Martin Griffin Preserve is located at 4900 Shoreline Highway One, three miles north of Stinson Beach.



Lib at Large: A large book about a larger than life writer, Richard Brautigan

On a sunny Sunday in the fall of 1984, hippie era icon Richard Brautigan shoved the barrel of a .44 magnum into his mouth, pulled the trigger and literally blew his brains out in his Terrace Avenue home in Bolinas.

Upon learning of the 49-year-old poet's grisly suicide, one of his cohorts said, "Richard finally found a way to hurt all his friends at once."

The lurid details of the iconoclastic writer's death at his own hand are graphically revealed in author William Hjortsberg's comprehensive biography, "Jubilee Hitchhiker, the Life and Times of Richard Brautigan," just published by Counterpoint

At 852 pages, this is the definitive bio on Brautigan, the long-haired author whose novels "Troutfishing in America," "A Confederate General from Big Sur" and other unorthodox books and poems made him an icon of the '60s

With his Yosemite Sam mustache and 10-gallon hats, the tall, lanky writer looked like he'd stepped out of a Edward Curtis photograph by way of Haight Ashbury. When Hjortsberg met Brautigan at a reading at Stanford in 1968, the publication of "Troutfishing" had given him a newly minted celebrity. But instead of reading his own work, the suddenly famous author read poems that some Sausalito school children had written for him.

"It was a piece of guerrilla theater," Hjortsberg recalled. "The undergraduates dug it completely and were howling with laughter, but the faculty was extremely restive. They were grumbling and saying, "Who the hell does this guy think he is coming to Stanford University and getting paid to read the poems of fifth-graders?" They kept waiting for him to read his own poems, and he never did."

1-800-CARLTON 227-5866 At the time, Hjortsberg was on a Stegner Fellowship from Stanford and was living in Bolinas and working as a stock boy in the Bolinas market while he wrote his debut novel, "Atp."

"I rented a furnished house in downtown Bolinas for \$75 a month," he recalled. "Those were the golden days.

Like Hjortsberg, Brautigan had early ties to Bolinas, a xenophobic hippie enclave the iconoclastic writer liked to describe as "the freeze dried '60s." He once worked for the late Bill Brown, one of the owners of Covote Press who had a landscaping business in West Marin in the '60s and '70s.

"Brown would leave Richard alone while he went to collect stuff from the nursery," Hjortsberg said. "When he got back, Richard would be fast asleep under a tree

After two years in Bolinas, Hjortsberg moved to Montana, as did Brautigan, eventually buying a house across a creek from

"I saw a lot of him," he said. "He was always coming over, coffee cup in hand, looking for some hot 'java' in the mornings," he recalled. "And there would be those endless nightcaps that would last until dawn

In Bolinas, Hjortsberg never had occasion to veriture inside Brautigan's three-story house at 6 Terrace Ave. Set above the street, it was an old brown-shingled arts and crafts-style place shrouded by overgrown trees and brush.

"They all talk about how horribly gloomy it was," he said. "Richard could have had a view of the ocean, but he refused to cut down all the Scotch broom and shrubbery. He seemed to like it secluded and tucked in, but friends of his would say, "If you could have a view of the ocean, wouldn't you want that?" But Richard kept it all enclosed. It was so strange."

Surprisingly for someone so well known, Brautigan's body lay undiscovered for quite some time, long enough to reach a rather advanced stage of decomposition. The descriptions in Hjortsberg's book of the death scene are not for the squeamish or faint of heart.

"In a funny way, I almost think he designed it that way," Hjortsberg said, noting that Brautigan had made a point of telling people in Bolinas that he was going to Montana for the start of bird hunting season, and he told the Montana crowd he was going to Japan. "He was not a spontaneous, as would be suggested by his vibrant prose and fantastic metaphors. He was very calculating and cautious."

At the time of his death, Brautigan wasn't exactly the most popular guy in town.

lot of people weren't talking to him because he'd pissed them all off that final summer," Hjortsberg said. "He was drunk

No longer the hip young literary darling, Brautigan had lost his agent of 20-something years and couldn't get his final novel

"He was in such decline — his health, his drinking, his career," Hjortsberg explained. "He was hoping for a miracle, saying maybe I'll sell this to the movies and maybe I'll get this screenplay written. It was all kind of a drunkard's fantasy. But I think he always had it in the back of his head that if it didn't work out, there was always suicide. And I think he found a kind of

Hjortsberg started writing "Jubilee Hitchhiker" in 1991. Twenty some years later, after pausing to write several other novels and screenplays, he's as amused as anyone over the irony of a very long book about a famously minimalist writer.

"Richard wrote these slim, handsome books," he chuckled. "He had short stories that were a single sentence long. Now here's this immense tome about him. Maybe this is my way of playing this absurd, comic joke on him.




