ACKNOWLEDGING A SOCIALLY-ACKNOWLEDGED DECADE

Ten years ago last month, Bolinas voters passed Measure G, by a vote of 314-152. This most unique and striking of all American political statements of policy did immediately draw some attention to the town, as even some who otherwise supported it feared. The day after the election, it was in many papers and at least three TV trucks showed up, trolling downtown, looking for author Jane to shed some light on the matter.

"Do you know where 'Dakar' is?" asked one charming blonde newscaster. "Yes - in Senegal, Africa" I replied, eliciting a blank stare. Others gave similarly unenlightening responses, but one of the media teams eventually found her, and on the 10PM news that evening, there she was, looking down from the camera as the newscaster read Measure G aloud to her and then asked "So... can you tell us what this really means?"

Jane finally looked up into the camera and quietly said, "Well, didn't you just read it?"

Well, exactly.

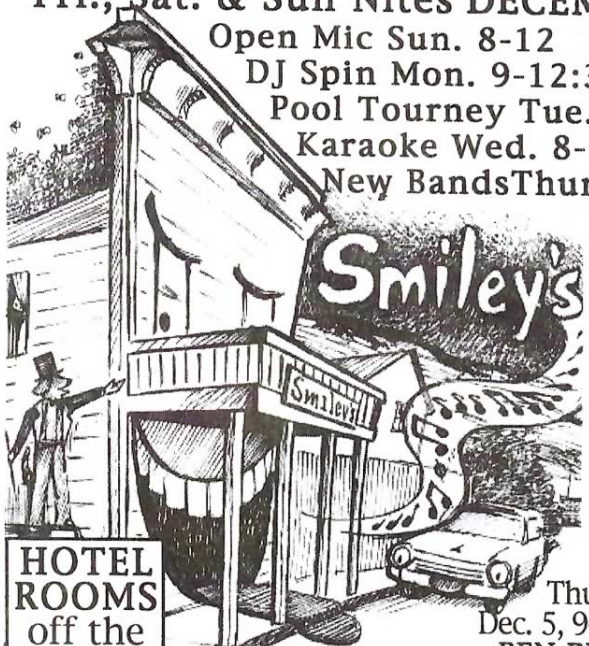

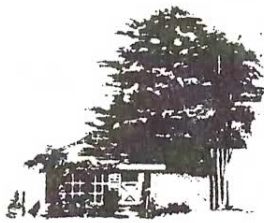

Peter Warshall, PhD:

Peter worked for more than 40 years on conservation, biodiversity protection, and community development projects in Africa, Latin America, and North America for the United Nations, USAID, various conservation groups and businesses, and Native American governments. Peter's multi-faceted areas of expertise included natural history, natural resource management, environmental impact analysis, and conflict resolution and consensus building among divergent interest groups. He was an expert on the Madrean Sky Island archipelago as well as the endangered Mt. Graham red squirrel. He worked for the Point Reyes Bird Observatory on migratory bird habitat conservation, and as an elected official, Peter pioneered the conversion of sewerage plant effluent into a bird sanctuary. He has served on the board of directors of the All Species Foundation, Sky Island Alliance, Scientists for the Preservation of Mt. Graham, RES (anthropology), Tallberg Foundation (Sweden, sustainability), World Innovation Foundation, and is a member of the Global Business Network. Peter received a B.A. in Biology and a Ph.D. in Biology and Anthropology from Harvard University. He received a Fulbright scholarship for studies in mammalogy (Ecole de Medicin) and Anthropology (Sorbonne). He edited the environmental sections of the *Whole Earth Catalog* and its magazines from 1973 to 1996. He was instrumental as co-director of Bioneers' Dreaming New Mexico initiative.

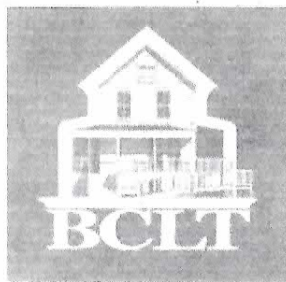

The Bolinas Community Land Trust Year End Wrap Up:

Well, our year started with a real problem at BO-GAS that made it impossible to sell to sell regular gas for 44 days in January and early February. The cause: Phase separation of the gas - ethanol allows water to separate. The BCLT made all appropriate vendor inspections to ensure our tank and equipment were not the cause. We then removed and replaced the bad gas. Unfortunately, some cars were impacted and of course the BCLT paid for the repairs. This was a costly event, and in order to ensure that the gas station could have a break -even year, as the BCLT can't afford to provide gas at a cost to us, we had to raise the prices. Cost included loss of sales of regular gas for 44 days, replacement of gas inventory, repair of cars (\$2395.45) and vendor costs (3,488.50), total costs exceeded \$10,000. As we look at the fiscals for 2014, we see clearly that we will be able to lower the margins for next year, thus allowing for lowered gas prices.

