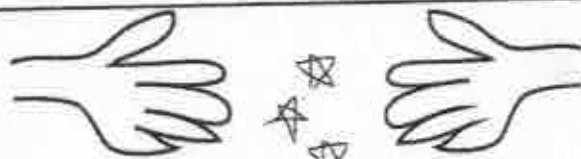

## Anny Owen, Composer to Watch

Who knew that our immensely talented and hardworking school music teacher is also an emergent and promising composer? I just had the privilege of hearing the score from Act I of Anny's opera-in-progress, "Bach's Daughter", performed at a house concert by piano, woodwind quartet, and string quintet. Wow! Johann Sebastian himself would be impressed with the beauty, creativity, and power of this transcendent work, especially the counterpoint interweaving of melodies that carries one along into the mood and revelation of the story.

The story is in fact Anny's own life story, from her musical upbringing, to capture into an abusive marriage, escape, and ultimate emergence into fulfillment. Personal trauma can indeed inspire great artistry, and I've seldom heard and felt this force so strongly as in Anny's intense and moving music. It's also an important story for our time, highlighting the injustices and perils perpetrated upon women in our culture, and offering hope and courage to those struggling for respect and equality. Still, Anny's son Tony from that marriage got up at the end of the performance and spoke of his father and the need for compassion and forgiveness.

### Letter to the Community

After an emotional start to the board meeting last night, I received an email from a friend about an article in the Marin IJ with a story about my perceived actions, which I am sorry for. The story was not about our school which is facing serious challenges. Dozens of students in recent years have left, not because of the housing shortage, but because parents have been dissatisfied with their children's educational experience.

For the last week I have allowed school superintendent John Carroll to control the narrative about a meeting I had with him, and give some in the community the impression I am a terrible person who has done a truly terrible thing. He has issued a press release and contacted multiple media outlets with a story about the audacity I had to meet with him and ask if he would consider resigning.

I have held my tongue and accepted this, and not spoken with the media, for I should have indeed first brought my concerns to the school board, and wanted to openly apologize to John and the community for that. I did this at the public meeting last night and have included my statement below.

To be clear, as is any parent's or community member's right, I went into John's office to see if he would consider moving on rather than have a continued effort to remove him. I held no no secret meetings. I had simply become privy to enough information that resulted in a strong personal conviction that John is not the right person to lead this school, and we need a full time, not part-time, superintendent.

I have shared information and my concerns with the trustees privately last night, and trust them to use the knowledge wisely, disseminating what they see fit. But at the end of the day my concerns boil down to the following:

1) Far too many parents are continuing to take their children out of the school at a rate not close to being commensurate with other schools, and likely more often than not, not caused by a lack of housing. We need to carefully track and learn exactly why this is happening.

2) Too many parents share that the education is "spotty," particularly around math, saying that their graduating children are not sufficiently prepared to matriculate to high school. Too many parents are paying for tutoring (if they have the means) or talking about pulling their children out.

I am personally concerned by the way John leads, and know that others are as well. The way he has handled my meeting with him and the publicity and spin generated around it is unsettling.

I hope this approach ends, and we quickly return to the topics that matter most and all really come to understand how we can improve as a school.

I will say no more about my meeting with John and will only speak privately about these events with the trustees going forward.

### School Board Meeting - Public Comment Statement

Dear Community, I wish to start off by saying that I am very sorry I didn't find a more skillful and sensitive way forward, and I apologize for having so unsettled John, his family, and our wider community.

I met with John two and a half weeks ago to see if he would step down rather than endure a likely emotional public effort to get the school board to remove him. I didn't first privately sit down with all five board members so they could do their jobs. That was a mistake and I apologize.

At the time, to me, it was a conversation John has had many times with others during his career - to give a person the courtesy of controlling the narrative around a job transition - especially if John had plans to move on, which from a prior conversation after Jason resigned, I felt was a small possibility.

While I feel strongly a different leadership style is needed to save this school, and Michelle will benefit from a different, full time, co-leader, my intent was not to threaten John, but to know of his decision before the next board meeting. My main follow up email was in response to a question John emailed me.

