Bo-Gas—filling your tank makes a difference

Bo-Gas in Bolinas is unlike any ordinary gas station. It serves West Marin by providing the only source of gasoline between Point Reyes and Mill Valley twenty-four hours a day. More importantly, however, is the fact that the station is owned and operated by the Bolinas Community Land Trust, a non-profit responsible for providing residents in Bolinas with affordable housing options.

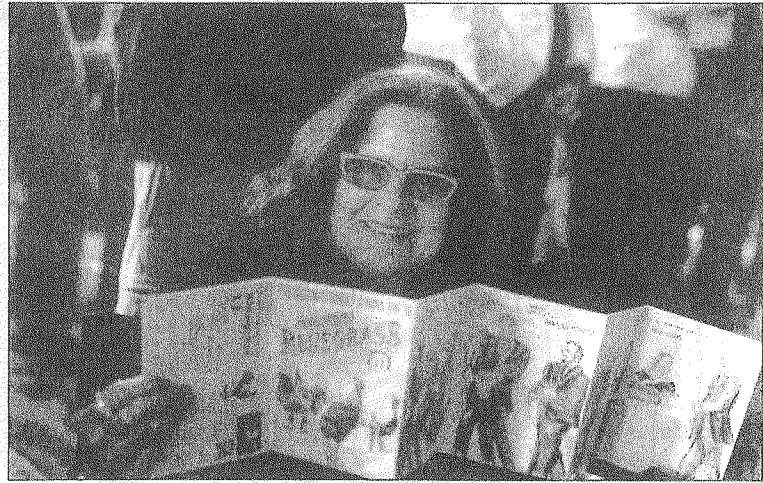
Bo-Gas has been a landmark of downtown Bolinas for over 100 years. In 2004 the Bolinas Community Land Trust purchased the station and adjacent building, which once housed the Bolinas Garage. Albert Foreman, who has been station manager for the last seven years, has diligently been bringing the station up to stringent government mandated standards of operation. During the station's manned hours, from 7:00-10:00 A.M. seven days a week, Albert provides over-the-top customer service greeting customers with a friendly attitude and offering to pump their gas rain or shine.

While Bo-Gas provides the communi-

ties surrounding Bolinas with a valuable service, it's more well known for being the most expensive place to buy gas in all of California. In fact, the gas for sale in the small town of Bolinas is often the most expensive in the country.

Locals and visitors alike rely on the historic two pump station to fill their tanks, or more commonly, to add a few gallons to their tank to get them far enough to fill up elsewhere. "The amount of money we have to charge compared to over the hill is a hardship", Albert readily admits. Although, he also points out the reason for the high gas prices is merely a result of the station's costs of operation. While you might assume a small gas station would cost less to run than a bustling truck stop, its remote location, small batch gasoline purchases, along with the cost of required upgrades are all reflected in the price per gallon.

While high prices are Bo-Gas' claim to fame, it is not the station's most important quality. As Albert points out, "in an emergency the gas station would be vital to the survival to the community." A resident of Bolinas for the last 26 years, Albert believes the station is valuable both for the

safety of the community and as a staple of downtown Bolinas. "I think the town would really lose something if we no longer had the gas station."

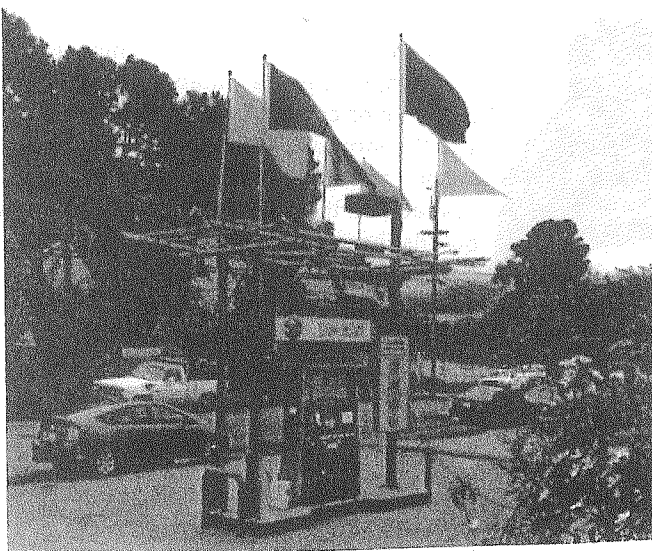
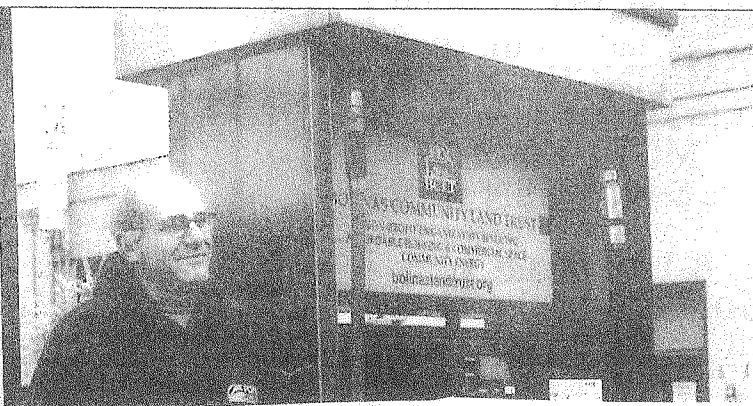
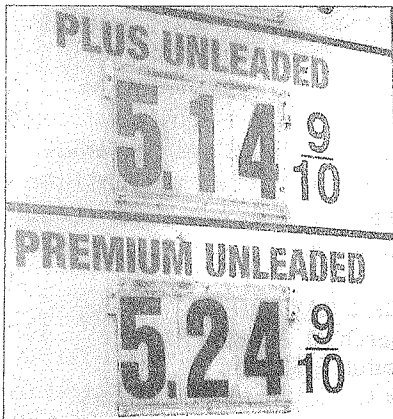
The gas station itself is beloved by

