David Polo

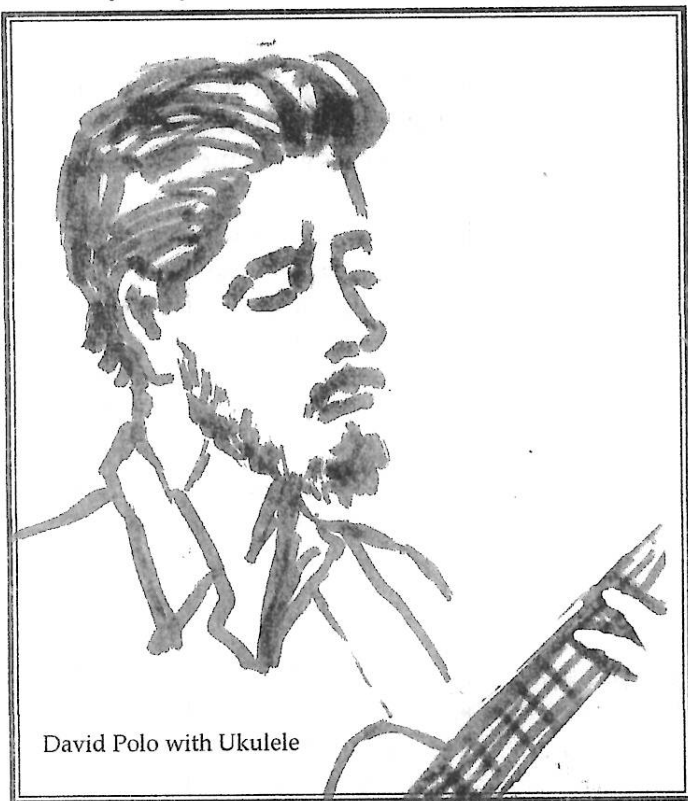

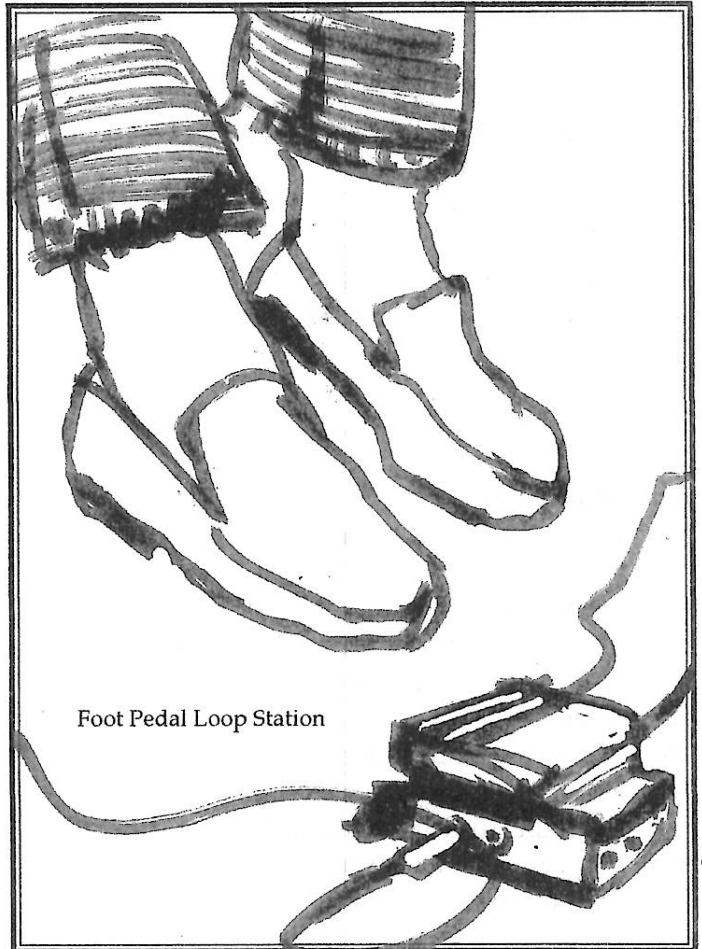

Board Members Present: Victoria Maier, Angie Calpestri, Dylan Squires, and Charles Whitefield

Others:

Vic Amoroso, Angela Vernon, Alethea Patton

Community Expression:

1) Alethea was hoping we could finish the cobb around the oven and eating area. She knows an expert in Santa Rosa. Cobb ovens crack that is not unusual. Dylan could try to reach out to Penny Livingstone. Dylan motioned to approve, Angie second (4-0) approved.

2) The hillside needs to be weed whipped at least twice a year. Angela- we usually wait till May, needs to be done before July 4th. Last time it cost around \$3,100 and Oscar cut it. Dylan: will wait until next meeting.

