GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1 – Election of Officers

Discussion was had regarding the election of President and Vice President each January. There are no term limits on the positions and there is not an automatic cycling of the Board members into these positions. President Kimball expressed that he is willing to continue as President for another term. Vice Pres. Chiera stated he too would be willing to continue to serve as Vice President for another term. The Board felt this was a good option while the new members became more familiar with Board issues and activities.

MSC Martinelli/ Molesworth (unan.) to elect Dir. David Kimball as President and Dir. Ed Chiera as Vice President.

Action Item #2 – Formation of Committees

Discussion was had regarding the structuring of committees. Chief Brown reviewed the typical tasks of the committees and what issues may be focused on including the approval of the Personnel Manual. President Kimball made a recommendation for the District Committees as follows:

- Finance and Budget – President Kimball and Dir. Molesworth
 - Personnel – Vice Pres. Chiera and Dir. Torrey
 - Buildings and Grounds – Dir. Martinelli and Vice Pres. Chiera
- MSC Chiera/Torrey (unan.) to Approve Formation of Committees

Action Item #8 – Regular Meeting Schedule for 2019

Discussion was had regarding the dates for 2019 Board meetings. Staff pointed out that the May date coincides with a holiday and the December date was the week of Christmas.

MSC Torrey/ Molesworth (unan.) to Accept the Regular Meeting Schedule for 2019 with a change in the May date to May 20th and the December date to December 16th.

Action Item #4 – Review and Accept Draft Audited Financial Statements

Pres. Kimball presented the memo he provided the Board regarding understanding the audited financial statements. Lisa Doran, Doran and Associates will be attending the February Board Meeting to present the audited financials and answer any questions. Chief Brown explained that the bookkeeper has reviewed the draft as well as Pres. Kimball and Vice Pres. Chiera as the temporary Finance Committee. She also reviewed the comments provided by the auditor in the Management Letter. The majority of the comments suggest updates to the Districts Accounting Controls and Procedures and changes to our internal posting of transactions. Pres. Kimball requested a copy of the Accounting Controls and Procedures be provided to each Board member. He also inquired when the District would need to begin looking for a new auditor since we will be unable to continue with Doran and Assoc. due to state law. Staff will follow up with Lisa Doran.

Pres. Kimball reviewed the pertinent financial statements.

MSC Molesworth/ Martinelli (unan.) to Accept the Draft Audited Financial Statements FY 17/18.

Action Item #5 – Proposal to Maintain Old U219 as a Utility Vehicle

Asst. Chief Krakauer provided and reviewed his memo to the Board recommending the District maintain old U219 as a utility vehicle. His proposal included a description of how the Chief currently responds in her private vehicle. The Fire Chief will often respond to a call while "off duty" from a private residence or elsewhere. It's commonly known that downtown can become very congested. A department vehicle with code 3 lighting would be able to respond quicker, whereas in a private car it can be very difficult to get through or find parking.

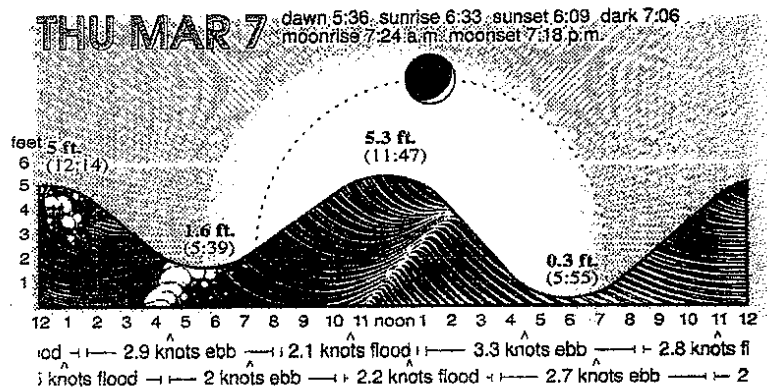
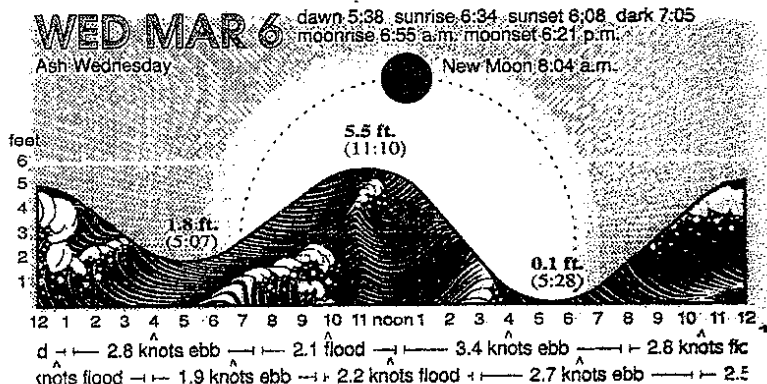

The Chief's vehicle is often the first at scene to accidents on the roadways. The vehicle ends up playing an important role in identifying emergency scenes and preventing further accidents from occurring. Having a Chief's vehicle with emergency lighting can reduce risk and achieve a better level of safety to all.

