrets in 2014.

*Twice as many nests near Bolinas*

The season total of 34 nests was more than double the number initiated at that site the prior year.

For Great Egrets, 68% of their nests

were successful, fledging 45 chicks from the colony. Nine Great Blue Heron nests were also established, eight of which were successful and fledged a total of 22 chicks.

The strong nest success and the high number of chicks fledged from the Bolinas colony suggest that food supply did not limit heron and egrets nesting on Bolinas Lagoon.

The reasons egrets chose not to nest at Martin Griffin Preserve appear to be specific to that colony site, probably related to disturbance by potential nest predators, with no apparent adverse effects on the colony at Bolinas.