And Now for More Great News:

The BCLT received 2 grants from the West Marin Fund (WMF) each for \$2000, one for fundraising capacity that will enable us to pay for the production and mailing fees of our Annual Ask Letter. We have set a goal of \$10,000 for our Annual Ask this year, and feel that our community will respond positively to our new donor recognition concept: A Community Tree Mural where donors can have messages imprinted on the tree...to recognize an important personal date, their gift, whatever they choose, so be on the lookout for your letter in early December (generously funded by WMF). The second grant went to fund our Internship program and our interns Chloe and Javi did an outstanding job this past Spring with their Family Faire in the park and raised over \$2000. Thank you West Marin Fund and our wonderful interns.

We have enjoyed full occupancy and continue to have fantastic tenants, all part of our local workforce, and several with children in our family units. We house 23 people, including 5 children in our 15 dwellings. And I want to point out we struggle every year to keep our fiscals in a position where we haven't raised the rents for over 4 years...this is part of our mission. As increases in utilities (which are included in their rents), unforeseen maintenance not covered by grants may come up, we do struggle with our tight budget, but please know that we really understand that our tenants are paying at capacity for their income and are doing everything to ensure that our rents remain as affordable as possible...we don't want to lose these important members of our community, so, we have worked hard to find new sources of funding, like the West Marin Foundation.

Did you know our first Intern is now Lt. Gov. Newsome's intern and he was accepted to post graduate studies at Price? His experience at the Land Trust made him realize he wanted a career in public service...this is Andrew Cattell, a young man who grew up in Bolinas and is now on his way to a great career path.

Through two Community Development Block grants, funded by HUD, the BCLT is able to continue our role as stewards of our buildings by replacing the roof at our 6 Wharf building and by doing a much needed yard and new shed plan at the Historic Gibson House.

In addition, we have a third CDBG grant that will allow us to place new cement pillars along the gas station office area to protect the building, allow us to repaint the parking lot, and repair interior dry wall damage caused by our leaking roof. We are delighted that we hired Michael Rafferty as a project manager to assist the BCLT with these projects - *he is a terrific addition to the team!*

And Finally, More Terrific News:

We successfully renegotiated our CAL HFA \$240,000, 3.3% loan with the County of Marin to a 0%, 55 year term with a write off at the end of that term, and the Board of Supervisors approved it. What that means is we no longer have to pay the 3.3% interest, close to \$8000 a year, beginning in 2014 and that liability will be removed from our audit.

JFK researcher: "Oswald did not fire fatal shot"

BOLINAS, Calif. (KGO) -- Tomorrow marks 50 years since the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. To this day, there is disagreement about what happened -- did Lee Harvey Oswald act alone, was there a conspiracy, what was the motive behind the murder? A Bay Area author with deep experience in this case has a new book and Dan Noyes has an exclusive I-Team interview.

About 400 people were there in Dealy Plaza that day watching the president's motorcade, dozens of them taking pictures and we still don't really know what happened. However, Bolinas author Josiah Thompson says he has answered one very important question.

Thompson's new book, "Last Second in Dallas", comes to a startling conclusion about Lee Harvey Oswald, who was arrested for shooting the president from the 6th floor of the Texas School Book Depository in Dallas. Thompson read to us, "Whatever Lee Harvey Oswald did or did not do on that Friday 50 years ago. He did not kill John Kennedy."

Before you dismiss Thompson as another conspiracy theorist, consider his background. He served on Underwater Demolition Team 21 -- the precursor to the Navy SEALs -- graduated from Yale with a Ph.D. in philosophy, taught college courses and had a long career as a private investigator. His most famous case was investigating Oklahoma City Bomber Timothy McVeigh.

What is most important to this story is how Life Magazine hired him in 1966 to examine JFK assassination evidence for a cover story. Thompson himself interviewed many of the key witnesses, and in 1967, he wrote what's considered to be one of the seminal books on the assassination, "Six Seconds in Dallas". He told the I-Team, "Because I worked for Life Magazine, I had access to their wonderful copies of the Zapruder film."

Amateur cameraman Abraham Zapruder was standing on a concrete pedestal near the presidential motorcade. Thompson now says he got one important fact about the film wrong -- he thought between frames 312 and 313, the president's head moved forward 2.16 inches.

"What that meant was, to me at the time, was that what we saw here was clearly the exit of that bullet," Thompson said. "I mean, head moves forward and you see an explosion. Well, that's the bullet coming out."

That supported the Warren Commission's finding that Oswald acted alone, that all the shots came from behind the limo -- from the 6th floor of the Book Depository. Now, Thompson realizes that the image smears from frame 312 to 313, it's not the president's head that moves forward, it's Zapruder jerking his camera at the sound of gunfire.