3) Alethea- could Arn power-wash the stone? There are even fittings for power washers that can take off graffiti. Dylan: we might need to buy one. Charles is concerned they are expensive and need maintenance. Rent? Service? Angie: Good and Clean might do it. Angie will give them a call.

5) Angela: someone asked if they could have a BBQ in the downtown park. Dylan: Yes, people can have BBQ's they just can't leave grills there for more then 12hours at a time. Charles: we still need to purchase an ash can.

Downtown Park:

1) Steam clean the bathrooms. Charles is going to bring the power washer downtown and show Arn how to use it.

2) The drip irrigation line is breaking. Angela- we could bury more of the irrigation drip lines but the ground is hard and it is pricey to do that. Dylan: are we going to need the drip lines for a long time? Angela: I think we will always need them. Dylan: if it only costs about \$100 for Carrie to fix breaks in the line and then bury the lines and get some mulch.

Mesa Park:

nd advertisement for MP (draft of 2 positions)

2) Children's Center Walk-A-Thon- mowing the field- Charles is going to mow the field for walk-a-thon on May 1st.

3) Over night camping/parking in the parking lot of MP. Charles: we still need to put up our signs.

Maintenance Report:

1) Turf Builder on Soccer Field MP. Dylan: it is looking better. When the water was turned off we had to do some timed water for a while and Bryan mentioned the turf builder would help encourage growth. Charles: we need 4-5 big bags

3) Ad for maintenance and mowing service.

4) Job descriptions for both (Almost 2 acres) Charles Lenhoff

5) Need to order supplies for the bathrooms. Victoria: I will go to Costco but some supplies will have to be ordered online.

Irrigation Report:

1) Appoint someone to be in charge of irrigation- Dylan: that position is going to fall under the mowing service.

Treasurer's Report:

1) United Site Services - yes, this has been canceled.

2) Meas A Funds Report - transfer on 4/20/15 for \$5,163.75 was never made from Meas Park Ckg to DT Park Ckg (but it needs to be). Dylan: will be transferring an emergency fund.

3) Budget: since the fiscal year ends 6/30, we should begin mapping out/approving an operating budget (to be approved prior to the end of the fiscal year) for next year.

4) Audit Measure A? Dylan: is taking care of that.

5) Financial Audit haven't had one since 2005, supposed to have one every year costs around \$5000 a year. Christine has only been doing book keeping for the past 4 years before that our records are unclear.

Other:

1) Appointing a replacement for Bryan Lee. We need to put up public announcements for the seat for 15 days before appointing someone to the board. That person will finish out the term until the next voting year where they can apply for a board seat.

2) Internal Control Policies and Procedures. Victoria: call Jane and ask if she has heard this before.

MANDATORY VACCINATIONS: TOTALITARIAN INNOCULATION

Trying to convince pro-vaxxers that mandatory vaccination is not an effective public health solution with evidence is as futile as persuading a lone nutter that JFK was shot from the grassy knoll. People ignore evidence they disagree with, but there are reasons all can agree on to oppose CA Senate Bill 277, which would ban personal and religious belief exemptions from mandatory vaccinations of public school children.

More than one-fourth of Bolinas Stinson school children will be blocked from attending public school by this law. Most exempting parents will remove their children from Bolinas Stinson public school for private or home schooling. Yet the school board voted to support this bill last week. The only public good will be to shorten board meetings from five hours, because there will be no need to discuss a bond measure for new buildings.

The board's vote of support was purely symbolic, but it is not a battle the BS District should wave a flag for. The board entered the vaccination war behind the lines of a "crazy cluster" of exemptors and dissenters. More than one-fourth of its students are exempted, with an unknown number of adult staff as a fifth column. A Pew Research poll found 32% of adult Americans were not in favor of mandatory vaccinations, increasing with higher income and education levels. Half the voters in the school district are quite possibly heretics.

Even if you believe they are batshit crazy, are the claimed benefits worth stirring up this hornet's nest? A battalion of berserker parents protecting their kids will wreak havoc on the community. Sacrificing parental choice to totalitarian inoculation mandates won't improve public or even school health. After all, the United States has the most mandated vaccines of any industrial nation (actually any country), with the worst child health (and adult). Correlation may not be causation, but forced vaccination is obviously not improving health.

Similar legislation is being proposed in twelve states to prod them to imitate Mississippi, number one in infant mortality, childhood obesity, diabetes and vaccination rates. The vaccine wars have begun. Oregon and Washington legislators already raised the white flag and abandoned their bill behind enemy lines. California freedom fighters have entrenched the Senate from advancing, for a week.

