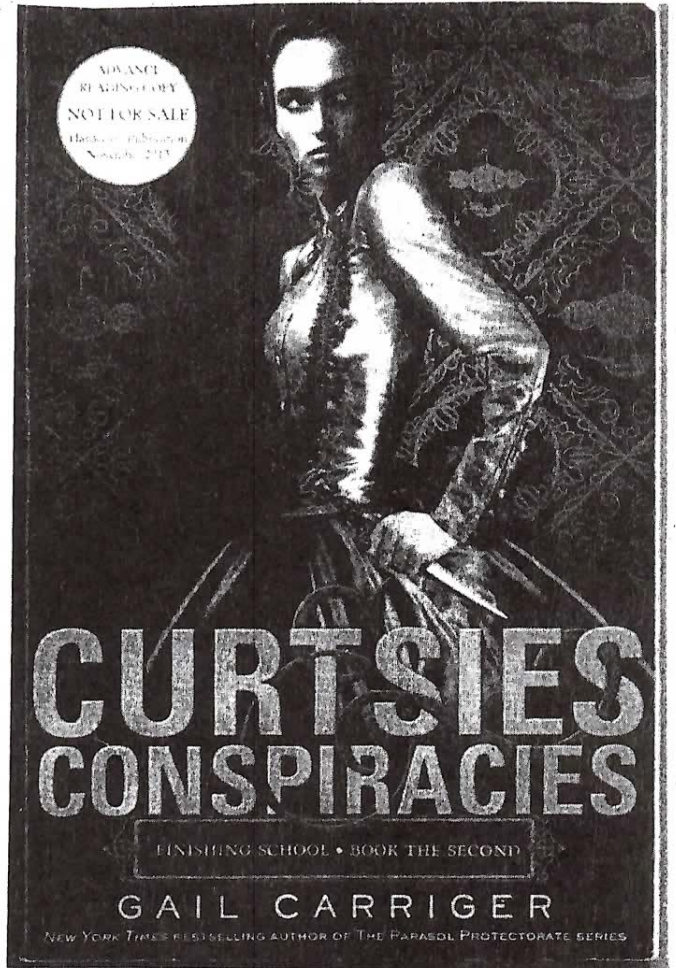

Expatriate Post: Dispatch to Boboland from a Small Town Near France – XVII

Halloween, my favorite time of year, is not celebrated in France. Nor is Columbus Day for that matter which, in my opinion, should be eradicated and replaced with Halloween, for all intents and purposes. On the other hand, October 31st is celebrated in France as Toussaint, All Saints, with a two week school holiday. Now we're talking. My children rejoiced. They didn't seem to mind that there was no tricking or treating. They built forts in the forest, terrorized small forest animals and became full-fledged pagans in their own right.

In France, put a religious spin on anything and it becomes an excuse for a holiday. Saint Whatsewhosit de Bloopity Bloop, martyred by the Romans back in 325 AD, had his head cut off because he wouldn't leave votive offerings in the temple. Hey! Sounds like a good excuse for a holiday. Yeah! Okay, establish it on a Thursday and then we'll make the "pont," a bridge to the weekend and then add the legitimate two weeks onto that and then it's a slippery slope down to the two week holiday in December! Every six weeks there is a two week holiday. The French shut down France, throw away the keys and bring the local village economy to a grinding halt with the exception of food shops and anything pertaining to wine and more food. (U.S. government shutdown? France has fine-tuned the concept. France shuts down all the time and still eats well, goes on holiday and dishes out health care. Go figure.)

What happens this time of year in lieu of Halloween is a kind of renewed feeding frenzy. Snickers bars and Lemon drops are replaced by salmon from Scotland and foie gras from the southwest of France. Wild mushrooms arrive by the cartload, mandarins are flown in from Corsica, garlands of wild boar sausage peppered with hazelnuts hang in the butcher shops and pheasants appear in your garden. Chefs and shopkeepers alike have returned from their summer holidays and finally shaken their indolent post-holiday mantles. October is fantastic in France because absolutely everything gets stuffed with chestnuts. Pheasant for example.

Walking out the door into the garden the other day, I was startled by the noise of clumsy scuttling. Either my little dove couple who lives amongst the olive trees had gained weight for winter or there was an intruder. Puzzled, I went back inside where I then heard an urgent thumping on the skylight. That was it, the extra-terrestrials had arrived. 'Was I prepared?' I asked myself. I looked up and was greeted by a huge green eye gazing down at me. Attached to the eye was a turtle-like head sporting a brilliant, claret-colored headdress. "We" reacted simultaneously. It released a grating screech and I leapt out of my skin. By the time I opened the door, my visitor was across the courtyard moving at a measured pace with quite the haughty cock to his head. "He" was a gorgeous, over-fed pheasant released from a farm for the hunting season.