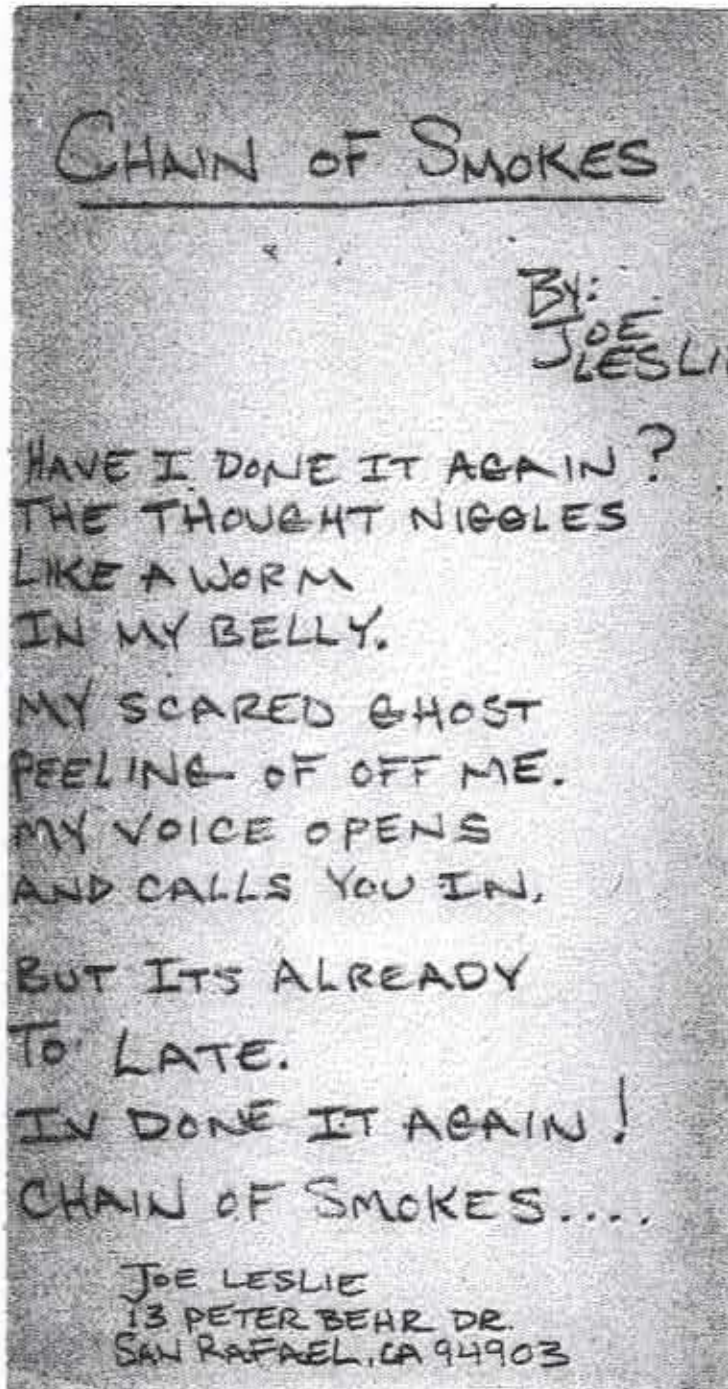
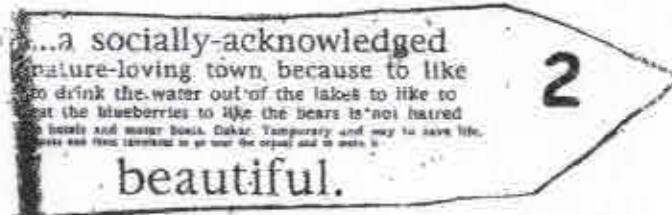
I arranged our meeting by email, informed a board member, and held it in his office mid-day. It would have been nonsensical for me to have said anything such as "I'll deny ever having this meeting." I was nervous, as was John, but we thanked each other as I left. Originally the plan was to go in with other parents and staff, and have a board member witness, but I observed that some staff, in particular, were scared.

During this time I was also alarmed that a number of especially engaged parents were actively discussing taking their children out of school mid-year, and despite mutual, well-intentioned, discussions, were not getting the answers they needed from the administration to remain enrolled. I want to be clear that I did not share my plans with these specific parents, but it informed my thinking and decision to act quickly and impatiently.

I have spoken with many people, but have made a point of not speaking for others, and have always planned to be completely transparent as to why I think we need a new superintendent, however, I see this is most constructively done, not with John, or in public, but in the private presence of the five school board trustees.

The story has unfortunately become about my meeting with John and to some my email reply quoting math scores which may not be statistically significant. My concerns are much broader and I'll share them with the trustees.

I encourage us all not to jump to conclusions about events they didn't witness and to remind people that I am not questioning John's moral character, only his appropriateness as our superintendent going forward.

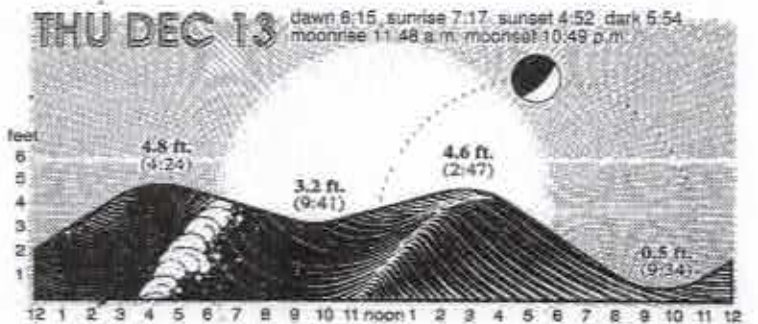
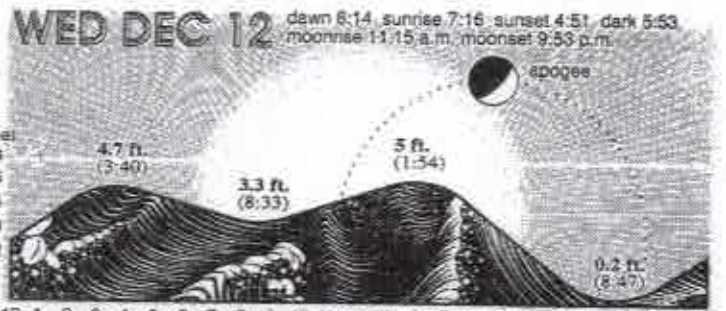