many. When questioned, two out of three customers found the price of little importance. Most are just glad Bo-Gas is there, regardless of how much they need to charge per gallon.

Bo-Gas is definitely unique and when it comes to community spirit it has no equal. Albert notes, that while the gas station may at times have the highest prices in the country, it is also the prettiest. "The gas pump is beautiful, it's probably the most beautiful gas pump in America." With its overhead lattice of bamboo and flying flags, that statement can hardly be refuted.

Next time you pull into Bo-Gas think about buying a few extra gallons, or perhaps filling up this time. You can feel a sense of pride knowing you are supporting both the local economy and local community.

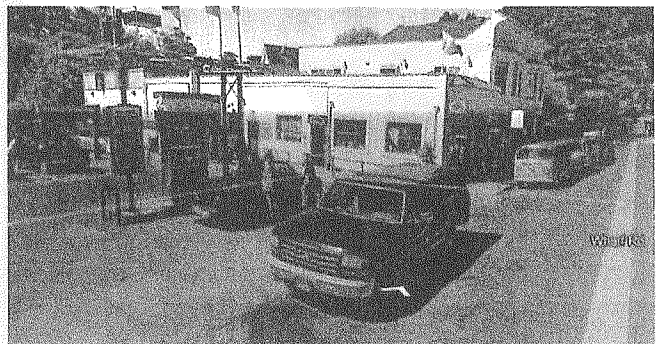

Bolinas

If Bolinas had a town motto, it would be something along the order of "Go away." The locals-only mentality espoused by Southern California surfers hasn't got a thing on the anti-outsider bias practiced by Bolinians. They really don't want the world to beat a path to their door, and while they're not openly mean about it, they're just not, well, openly hospitable. There's the issue of the road sign, for instance. To get to Bolinas, you must turn off Highway 1 onto Olema-Bolinas Road, just north of Bolinas Lagoon. If you don't know what you're looking for, you won't know where to turn. Not only is there no directional marker pointing to this coastal hamlet, but the very road sign identifying Olema-Bolinas Road is often missing, a tradition that started in the late 1960s and continues to this day. Between 1970 and 1990 hard-core Bolinas isolationists ran off with 36 road signs (must be quite an interesting collection somewhere).

So listen up: To get to Bolinas, with or without signs, turn west off Highway 1 where the roads fork at the lagoon, approximately five miles south of Olema and four miles north of Stinson Beach. (If this page is missing from the book, you'll know some Bolinian got to it before you did.)

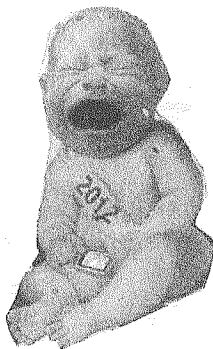
If you somehow make it to town, you'll think you've stumbled into a '60s time warp. The denizens of Bolinas look like survivors that fled the Haight-Ashbury in the late '60s. Remnants of this lost clan populate the rugged coast from Marin County to the Oregon state line. Bolinas, being closest to their spawning ground, San Francisco, is one of their strongholds.

Hallmarks of the Haight-Ashbury mentality are everywhere: a multicolored, cabalistic rendering of the sun painted in the street, bearing the legend "Super Solstice to All"; a bakery/café that prides itself on being the area's "only all-organic flour bakery" and is staffed by what looks like—and might well be—former members of the Diggers (the free-food cooperative that fed indigent hippies in the Haight); a funky local library that hosts a reggae dance on Monday nights; and a fleet of vehicles so ragged and rusty it's a miracle their engines turn over. It's all part of the eccentric appeal of a community that hasn't gone for the corporate land-grab and cutesy boutiquing that have elsewhere stripped the coast of its natural look and heritage. Peevish though they may be, the natives of Bolinas are easily understood and forgiven.

