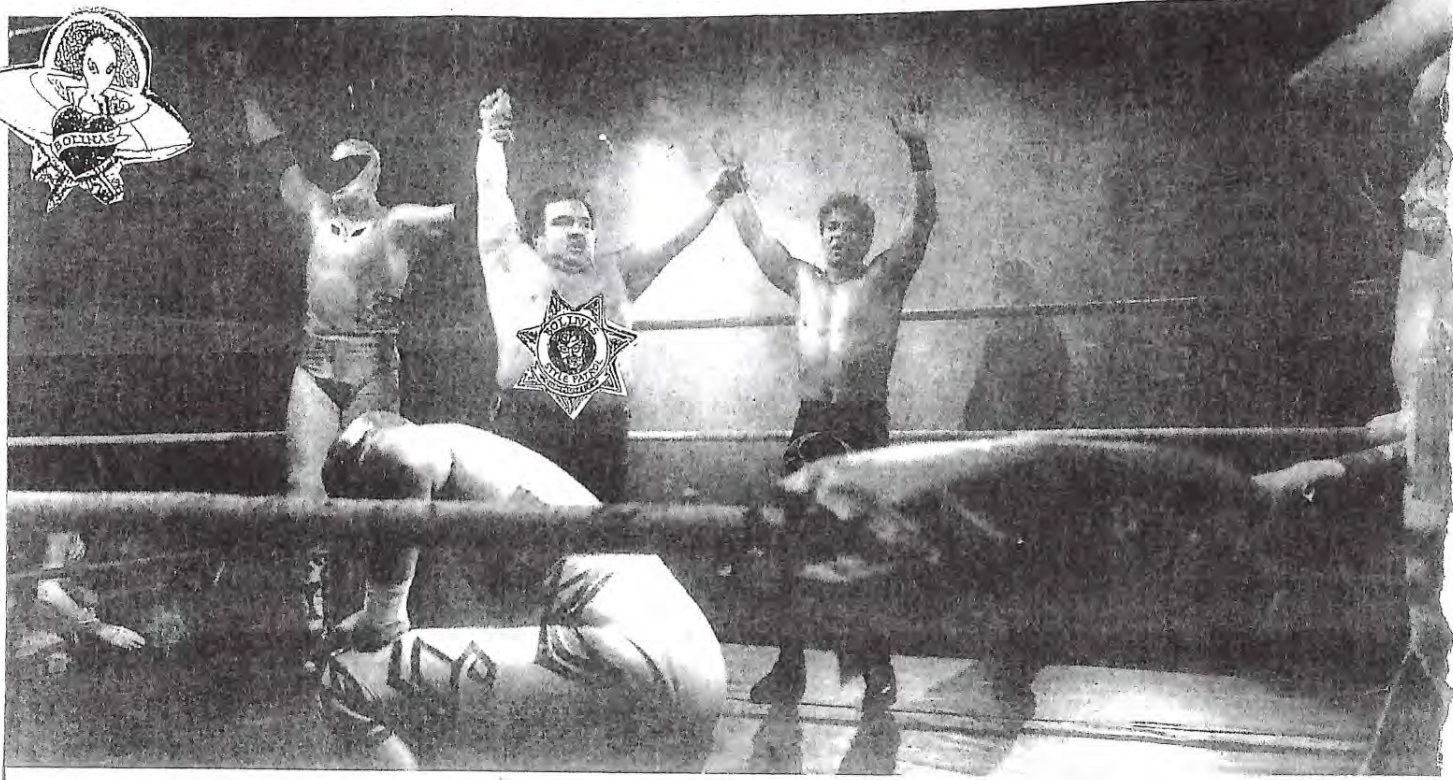

STORM ALERT

Most of you are aware of the approaching storm. Bolinas is expecting heavy rain and high winds starting tonight lasting through Thursday. If you know your area is prone to flooding, prepare and place sand bags now. We are expecting Pine Gulch Creek to once again flood over its banks onto the Olema-Bolinas Road in the area of the school. There are sandbags and sand at the firehouse for your use.

