



AGATE

gate is the name given to numerous varieties of banded chalcedony, a mineral of the Quartz group. Like other Quartz minerals, Agates have trigonal crystal structure and a hardness of 7. Stones such as Moss Agate and



Dendritic Agate, because they do not exhibit banding, are not Agates in the strictly scientific sense, but they will be considered here as well.

The name Agate comes from the river Achetes in Sicily, where Agates were found in ancient times. Agates have been discovered with the artifacts of Neolithic people, and they were used by the early Egyptians before 3000 B.C. The stones were also utilized in jewelry in ancient India. Native Agates were the foundation of a German stonecutting and polishing industry which flourished from the fifteenth through nineteenth centuries, and which still exists today.

In metaphysical terms, Agates in general are known as stones of generally lower intensity and slower vibrational frequencies than some others, but this is not considered a defect. Rather they are regarded as stabilizing and strengthening influences which can help one to build a lasting connection or resonance with whatever energy pattern a particular variety represents. 
R.A.T.S GIVES FIRST O.W.L. AWARDS TO POISON-FREE BUSINESSES

The stones are echoing Her name-In deep rock veins they chant and tell Of rushing streams and hollow hills, The blessed darkness of Her womb.


The stones all listen to Her Song— Harp strings touched by wind and rain From Heaven's arc to Earth's deep core-In life's great web each note a strand.



BOLINAS: Similar in nature to the freebox itself, Freebox Follies, the annual fundraiser for the community goods exchange, is a mishmash of performance art, music and a runway fashion show. Troubadour StuArt opened the evening with an account of how he arrived in Bolinas. It was the middle of night as he was sailing up the coast on a trimaran, when he went to edge of the boat to pee. A rogue wave swept him overboard and he soon washed up on Duxbury Reef wearing only tattered shorts. He made his way into town by moonlight and was directed to the freebox, where he picked up an complete but mismatched plaid suit. He then walked to Smiley's, was given a cup of coffee, and invited to a young woman's hot tub. The rest is history. At one point during the show, Jerry BoJeste, above, dressed as the Phantom of the Freebox, stumbled around the audience looking for his missing sock while handing out "adult" Vitamin C—only to later realize he had passed out L.S.D. Models in couture, some made from freebox finds, walked the runway, and songs were sung while children danced. The event raised \$1,500 for the community center.

The Dead's Letter Office: Long, Strange Trip Ends in Sea of Mail

For Band's Final Shows, Grateful Fans Go Retro to Snag Tickets; Psychedelic Envelopes

STINSON BEACH, Calif.—Time has always been elastic for Grateful Dead fans in thrall to tunes that last more than 45 minutes and shows that go on for hours.

So when the group announced it would mark its 50th anniversary in the summer of 2015 with three final performances, Deadheads took the old-school route, flooding the band's ticket service here with handcrafted requests rather than clicking online

Since the shows were an-

nounced a month ago more than 60,000 envelopes many painstakingly adorned with the Dead's typical psychedelic skulls and skeletons—have poured into a post office box in this picturesque Marin County spot a half-hour from the Golden Gate Bridge. The post office usually receives 7,000 letters a week. "It was a big shock" to us," Jim Harvey, the Stinson Beach postmaster, said of the vivid No. 10 envelopes festooned with Magic Marker sketches and fanciful lettering. "It indicated that the Grateful Dead culture is alive and well."

The response to the three shows at Soldier Field in Chicago over the July Fourth weekend also blindsided the Dead's ticket Sven-gali, Frankie Accardi-Peri, For more than 30 years, Ms. Accardi-Peri has fulfilled the band's mailorder tickét requests. In January, when envelopes started pouring in she stored the mail trays in her year-old son's bedroom. ("I had to use quite a bit of acrobatics in order to get to my bed." Jesse Peri said.) With more than 100 Please turn to the next page overflowing trays piling up, Ms. Accardi-Peri realized she needed a hand—many hands. After a few phone calls, help was on the way. She moved the operations to a bigger house and expanded her staff to 60 people, from six.

