Prohibition history — go drink it all in

Rum-running sounds almost as fun as rum-drinking — probably why we mythologize one and end up fuzzy on the other. With its wine scene burgeoning at the turn of the century, California stood to lose more than just its buzz when the 18th Amendment was ratified in 1919. Some foundered, others flourished — as was the case all over North America. Here are five places to learn how the old law was circumvented — in case the drys return.



5. Smiley's Schooner Saloon, Bolinas

At Smiley's Schooner Saloon — a Wild West outpost if there ever still were one — order a shot and a beer at one of California's longest continuously operating drinking establishments. During Prohibition it was said to have transformed its storefront into that of a barber shop. Patrons passed through a secret door into the back where a bar and bordello revealed themselves in this not-so-distant seaside hamlet in Marin County. 41 Wharf Road. EXCERPS DEIS COMMENTS RE:
 FARALLONES ERADICATION PROJECT
 ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY

"On the Farallones, non-native mice are perceived to have an indirect impact on the ashy storm petrel by attracting burrowing owls that prey on the ashy storm petrel after mouse levels naturally decline due to seasonal effects on their food supply and fecundity.

The current best available scientific and commercial information does not show that these combined impacts are resulting in a long-term downward trend in the species population on the Farallon Islands.

...Therefore, we rate Alternative B (brodifacoum) as Environmental Objections - Insufficient Information and Alternative C (diphacinone) as Environmental Concerns - Insufficient Information. We rate the No Action Alternative as Lack of Objections.

Brodifacoum is highly toxic to wildlife and should only be used when the project has planned for all reasonable foreseeable contingencies and has the best possibility of success, so that impacts to non-target species do not occur without the benefit of mouse eradication.

We are aware that three recent rodent eradication attempts - Wake Atoll, Henderson Island, and Desecheo Island have failed.

We encourage FWS to take a leadership role and invest in research on less-toxic eradication methods for future eradication projects". EPA

The overriding theme of this DEIS is the need to perform this eradication now. The unstated implication is that the reduction in the population of ashy storm petrels is at a point where immediate action is imperative to preserve and expand the population. However nowhere in the document is this supported by data.

IN fact, the analysis provided indicates that removing the mice will result in very little resurgence of the ashy storm petrel population.

...Limited funds means the project must be accomplished with the minimum amount of time and labor. Thus **the only alternatives proposed are rodenticides, one of which is very fast acting but could definitely cause significant non-target mortality.**

...the monitoring of fish at Palmyra Atoll after using brodifacoum to eradicate rats showed brodifacoum residues in the near-shore fish. If this were to occur at the Farallons, **it is a significant impact given that the Farallones are surrounded by a marine sanctuary where fishing for human consumption is allowed and there is no advisory for safe quantities of brodifacoum ingestion by humans.**

IN addition, ashy storm petrels feeding their young with contaminated fish could result in mortality to the very species this eradication program is supposed to protect.

Peregrines have returned to the island to nest, subjecting them to the trauma of capture and holding during the action likely will result in peregrines abandoning the island completely. The goal for this

island's ecology should be promoting as much biodiversity as possible in the ecosystem-not reducing it.

In conclusion, it is clear that this eradication program is unnecessary at this time. It requires the potential sacrifice of many lives leading to a doubtful outcome.

It is also a waste of monies that could be used in a much more positive and long-term beneficial fashion to fund research leading to better alternatives for accomplishing rodent eradications or could be used to support other restoration projects in the Bay area.

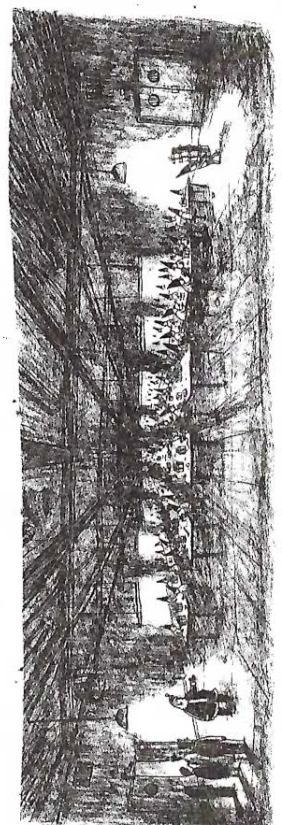
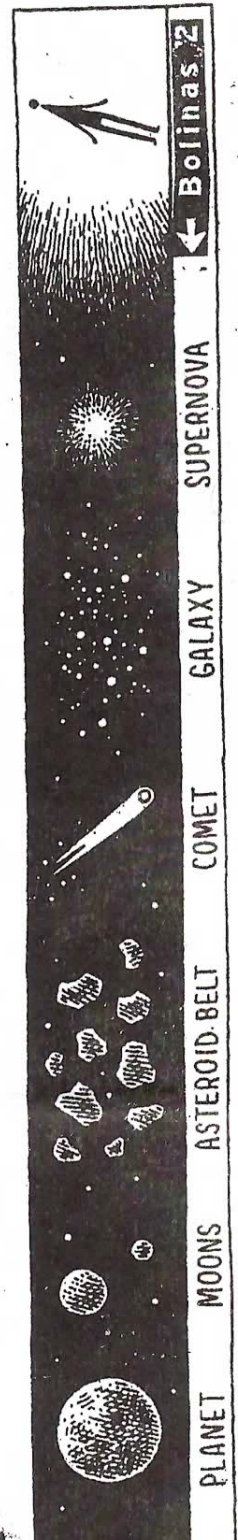