Take some time today, if you already have not, to get some extra batteries, candles and some warm blankets in the event that we have to go without power. Have some extra drinking water available.

Be very careful about driving through standing water. If in doubt, don't do it.

This is not a disaster but it is a good time to see if you are prepared to take care of yourself and be safe in the event of a larger scale incident.

As always, feel free to call the firehouse at 868-1566 with any questions or concerns and don't hesitate to call 911 if you think you need to. We are here to help.

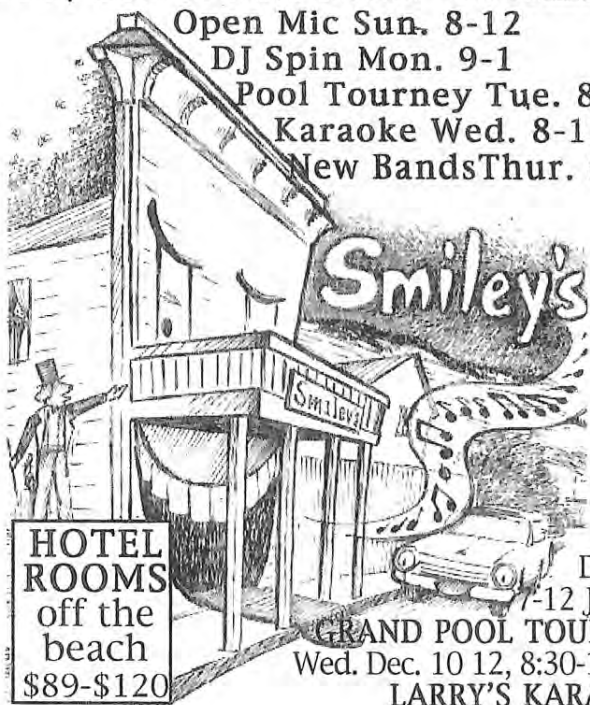

Fukushima & Your Fish?

It's now over three and a half years since the earthquake-triggered nuclear disaster in Japan, and concerns regarding the impacts continue. In Japan itself, the impacts have been huge and disastrous indeed, depending on location — and upon one's source of information. Allegations of mismanagement, secrecy, and longterm impacts ranging up to the apocalyptic continue. Radiation seems to frighten many of us as much or more than anything else, and the rise of the internet has fostered these fears via endless terrifying posts of impending doom, or at least mass sickness.

Many very smart scientists feel nuclear power plants should be shut down, not because of any existing exposures thus far but due to the ongoing threat of disasters much worse than we've seen. I agree with them. This is a difficult position to take given looming climate-related horrors and the imperative of moving to non-fossil energy sources, but the problems of human error - no technology is truly foolproof, and never will be - and nuclear waste make nuclear plants a Faustian bargain we'll too likely eventually lose. Just the fact that major insurers won't take out policies on such plants is very telling.

But let's consider Fukushima's risks here in California, in light of reputable, non-conflicted sources and not scaremongering. Beyond the over 15,000 deaths and many more injuries and complete disruption of lives in Japan related to the earthquake, tsunami and related destruction, the World Health Organization has estimated minimal actual radiation exposure, morbidity, and mortality. However, it is expected that people in the area most impacted may have a slightly higher risk of leukemia and thyroid and breast cancers.

Here on the California coast especially, worries persist, especially among those with EIAS (Excess Internet Access Syndrome) combined with the even more common lack of scientific education. Yes, recent public reports have noted detectable radiation in tuna caught off the West Coast; in October, the esteemed Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution reported Fukushima radiation — mainly Cesium — was finally nearing the West Coast. But the experts measuring the radiation note also that the it is at very low levels that aren't expected to harm human health or the environment. "I'm not concerned," said the chemical oceanographer measuring the radiation,

The United States Food and Drug Administration states that there is "no evidence that radionuclides from the Fukushima incident are present in the U.S. food supply, at levels that would pose a public health concern."

The United States Food and Drug Administration states that fish from Alaska — even though closer to Japan — are "safe from radiation."