Those without children of school age might think they don't have a dog in this fight, but there are already mandatory influenza vaccine laws for health care and child care workers. Legislation to herd all adults into mass immunity campaigns with dozens of new genetically modified vaccines, is reportedly contingent on this coordinated clash by the Center for Disease Control.

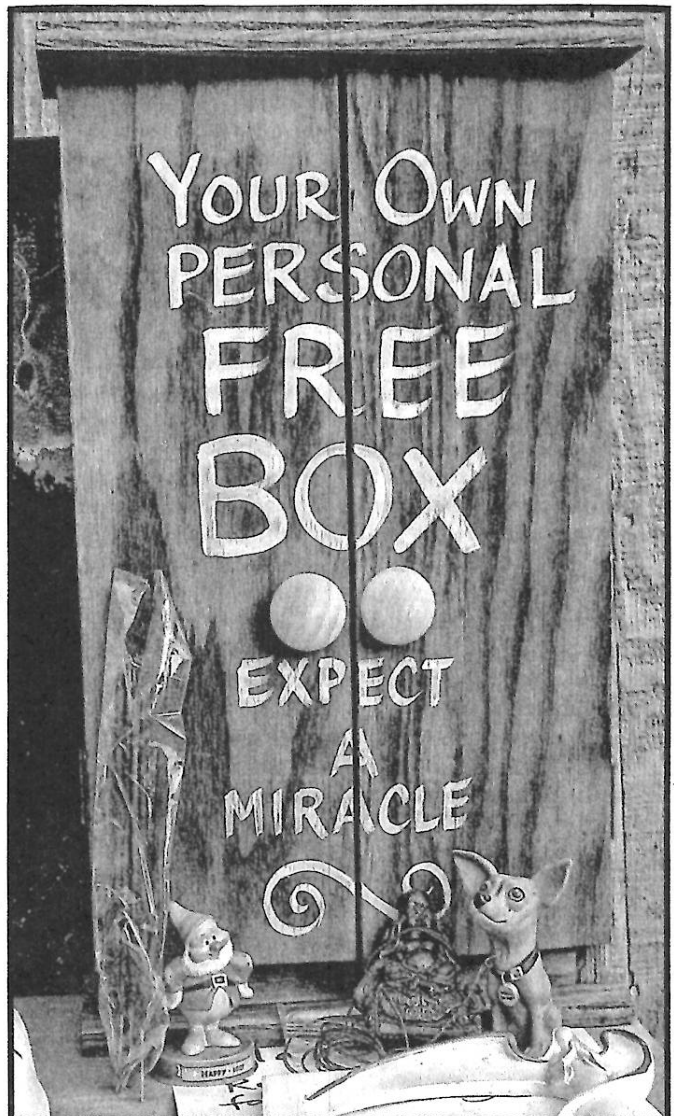
Doctors from Toronto's Infection Prevention and Control Unit opposed mandatory influenza vaccination legislation in Canada last year. They pointed out that "more than 200 viruses can cause influenza like illnesses", while flu viruses that vaccines protect against "only cause 10-15% of reported influenza". These doctors get yearly flu shots "and encourage others to do so" because they "are about 60% effective".

They acknowledged that protection wanes until "by springtime their protective effect can be negligible". That makes flu vaccines 6-9% effective at best in preventing flu like illnesses. Most vaccines have low rates of effectiveness after several years from immunization.

"If public health leaders downplay vaccine limitations while at the same time engaging in heavy handed strategies to drive vaccination, they will only be emboldening anti-vaxxers by providing more evidence that the medical establishment is untrustworthy. It is time to stop focusing on heavy handed policies based on questionable evidence."

If you agree with the doctors that mandatory vaccine laws do more public harm than good, and are pro-choice regardless of your personal faith in vaccine safety and effectiveness, then call the Bolinas Stinson school board at 868-1603 and your state legislators Senator Mike McGuire at 479-6612 and Assemblyman Marc Levine at 479-4920.

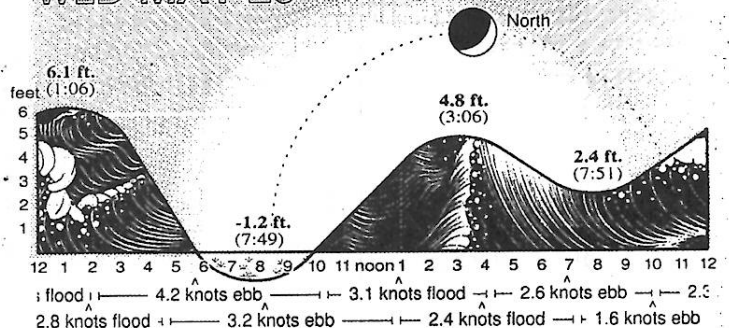