"You would be wise to hang out here!" I shouted. He didn't appear to be very bright. As a matter of fact, he was rather nonchalant considering his precarious existence.

My Sicilian business partner said, "Keep feeding him so we can have him for Christmas dinner!"

My Sicilian handyman said, "You should have shot him!"

What, is he nuts?! I don't have a gun. Besides, other than the occasional ant, I've never killed anything in my life, much less an incredibly ornate bird that looked me right in the eye. My Sicilian friends are so predictable.

Slight modification. The French do celebrate a kind of Halloween based on the cheesiest aspect of the western interpretation of Halloween. Cheap costumes in boxes and jack o'lantern stencils can be bought at the local supermarket. There is, however, no trick or treating. No one would answer their door even if you tried. Old habits from the Middle Ages die hard. After dark, you don't open your door to anyone! You lock the gates, close the shutters, release the dogs and

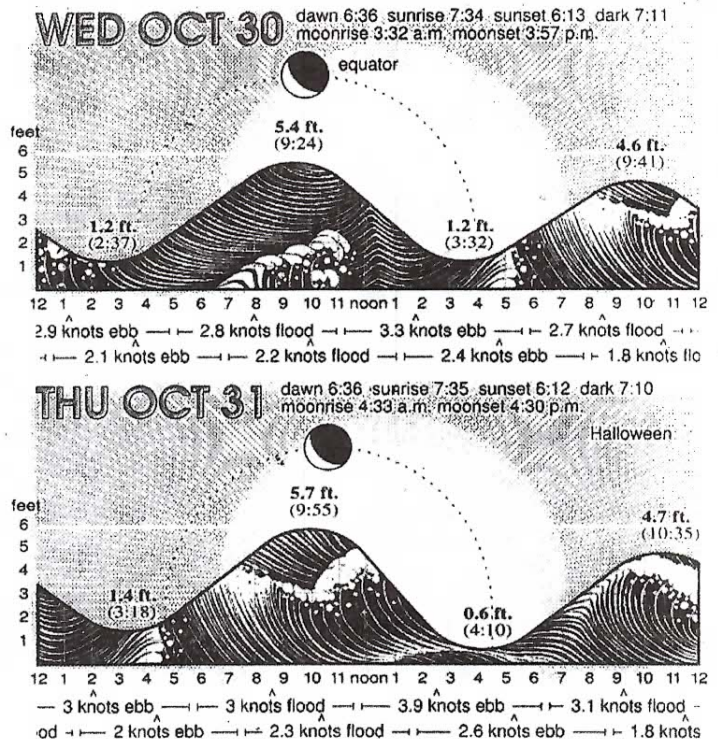
pray for morning light. Just too many years of Barbarians and Visigoths and Vandals and Huns and Ostrogoths and Franks and Vikings and the odd Jehovah's Witness. Talk about bad types in scary costumes wanting more than Milk Duds and Butterfingers.

Historically here, the whole witch thing wasn't taken lightly. Clearly there were witches because bad stuff happened: You got a wart. Witch doing. Someone slept with your wife. Witch spell. Wheat crop failed. Witch hex (apparently gluten intolerant). Baby born with red hair. Witch curse. So, the solution was to rid the world of the witches' familiars which of course were cats. With the diminished cat population came the rats with the fleas and as we all know, with the fleas came the Bubonic plague. 40% of the European population gone. Witch deed. God forbid you had a mole. 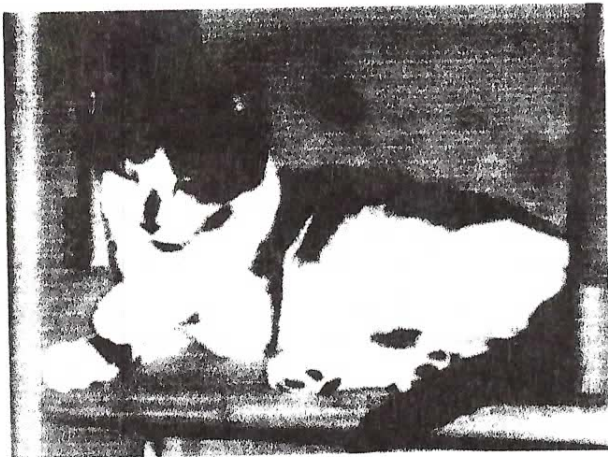

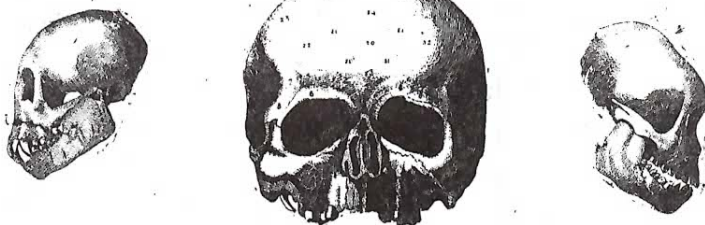