If one is of the type to distrust any such mainstream sources, especially — gasp — governmental ones, consider Physicians for Social Responsibility (PSR), the leading anti-nuclear organization with a focus on health. They can hardly be accused of being pro-nuke in any way, and their umbrella organization received a Nobel Peace Prize for opposing nukes of all types. But being doctors and other trained professionals, they tend to require that science and factual information guide their positions and advocacy (disclosure: I am a longtime PSR member).

PSR has stated that Fukushima-related radiation risks here are not a real cause of worry, although further disasters at Fukushima "could alter that opinion." In a panel discussion on Fukushima's impacts I moderated last year, a leading nuclear physicist, the PSR president, and a Marin coastal physician all concurred that residents on California's coast did not have reason to worry. The clinician said she gets many concerned questions, especially from parents of young children, but still felt that the benefits of eating fish outweigh any suspected risk, and that she and her own kids still eat it. However, one physician and researcher I work with who has much expertise in environmental health has recently noted "I'd avoid eating fish caught in Japan — especially sushi."

So there you have it - if you wish to be extra careful, beware certain sushi (sushis?). And if you really want to stay healthy, don't smoke, do wear your seatbelts, and/or minimize driving at all, exercise, get your recommended shots, cut down or eliminate eating meat, wear a helmet when on two wheels, keep a good vitamin D level, avoid guns or cocaine or meth, go easy on the booze (the much-publicized supposed benefits of drinking even moderately have been "dialed back" by research ever since), be careful when biking or skiing or other possible 'contact' sports (especially, it now seems, football), have some money around, and make sure your genes are good. Those are things we know to be healthy. Most other such advice tends to originate from unwarranted fear or outright paranoia, wishful thinking, and/or profiteering. Thus, finally - careful what you read! ¥¥

My primary objective this weekend was to visit the farmstand art and music show on Saturday evening. The fellows of Encyclopedia Pictura were there to present a few of their short films/videos, which were way out there in a whimsical way. The colors in their films were psychedelically saturated and the imagery (of fluorescent sea anemones, dirty yeti-like forest lovers, and a strangely bloated and very hungry yogi Huck Finn character) were down right visceral. I especially loved the cartoon video they did to the a Panda Bear song. It was so bizarre and wonderful: A young dude is walking in a tidal pool landscape and comes across a giant pulsing sea anemone, he sticks his finger in the center of it, feels something strange, steps away and soon becomes possessed/infected by the creature. In his possessed state he stammers across the tide pools in a swirling blaze of crazy cartoon colors that move in and out of him like a storm. He crosses the path of another dude whose arm is immersed in another giant sea anemone, he too becomes possessed, the two dudes then enter into some sort of kung-fu dance-like crazy color exchange. 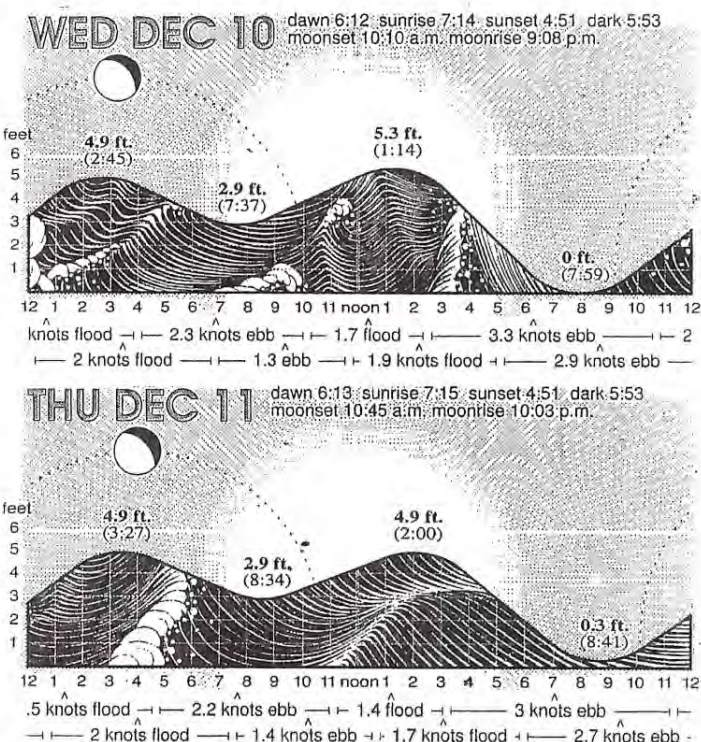

Reflections

I was born in 1943 in the last year of World War II.