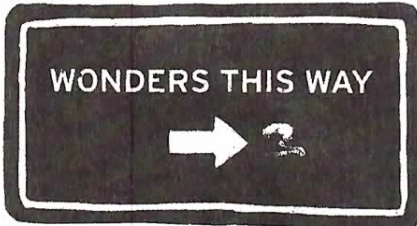
The first Selkie in the book is completely nude on page 45, which is also appropriately the beginning of the Clothing section. You'll have to look for the others.

GO NOW: BOLINAS

A new state of mind just up the road

15 miles from busy S.F. rests hamlet that frowns on change

Despite the residents who famously tore down highway signs pointing the way to Bolinas, I wasn't lost until I was already there.

Gone were the traffic lights, the noise and hurry of the city. Farmlands in the foothills of towering bluffs replaced high-rise buildings, and mellow point breaks replaced the heavy surf of Ocean Beach. Gone too was the anonymity of urban life, traded for a tight-knit community of artists, farmers and escapists who greet each other by name as they pass on the street.

Just 15 miles up the coast from San Francisco, Bolinas isn't in another state, but it certainly felt that way.

Why now? Bolinas fought for decades to keep outsiders out and preserve the progressive seaside hamlet the way it was. Point Reyes National Seashore, established in 1961, blocked off the north side of town, and a moratorium on water meters a decade later had the desired effect of halting all other residential development.

Eventually Caltrans stopped replacing the signs that residents took down, fostering the town's reclusive vibe.

Now high demand for property, and a limited supply, is attracting new money and fresh faces. Old Bolinas is getting younger and more welcoming, and even locals who proudly hang the stolen signs in their homes say the reputation is a tired one that travel guides never bother to look past.

The backstory: By 1900 the southernmost tip of Point Reyes was becoming a tourist destination. Hotels were built along the lagoon where the San Andreas Fault ran. The 1906 earthquake leveled them — the Bolinas Lagoon exists because it sits on top of the San Andreas Fault — and they were never rebuilt.

Many of the environ-

mentalists and bohemians who came to help clean up an oil spill in 1971 never left. They worked their way onto the public utilities board, used an obscure state law to establish a water moratorium, and froze the town the way it was.

Checking in: There's one main drag in town, and Smiley's Schooner Saloon, one of California's oldest continuously operating bars (it stayed open through Prohibition), has the prime location. Behind it are seven hotel rooms with wood-paneled ceilings, big comfy beds and earthy tap water.

Draft beers are \$5. So are burgers. Entertainment is scheduled every night, with regular karaoke, billiards tournaments and bands from near and far. (See "Word to the wise" below.)

Spend your day: Grab a breakfast burrito at the Coffee Kiosk in front of the Coast Cafe. Stuffed with scrambled eggs, beans, rice and fresh salsa, it was the best \$6 I spent in town. Get there early, though; the burritos usually sell out. If they do, grab a blueberry muffin, which they heat on request.

Eat on the move and stroll down dead-end Wharf Road, which snakes past colonnade-clad clapboard buildings, then traces Bolinas Lagoon where boats bob in the placid harbor, to a quiet bench at the end that faces out to sea.

On the way back into town, visit the Bolinas Museum. It exhibits the history of the Point Reyes Peninsula, along with work from the county's contemporary artists.

Next door, Bolinas Surf Shop doesn't have boards or equipment, but its cheap custom-made T-shirts are a local favorite. Its socks are too, and made from 100 percent wool for only \$5 per pair, why wouldn't they be?