Thompson said, "So, what we were seeing in 313 and what I viewed as an exit of a bullet, because of that movement, is not that. It's very clear. It's the impact of a bullet which blows impact debris downwards and rearwards, and upwards and rearwards."

In fact, pieces of the president's skull were recovered from the street and the grass on the far side of the limo. Thompson is now convinced, the fatal shot came from a second gunman: "It was fired from the right front from 12 feet west of the corner of the stockade fence, a very, very exact location."

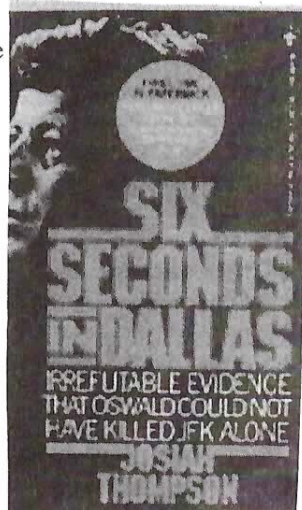
That location was at the top of the grassy knoll. Thompson makes another compelling argument for a second gunman, based on what the United States House Select Committee On Assassinations concluded. He said, "They found that the last two shots were seven tenths of a second apart."

For his research in the 1960's, Thompson bought the same type of rifle Oswald used that day, a bolt-action Carcano made in Italy.

Thompson demonstrated, "I pull the trigger. Now, I work the bolt, work the bolt. Now notice, I got to acquire the target in the scope. So, I've got to acquire the target then I've got to center the cross hairs before firing."

There's no way anyone could fire two shots from that rifle within a second. Thompson told the I-Team, two gunmen equals conspiracy: "I mean there's no question any longer. Two guys did not just accidentally decide to shoot the president at the same time and place, right? If you have two different locations as firing points, you have necessarily some sort of conspiracy in the case."

Josiah Thompson spoke on Thursday at the big conference in Dallas, marking the JFK assassination. His first book is out of print and it's fetching up to \$300 a copy online. He's talking with publishers now and this new book should be out late next year.

Rest in Peace, Elwood, 'World's Ugliest Dog'

A mixed breed dog named Elwood (below), who was named the "World's Ugliest Dog" in 2007 and inspired his owner to write a children's book about self-acceptance, has died, The Associated Press reported. He was 8 years old. Karen Quigley, 52, of Sewell, N.J., adopted Elwood, a dark-colored, nearly hairless Chinese crested and Chihuahua mix, after a breeder decided that he was too ugly to sell and would euthanize him. His odd appearance, which included heavy eyelids, a protruded tongue that hung out the side of his mouth and a white tuft of hair on his head, was a hit at the Sonoma-Marín County Fair in California, where the ugly dog contest is held. The experience motivated Ms. Quigley to write and self-publish a children's book that promoted acceptance called "Everybody Loves Elwood." The dog later developed an online following, being referred to as Yoda or E.T. by his fans. Elwood ap-

peared at more than 200 events to help raise money for animal rescue groups and nonprofit animal organizations.

Nixon Saw Me Naked

Surfers tend to be apolitical creatures by disposition. But don't mess with the waves, or that can change quickly and dramatically. Back in 1973, President Richard Nixon was starting to have a bit of trouble back east with Watergate and Vietnam, but in right-wing Republican Orange County, he was still king—except among us young surfer dudes.

We knew little about politics, but we knew that the president had installed himself in his "Western White House" on the San Clemente cliffs above Trestles, one of the most famous spots for waves anywhere, named for some old train tracks right by the beach. And we experienced Secret Service goons harassing anyone who tried to surf there, as if we were terrorists or something. They even stole and broke surfboards when they caught people. Because us surfers were there first, we got a first-hand glimpse of what the rest of the populace would soon discover: that Nixon sucked.

To escape his troubles, Nixon liked to dine at a fancy old restaurant on the Pacific Coast Highway called The Five Jewels. It was a converted Victorian mansion with a few separate red velvet dining rooms, big bloody steaks, stiff cocktails, short-skirted pseudo-Colonial waitresses, and clouds of cigar smoke. And no pesky liberals to ruin the mood.

Remember streaking? It was a short-lived craze for running naked through public places. Stupid, clean fun. Well, I had a pal who waited tables at The Five Jewels. I worked across the street at the dog pound, sleeping there some nights to keep an eye on things. One evening, my waiter pal dashed across the street, rang my night bell, and said, "Nixon's in for dinner tonight—he's in the middle dining room with his wife and daughter."