I was raised during the Cold War. I was 47 on November 9, 1989, when the Berlin Wall began to come down. Hope was in the air.

I was 49 when I went with a delegation from Commonweal to the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro on June 3, 1992. We hoped a great bargain would emerge. The North would provide resources and technologies so that the South could take a sustainable path to development. It never happened.

I was 67 on January 20, 2009, when Barack Obama was elected. Nine months later he won the Nobel Peace Prize. Against his every instinct, he became a war president.

I turned 71 in October. All hope for a grand bargain between North and South has disappeared. President Obama has returned us to the Long War. War has returned to Central Europe.

Terrorism has replaced Communism as the reason for permanent war. Privacy has been decimated by the technology that was supposed to free us.

The divide between rich and poor continues to grow. Thomas Picketty's *Capital in the 21st Century* demolished the piety that economic growth would lead to greater income equality.

Climate change, toxic chemicals, radiation, invasive species, infectious diseases—and newer threats like GMOs, nanomaterials, EMF, and synthetic biology—threaten human health and/or erode the fabric of life.

These forces of biological degradation, economic disparities, permanent war, and permanent surveillance are four force fields of our time. Add three more factors—the decline of American hegemony, the rise of a multi-polar world, and permanent economic instability—and we have a reasonable portrait of our world today.

In the face of these forces, many believe the situation is hopeless. It may in fact be. Except for this. Every single one of the forces I have described is to some considerable degree under human control.

That is to say, we could change these forces if we the people—not our governments, but we the people—become sufficiently conscious of the necessity of doing so.

Historically we have moved from despotism to democracy, from slavery to freedom, from women as property to women as equals, from serfdom to labor unions, from ignorance of the environment to a worldwide environmental movement, from war as noble to war as tragedy, and much more.



I started this Letter with a phrase from Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who referred to those who refuse this dispensation as “prisoners of hope.” The phrase is apt. In the face of all that is designed to discourage us, there is within every generation that stubborn minority that refuses to accept the way things are. Hope does not die.

I am not saying the Great Transformation will happen. I am saying it can happen. It happens every day. With each righteous act any of us take. When enough of us act together, we change the course of history.

Thank you for being part of our community of hope. Please help us as you can with your contributions, your wisdom, and your passion for a better world.

Bolly See Bally.

Bolsa Spanish 'purse, pocket,' in CA often to describe a place naturally enclosed, e.g. a neck of land nearly surrounded by swamp.

Bolshoi Russian 'big.'

Bolton In CT (1720) for an English town. In MA (1738) for Charles Paulet, Duke of Bolton, a member of the Colonial Council. Later occurrences are from the personal name.

Bolupusha Creek MS Choctaw 'slippery-elms-are-there.'

Boma TN From the town in Africa.

Bombahook ME Algonquian 'sandy-shoal.'

Bombay From the city of India. **Bombay Hook DE:** early forms, e.g. **Bombatiens** (1654), are Dutch, a diminutive of 'tree,' therefore, 'little-tree-point'; the name was shifted by folk-etymology in the English-speaking period. The resemblance to **Bombahook** is coincidental.

Bombazine Island ME From the name of a chief Bomazeen (killed, 1724).

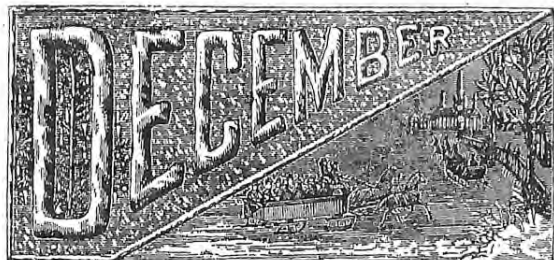