The Chief also attends regular meetings "over the hill". Chief Brown often drives her own car, but also takes U231 on occasion. Having U231 out of the town leaves the District with no utility vehicle. The utility truck often plays a key role in our operational response and with it not available; we often depend on volunteers with pickups who may or may not be available.

In the past, a Chief's vehicle was made available. Chief Brown was offered a department vehicle when she took the position but declined due to her situation, (a mom of 2) it wasn't a practical option at the time. Asst. Chief Krakauer provided a proposed budget with the memo outlining the immediate and ongoing costs to maintain the vehicle. Immediate costs of approximately \$5,000 and annual costs of approximately \$2,500.

Dir. Martinelli expressed his full support to proceed and suggested that potentially rotating vehicles as they wear out would save money.
MSC Chiera/Martinelli (unan.) to Maintain Old U219 as a Utility Vehicle.

Discussion – Review and Accept the West Marin Measure W Transient Occupancy Tax Memorandum of Understanding with Marin County and West Marin Fire Departments.

Chief Brown removed this item as an action due to her opinion that the draft MOU was not ready to be reviewed and accepted. She reviewed for the Board the passage of Measure W, the increase by 4% to the West Marin Transient Occupancy Tax. The proceeds are dedicated 50% to community affordable housing projects and 50% to the West Marin Fire Departments. The Fire Chiefs from each department met and discussed how the proceeds should be dispersed. It was agreed that the greatest impacts are felt by the Marin County Fire Department and the Stinson and Bolinas Fire Protection Districts. Another consideration was the current financial relationships between Marin County Fire and Muir Beach, Tomales and Nicasio. Annually, Bolinas will receive 17%, Marin County Fire 38%, Inverness Fire 14%, Muir Beach 8%, Nicasio 4%, Stinson Beach 17% and Tomales 2%. The Marin County Fire Department provided a draft MOU with the intent of memorializing the agreement and allowing the departments to anticipate an approximate amount of proceeds each year. Currently, we are unsure of how and when the funds will be dispersed. We would like to add wording speaking to a clear accounting of the funds annually. Chief Brown will bring the final draft to the Board for consideration at the February meeting.

Buildings and Grounds – No Update

Operations Working Group – Chief Brown explained that the expenses for the buildup of the new 219 are over budget by approximately \$5000 due to unforeseen complications. She also noted that the cost of new Type 1 engines has gone up considerably; our last engine cost approximately \$350,000. Currently they are costing anywhere from \$600,000 to \$800,000. We do not need to replace an engine at this time.

Pres. Kimball spoke of Darrin Malvin passing away in an accident recently. He was passionate about installing solar energy here at the Fire Station and helped out tremendously. He was a large force in helping us finish the solar project and we are very appreciative of all that he did for the District and Community. He also mentioned that tonight's meeting length was highly unusually and offered his support and help to all Board members, especially new members.

Chief Brown expressed that she was glad to see President Kimball was back and feeling better.

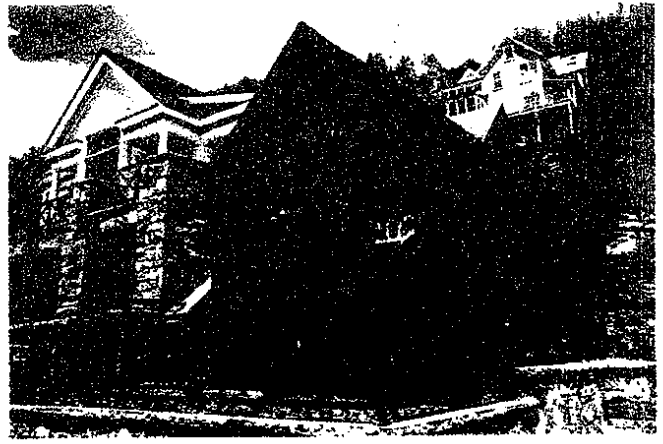
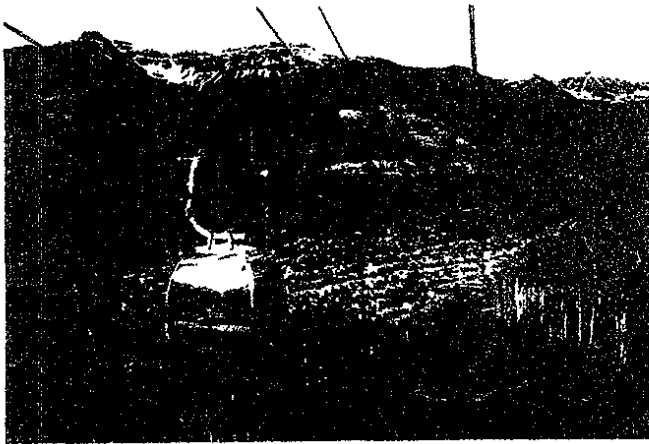