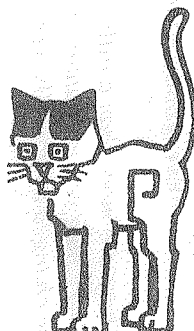
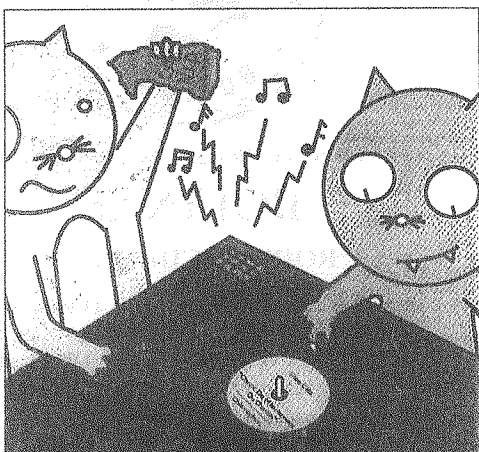

THE BEAUTIFUL HORROR OF RON GARRIGUES

"From Beginning to End"

[VISUAL ART]

This Is How the World Ends

Ron Garrigues takes a subtle approach to the most vexing of issues: overpopulation, destruction, and extinction. A person *might* call his artwork gruesome — especially some of his bronze sculptures. But that same person would also have to call the works beautiful, because Garrigues uses simple, refined techniques and stops short of overt gore. Cartoonish in appearance, his sculptures suggest robotic heads or stylized gas masks, with clean lines, uniform colors, and a high-gloss finish. A closer look, though, reveals dark themes. One sculpture, *Overpopulation — The Mother Cannot Bear So Many*, resembles a skull fashioned from a metal bowling ball. Yet its protruding jaw and mouth form a birth canal, the top of a baby's head visible. One eye socket is occupied by the top of a smaller head, while the other contains tiny feet. *Famine III* is also a metal head, locked in a choking stare, with deep, empty eye sockets and a wide-open, toothless mouth. An elongated tongue holds a small mound of grain. Garrigues uses the same paradox in his 2-D works. The etching *Big Bang 32* is made up of jagged lines on a black field originating from a sunburst pattern in the center. It could be a simple black-and-white abstraction, a lightning storm, or a sinister one-eyed creature worthy of *War of the Worlds*, dancing in joy as it destroys all it sees. Thirty-three bronze sculptures, 33 etchings, and 33 sumi ink paintings mounted on silk make up "From Beginning to End," a retro-

spective that covers 33 years of work. Here's hoping this show signifies more beginnings rather than the end.

The opening reception for "From Beginning to End" starts at 4 p.m. (and the exhibit continues through March 31) at Varnish Fine Art, 16 Jessie (at First St.), S.F. Admission is free; call 433-4400 or visit www.varnishfineart.com.

- WHAT:** The Marin County Board of Supervisors will hold a series of public workshops and hearings to discuss the proposed Planning Commission Recommended Draft of the Local Coastal Program Amendment (LCPA). The LCPA includes Land Use Plan (LUP) and Development Code Amendments to the Local Coastal Program (LCP). A schedule of dates and subject areas are listed below. Your participation and input is an important component in the process to update Marin's LCP, which consists of the primary land use regulations for Marin's coastal area.
- WHERE:** The public workshops and hearings will be held in the Board of Supervisors Chambers (Room #330 - Administration Building), Marin County Civic Center, San Rafael, California
- WHEN:** The schedule is as follows:

Written material should not be mailed or delivered directly to Board because it will not be accepted or considered as part of the administrative record for the project. Written material for the Board of Supervisors should be submitted to the Community Development Agency at least 10 days prior to the meeting date so that it can be distributed and considered by the Board of Supervisors with the staff report. Any written material submitted after this date will be distributed to the Board of Supervisors prior to or at the meeting.

If you challenge the decision of this project in court you may be limited to raising only those issues you or someone else raised at the public hearings described in this notice, or in written correspondence delivered to the Community Development Agency - Planning Division at, or prior to the public hearing. (Government Code Section 65009(b)(2).)

Pursuant to Sections 21080.5 and 21080.9 of the Public Resources Code and Sections 15250 and specifically 15251 (f) of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines, the preparation, approval, and certification of a Local Coastal Plan Amendment is exempt from the requirements for preparing Environmental Impact Reports, Negative Declarations, and Initial Studies because it meets CEQA environmental review requirements through the California Coastal Commission's Certified Regulatory Program "functional equivalent" review and approval process.

HOW TO OBTAIN THE LCP: The Planning Commission Recommended Draft of the LCPA is available on the website at <http://www.MarinLCP.org>. 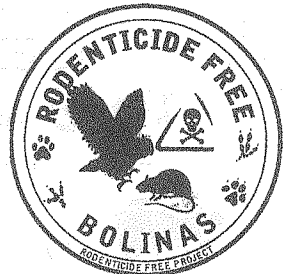