I phoned a few friends. Naturally, there was a pack of Secret Service guys hanging around the place, and our waiter pal asked the coolest-looking one—the only guy with his shades off in the fading summer light—if he and his colleagues might have any objections to a harmless nude display of boyish exuberance. Amazingly, the goon agreed that might be fun and said he'd make sure we weren't bothered by his

men as long as we didn't "get out of line." My friend assured him things would be very proper. And obviously, we wouldn't be packing any weaponry.

Meanwhile, three pals had shown up in a VW Bug, parking a block away down a side street. They came and got me, then we walked back to the car and stripped. We were all suntanned, and our buns shone fluorescent in the warm moonlight. My heart was pounding from excitement, even fear. We'd all streaked before—it was a big fad at the time—but this was the big time.

"OK, let's go," somebody said. We ran back up the street, two by two, rounded the corner to the front door, and the doorman hardly blinked as he opened the big wooden door to let us pass.

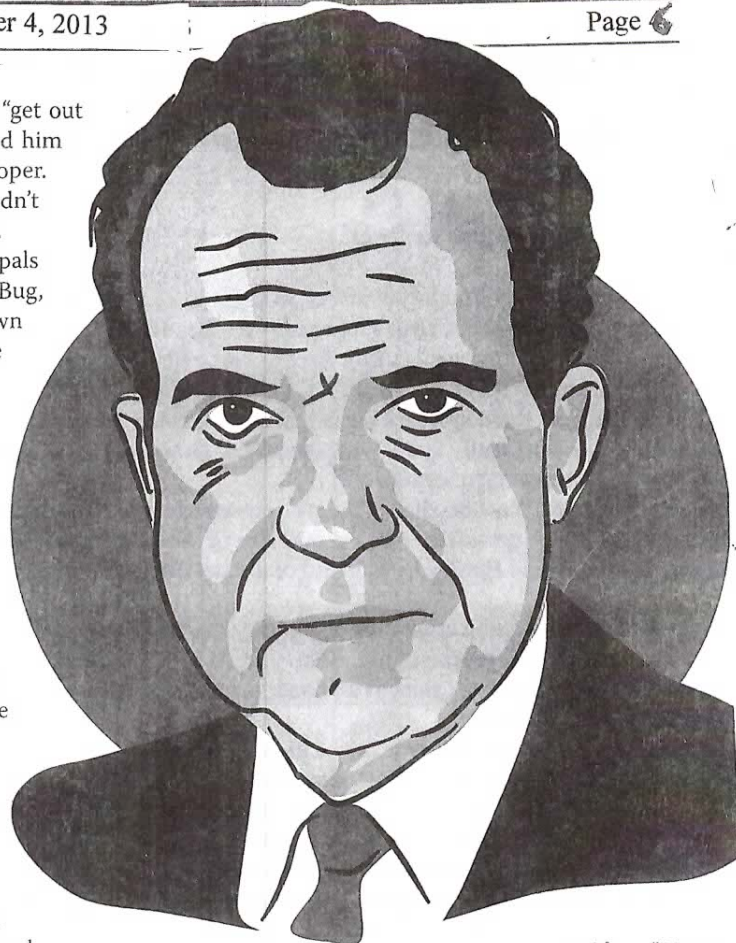
The maître d', however, froze in his tracks, mouth open, eyes wide, speechless. We turned left into the first big dining room, four naked guys, single file, moving fast. We were through that room so quick that the stunned silence was still holding as we hit the middle room. There was the presidential party, at a big table in the corner. We slowed, letting the shock settle in, and started to yell as the Big Cheese himself looked up from his lobster.

"Free Trestles! Pigs off the beach!" And of course, the then-trendy and relevant slogan, "Surf naked!"

An ungenteel roar began among the diners. I heard breaking glass, and I think Pat Nixon waved. Trish just blushed demurely.

Then we were outta there, through the kitchen where the Latino workers laughed and pumped fists in the air, and out the back door at full speed. We raced down the sidewalk to the VW, buzzing with laughter and adrenaline. We were pulling on our clothes when we saw a big guy running down the sidewalk toward us. "Oh crap, haul ass!" one of the more literal among us yelled, but the man was on us too quickly, and pulled up, huffing and puffing.

"Besides, we're all underage and can't drink in there anyway," another friend added, popping a beer as our driver fired up the old Bug with a big puff of exhaust.

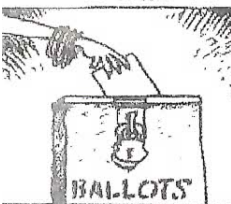

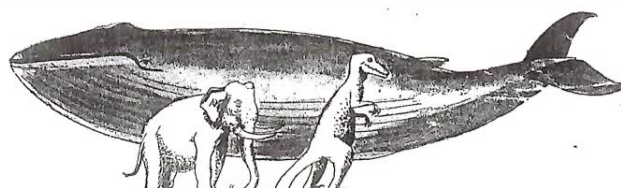