Telluride is a beautiful place in which to wander, its gardens and houses well kept and properly scaled, the mountains themselves, protecting the little city in their bowl, forever breathtaking. Most of the stores are locally owned. There are no traffic lights, strip malls, box stores or massive parking lots. The ugliest thing

television and several typewriters (invariably with exhausted ribbons). My children have brought home countless toys and gadgets, guests have picked up temporary necessities, ski poles or sweatshirts, and returned them at visit's end. A hoard of young cousins brought home a giant papier-mâché cake with wooden handles and a trap door beneath its test-tube-size candles. Somebody had made it for a surprise party, built to allow a person (naked lady?) to pop out. The

upkeep was costing the city too much and that it had become an eyesore—and it's true the contents were often of dubious use (broken crockery, half-filled food packages, outdated catalogs). To preserve the landmark, a local citizen's group, Friends of the Free Box, stepped in and since the winter have taken over the care of the box, posting a bulletin board to list big items and hauling away trash.

Still, in a town that every year seems to grow closer and closer to that place

within a 50-mile radius is the airport, and even it is set upon a stunning plateau, beneath majestic mounts Sunshine and Wilson and Lizard Head.

Along with HARC, another '70s arrival was the Free Box. It came from Berkeley, people said, and I suppose it was an early form of recycling: a bookcase-like structure into which people placed what they no longer needed and took what they liked.

The Free Box, situated a mere three blocks from my family's remaining house (still an uninsulated miner's shack resting on rocks rather than a real foundation, surrounded now by Victorian-style manors and manicured lawns), soon became the town's hub. There, locals would linger, glancing over its labeled shelves—boys, girls, men, women, books, housewares, jackets, shoes, etc.—to see what might be of use.

Over the years I've retrieved a down sleeping bag, coffee table, hammock, headboard, ice chest, file cabinet, sink,

purple and white monstrosity sat in our yard for a few weeks, melting in the rain.

The Free Box is even a useful navigational tool. Place yourself there and west is out of town; east is toward the dead-end box canyon and inimitable Bridal Veil Falls; south is Bear Creek Road, the most popular hiking destination; and north leads—among other things—to our little house, crooked and dwarfed, on whose porch sit two perfectly good chairs carried home a few years ago from the Free Box.

In the old days, a man nicknamed the Polite Motorcyclist (he never revved his engine when he went by, coasting on gravity) stationed himself at the box, hand-rolling cigarettes and monitoring visitors. Brother Al, priest and civic servant, swept the sidewalk. For a while the city had essentially taken over the box's maintenance, which, the town manager estimated, amounted to something like \$50,000 a year. Last fall some residents wanted to get rid of the box or at least have it relocated, complaining that the

it feared becoming—movie stars and other extraordinarily wealthy people live here now; the gated communities and private jets have arrived; articles on the need for “affordable housing” run alongside the ubiquitous Sotheby Realty ads in the town newspaper—I don't think I'm alone in clinging to the markers of Telluride's resistance. The Free Box is one of those, a small patch of common ground. Drop off a DVD of a Cary Grant movie and see it fly into a stranger's parka pocket; hold up a black cashmere sweater and get a nod of approval—*lucky you, to grab it first*—from the thrift-store maven. Send the kids out to occupy themselves, to discover some curiosity or treasure there. Later, you can give it back.

You take and you give, give and take. Maybe we can reassure ourselves we won't entirely turn into Aspen if we still have the Free Box. ○

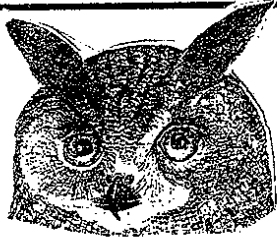