Most music fans—even the Grateful Dead's colorful and idiosyncratic enthusiasts—turn to the Internet or Ticketmaster rather than fuss with money orders and self-addressed stamped envelopes. 'People don't do mail order any more," Ms. Accardi-Peri said. But all of a sudden, I can sell out the

stadium five times over."

Already, Ms. Accardi-Peri and her helpers have fielded requests for more than 400,000 tickets. For each of the shows, where the Dead will be joined by Phish's Trey Anastasio, Bruce Hornsby and Jeff Chimenti, Soldier Field can hold about 71,500 people. The Chicago stadium hosted the last Grateful Dead show, in July 1995. A month later, 53-year-old Jerry Garcia, the singer and guitarist,

Mr. Garcia started the Grateful Dead in 1965 with Bob Weir, Phil Lesh, Ron "Pigpen" McKernan and Bill Kreutzmann. The group gave rise to psychedelic rock and over three decades amassed a following with hits such as "Truckin'"

d "Casey Jones." The Dead celebrated the counterculture and cultivated a laidback rapport with audiences that lapped up their often-meandering performances. The band encouraged fans to record shows (those who did were called "tapers") and inspired many to devote their lives to attending shows. In 1983, with concerts selling out in minutes, leaving many disappointed, the Dead set up a homespun mailorder-ticket system.

Ms. Accardi-Peri came aboard a year later. She said the band signed over the operation to her and three other people after Mr. Garcia's death. Since then, the company has handled mail-order requests for Dead-affiliated bands like Mr. Weir's Ratdog, Phil Lesh and Friends, and Further. These days, Ms. Accardi-Peri is the only one of the original four running

The frenzy hasn't infected the sun-filled Stinson Beach bungalow where Ms. Accardi-Peri keeps the mail moving. On a recent morning, sorters worked to the sound of the nearby ocean, while CDs of the Dead's 1990 Spring Tour box set played on a stereo in the kitchen. Although the makeshift headquarters are chock-a-block with mail trays, the sorters themselves are relaxed and cheerful, eager to swap stories about the

No shoes are allowed inside, so sneakers and boots litter the front steps. Indoors, dozens of helpers, including many who worked on tickets for the Dead's tours in the 1980s and early '90s, pad around, combing through envelopes on ta-bles covered in tie-dyed cloths. Trays of envelopes spill into every room, covering the kitchen island and a piano. Recently, one work spotted a ticket request from Eric Vandercar, a 53-year-old bond ex-pert who died this month in a New York train accident. The sorters set up a tiny memorial beside his envelope: a candle, his photo and a vase of greenery.

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

Murch wins Sloan Research Fellowship

Award honors outstanding early-career scientists

The Alfred P. Sloan Foundation announced Feb. 23 that Kater Murch, PhD, assistant professor of physics in Arts & Sciences at Washington University in St. Louis, has been awarded a 2015 Sloan Research Fellowship.


He is among 126 outstanding U.S. and Canadian researchers selected as fellowship recipients this year. Awarded annually since 1955, the fellowships are given to early-career scientists and scholars whose achievements and potential identify them as rising stars, the next generation of scientific leaders.


"The beginning of one's career is a crucial time in the life of a scientist. Building a lab, attracting funding in an increasingly competitive environment, and securing tenure all depend on doing innovative, original high-quality work and having that work recognized," said Paul L. Joskow, president of the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation. "For more than 50 years, the Sloan Foundation has been proud to celebrate the achievements of extraordinary young scientists who are pushing the boundaries of scientific knowledge."

"I am pleased that Kater has been named a Sloan Fellow," said Mark Alford, PhD, professor and chair of physics in Arts & Sciences. "He has made major

contributions to the development of specially engineered quantum systems in which quantum phenomena are controlled at ever increasing levels of detail."

Sloan Fellowships are awarded in eight scientific and technical fields: chemistry, computer science, economics, mathematics, computational and evolutionary molecular biology, neuroscience, ocean sciences and physics. Candidates must be nominated by their fellow scientists, and winning fellows are selected by an independent panel of senior scholars on the basis of a candidate's research accomplishments, creativity and potential to become a leader in his or her field




