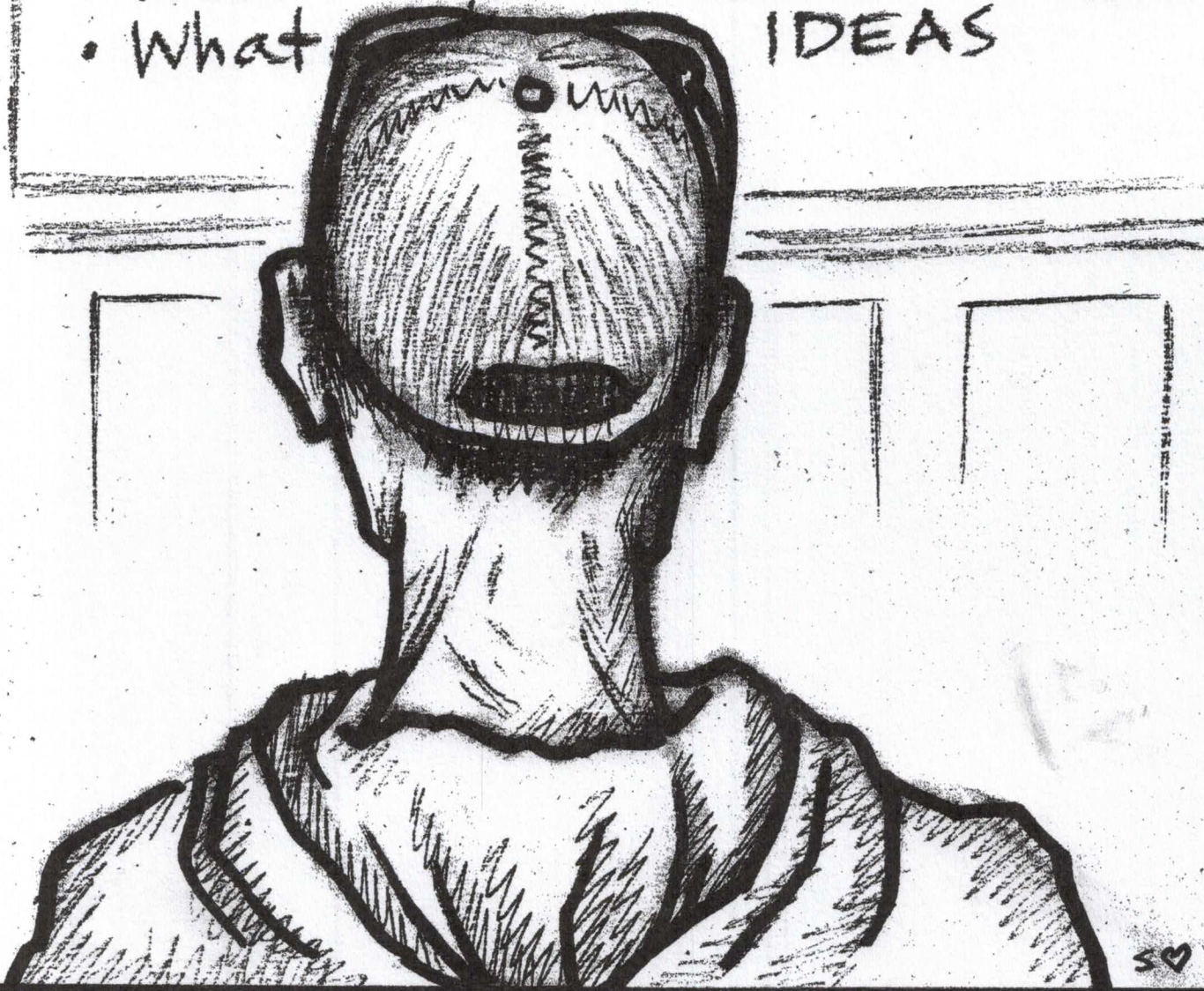

SF Firefighters Honor Commonweal's Sharyle Patton for Cancer Prevention Work

Sharyle Patton, Director of the Commonweal Biomonitoring Resource Center, was honored on Saturday, March 23, by the San Francisco Firefighters Cancer Prevention Foundation for her work protecting firefighters from toxic chemical exposures. Patton was honored alongside her research partner, Rachel Morello-Frosch, professor in the Department of Environmental Science, Policy and Management at UC Berkeley.

Patton and Morello-Frosch co-founded the Women Firefighters Biomonitoring Collaborative with United Fire Service Women, Silent Spring Institute, UCSF, Breast Cancer Prevention Partners, and Commonweal. For the past two years Patton has focused on toxic chemicals in firefighter gear and firefighter foam as well as firefighter exposures from the major California wildfires. Over the past six years, Patton has also conducted dust analyses of fire stations across the US and Canada in collaboration with the International Association of Firefighters.

Patton and Morello-Frosch were among five honorees who received "White Helmets" for their work at the San Francisco Firefighters Cancer Prevention Foundation Dinner at the Palace Hotel before 600 firefighters and their guests. The white helmet in the firefighting profession signifies the highest level of achievement. Patton and Morello-Frosch were honored for their dedication to raising awareness about exposures to toxic chemicals within the firefighting profession.

HO'OPONOPONO



(TO SET RIGHT) COMMUNICATION

Chant:

No kelā kau ka he'wa.