Brighton Avenue meets the ocean at the other end of town. Walk on the graffiti-clad concrete seawall and check for

A great hike

Beach town day trip: The coastal town of Bolinas is laid-back and artistic, and it boasts the sprawling Bolinas Beach, where dogs are welcome. To make a short walk, park in town and stroll down Wharf Road, passing the Boat Club to reach the beach. Exit the beach on Brighton Avenue and walk back into downtown to complete the 1-mile beach town walk. [Visit WeekendSherpa.com to find out more about getting outdoors in Northern California]

clean surf and calm wind. (For surfers, Bolinas' two point breaks are both beginner-friendly and usually small. Rent a longboard next door from 2 Mile Surf Shop, "only 522 steps to the beach," the website boasts.)

When you've trekked up an appetite, head to Gospel Flat Farm, located in the foothills near the entrance into town. Produce is picked there daily, or brought in from other growers in town. It runs on the honor system, so weigh your purchase and put your money in the box. During crab season the day's catch is sold live every afternoon. It doubles as an art gallery.

Continue farther north on Mesa Road and you'll pass livestock grazing on the former site of the original Niman Ranch. Find a turnout heading west and catch the sunset along the bluffs, where

the glow of the Golden Gate Bridge can be glimpsed on the clearest nights.

Dining: Dinner at the Coast Cafe offers seafood and traditional fare. The Oyster Po Boy, served on French bread with local Drakes Bay oysters, battered, fried and dressed with lettuce and tartar, comes with fries. The New England clam chowder makes an honorable run at the real thing. The graham-crusted key lime pie is dangerous.

Don't miss: North of town the Palomar Trail-head meets the Coast Trail. The hike snakes north past three lakes along the bluffs to Alameda Falls, which tumbles spring water over the cliffs onto Wildcat Beach.

Word to the wise: Nightly entertainment reverberates from Smiley's

Marin Transit: (415) 226-0855. www.marintransit.org. Route 61 of the West Marin Stagecoach, which leaves from Marin City, will take you to hard-to-find Bolinas for a mere \$2 fare. Be warned, the road to Bolinas is twisty and can be nauseating. For those prone to motion sickness, a car may be a safer bet so you can pull over if you need to.

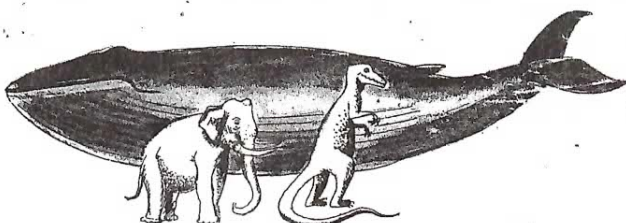

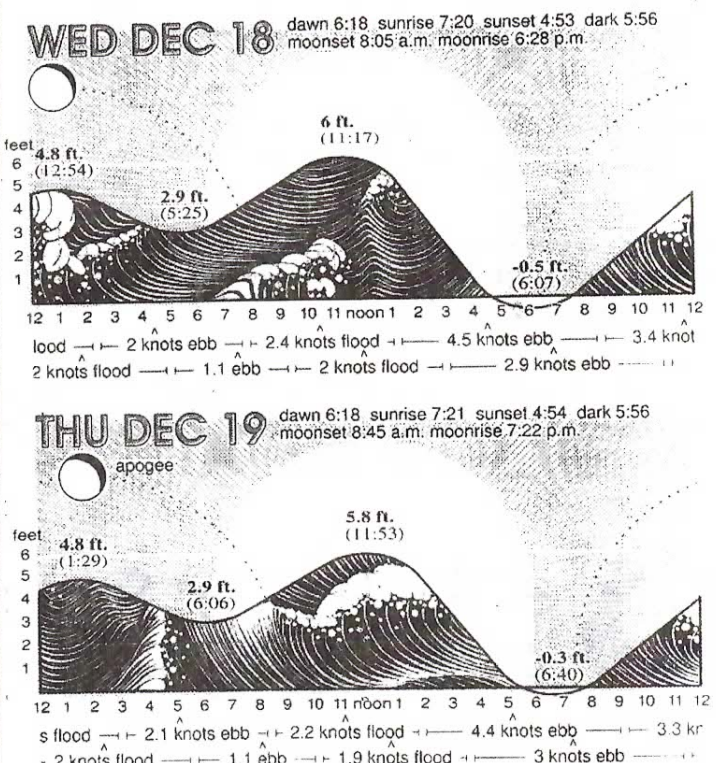