The wrong is of that (not this) season.¹

Teaching:

Many Hawaiians believe that all things are interrelated and that the universe operates on the principle of harmonious relationships. Humans have *aka* (cords of energy) that attach us to one another. That is why relationships are viewed as a net. Tensions in any part of the net pull on the other parts, tangling the entire net.² When the net is tangled, balance and harmony are lost.

It is unfortunate, if not common, to fall out of harmony with the *'aumāku* (ancestors) and the earth, as well as with other human beings. However, balance and harmony can be restored through self scrutiny and participation in *ho'oponopono*, a ritual for restoring harmonious relationships. The word *ho'oponopono* is derived from *ho'o*, "to cause or bring about," *pono*, "correct or right," and *ponopono*, "cared for or attended to." *Ho'oponopono* has been described as one of "the soundest methods to restore and maintain good family relationships that any society has ever devised."³

Successful *ho'oponopono* requires that all of the participants follow a prescribed set of procedures and have the right attitudes. It is important that all participants entering into the ritual do so with a sincere desire to correct wrongs. Confessions must be honest and from the heart; nothing should be held back.⁴

The process begins with the appointment of an *'uao*, a mediator. "The role of the mediator is to allow the process of everyone's communication of heart and mind to unfold. The mediator is not to make or offer judgment, only to allow the healing process of nature to take effect."⁵ After all of the involved parties are gathered, the mediator explains his or her role and the ceremony is opened with a prayer. *Ho'oponopono* begins when the mediator asks each participant to freely express his or her concerns and confess wrongdoings, grievances, grudges, and resentments. Time is also allowed for emotional outpouring.

In modern *ho'oponopono* rituals, some mediators may use *wehe i ka Paipala* to provide insight into the situation that is causing disharmony.⁶ In *wehe i ka Paipala* the mediator shuts his or her eyes and points to a passage in an opened Bible. Other divining methods may also be used. Participants are asked to interpret the meaning of the passage or symbol in terms of the problem or situation at hand (See the Ho'oponopono Spread, VIII).

The mediator may also invoke *ho'omalū* (periods of silence) to calm tempers, encourage self-inquiry into actions, motives and feelings, or simply to allow participants to rest. The mediator may request that members offer mutual forgiveness and release any guilt, grudges, or tension associated with past behaviors. Arrangements for making restitution may also be made. Then the mediator requests that the situation be *ho'omalū* (*kapu*, spoken of no further) on that day or in the future. The ceremony closes with a prayer and the sharing of taro, poi, or some other food.⁷

Marin supervisors to extend overnight parking ban to West Marin

An overnight parking ban originally designed to thwart transient nuisances in unincorporated Marin County is being embraced as a tool to control West Marin tourism.

After hearing complaints of trash, noise and other disruptions caused by weekend visitors camping in RVs on Point Reyes Station and Bolinas streets, county supervisors decided it was time to do something about it.

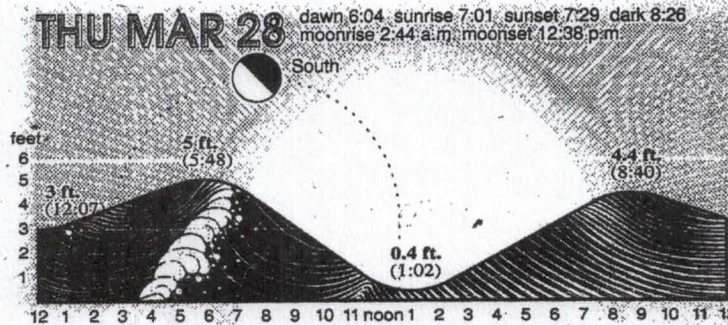
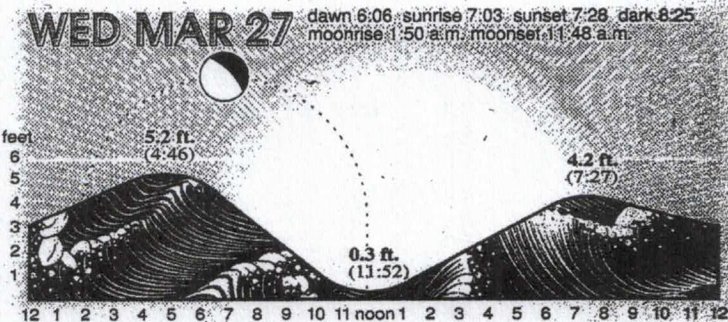
"It's a problem in terms of all the issues around long-term parking and camping," said Supervisor Dennis Rodoni, whose District 4 includes West Marin. Specifically in Bolinas, "It's an issue with weekend visitors who come and stay and surf and the garbage and other things they leave."

Supervisors in 2017 approved a series of ordinances establishing a parking ban of oversized vehicles, such as RVs, trailers and commercial vehicles on select county roads.

In West Marin, the ban is meant to handle an overload of tourism, with many visitors spending the night in oversized vehicles on streets near parks and beaches.

In Point Reyes Station, there have been reports of various health violations, including human waste, pollution, intimidation, theft, drug use and sales and vandalism, associated with the overnight campers, according to county staff.

Ad forms are also available anytime in the small mail
box next to the Hearsay door. You can fill out the form
and have your ad billed to you, or you can enclose
payment (please note on your ad if you are paying cash
in case they become separated) & drop into door slot.
