I HAVE FOUND THE BEST POLICE BLOTTER IN AMERICA

MURDER, THEFT, AND OTHER WICKEDNESS: The procedural poetry of the Sheriff's Calls column in the Point Reyes Light. By Leon Neyfakh

The first weekend in May was an eventful one in Marin County, California. On Friday afternoon, in the hamlet of Forest Knolls, sheriff's deputies received a call about a gold Lexus that had been discovered with blood inside. That evening, in the nearby town of Lagunitas, the Sheriff's Office learned of a man with curly blond hair and missing front teeth who was threatening to shoot someone's dog. Later that night, shortly after 1 a.m., a man with two children was seen preparing to take a green canoe out onto Tomales Bay. And on Sunday afternoon, a woman in Woodacre who had locked herself out on her deck was heard crying out for help after trying to climb a tree.

Each of these incidents was reported in the police blotter of the Point Reyes Light, a small weekly newspaper that has served the communities of West Marin, an otherworldly ocean-side stretch of land that lies beyond the Golden Gate Bridge, since 1948. In the same issue, the paper carried items about clumsy children: ("STINSON BEACH: At 2:45 p.m. a 7-year-old fell off the lifeguard tower, hurting her arm"), restless animals ("FOREST KNOLLS: At 5:15 a.m. someone had been listening to a dog bark for an hour"), and concerned parents ("MUIR WOODS: At 2:12 p.m. a woman wished to talk about 'inappropriate stuff' she discovered on her child's phone").

The Light, which won a Pulitzer Prize in 1979 for its reporting on a local cult, publishes a few dozen such items each week as part of its Sheriff's Calls column. The column, which is written by the paper's editor-in-chief, Tess Elliott, chronicles the worries, fears, misfortunes, and mischief that prompt the residents of West Marin to alert the authorities. It is the best police blotter in America, or at least the best one I've ever read.





The most pressing issue right now in Bolinas is the lack of housing. We are literally being bought up. At least 50% of the houses in Bolinas are second homes and too many are empty most of the time. What is available is getting more and more expensive or turned into short-term rentals.


To this end we have called for a town meeting. The Bolinas Community Land Trust has been the leader in housing and has been looking into this particular issue for a long time. They have come up with some very creative and inspiring ways to house people. They will be giving a report on the work they have been doing.

BoCan, who is calling this meeting, is a new group of younger people, many who grew up here, are going to present themselves and the work they are doing. If there is time and interest we will deal with other issues that are affecting Bolinas. So, as the sign says, "Please Come!"

I want to be clear about something. Many of the second homeowners in Bolinas are truly a part of our community. Their hearts are here and they show it. I also know that offering short-term rentals provide some of us with a way to be here. Everyone has his or her own way of making it work. We are a community and we know who we are. I'm not pointing fingers. I am speaking my truth. I just want us to come together as a community and begin to create another story.

We are the town that fought to save itself and damn if we don't have to do it again. We've done it before. Let's talk.

How can we come together to help make this stop?





Gene grew up in Westbury, NY, graduated from Chaminade High School (1962), C.W. Post College (1966) and obtained a masters from University of Arizona (Tucson).

He was a movie sound editor, co-inventor of the Finley-Hill Box for sound mixing, designer and builder of residences, maker of documentaries, and a great appreciator of music, books, film and long term friendships.

Predeceased by parents, Marguerite and John W. Finley, brother John W. Finley, Jr.; he is survived by sister Patricia Pellegrini (John), sister-in-law Alice R. Finley; nieces Elizabeth Pellegrini, Evelyn F. Erb(Pete), Isabella Erb and nephew John W. Finley, III. Also, Jennifer Manetta and her sons Thor Manetta, Flynn Manetta-Thomlinson, and Milo Manetta-Thomlinson.

Connection to Nutrient Dense Food

For some the reason we live out here in West Marin is for a deep connection to nature. With the locovore movement flourishing, many people who eat meat feel they are disconnected with the source, processes, and skill-set that enables the food enjoyed on their plate possible. Many of us are curious and want to experience some/all of the processes involved with raising a small animal: home garden fertilizer, weed control/tractors, harvesting, dressing, and preparing of the animal.

One little known benefit of raising small animals is the fertilizer production- for those familiar with NPK: chickens 1.1/0.8/0.5, Rabbits 2.4/1.4/0.6, which can be added to the garden without further processing.

The knowledge required to efficiently and humanely process an animal into food is an essential tool for self sufficiency while providing an opportunity to connect with an innate process of nutrient acquisition that cannot be obtained in our mainstream

This Saturday, May 30th, there is a workshop offered that will introduce small animal home-based raising, slaughtering (you do not have to do this to attend), processing, preserving parts for food and other raw materials utilizing the entire animal in a respectful and thorough manner. John Scott Harwood passed away on May 6, 2015 in Wisconsin where he was living with his brother Ken and Kathleen, Ken's wife.

Scott chose the road less traveled. He was a giving and kind soul who was loved by friends, family, and every dog he ever met. He appreciated the kindness of others and did as much as he could to be kind back. Challenged by demons, he fought a good fight and enjoyed things that most of us take for granted. Sunsets, back scratches, hikes, toys, and any body of warm water in North America, he missed very few of them and loved to share them. In the end, we hope he was comforted by our words and actions, and he will be missed by us all.

His Bolinas journey began with good friends, the nearby sea side hot spring and proximity to the things he loved. From Bo he traveled to every hot spring he could find, photographed several for books and often slept near or in them. He continued this practice in a bathtub in our home where he found relief from the pain associated with end stage liver failure. He was often ahead of his time by decades when in the early 80's he developed software for hand-held computers before there were hand-held computers except for one, the Sharp PC 1500. When going through his things I found a brand new one still in the box. He was a computer engineer in the beginning and designed some of the first on-board computer systems for the original stealth bomber. Latter he kept many of the Bolinas systems running for the people who live there.

He identified with the free spirit dogs of Bolinas and cared for many of them. We hope to work with the community to keep this relationship alive. He was loyal to his friends and, like the pets, would do almost anything for them. He kept treats for our dogs by the fireplace which is where he slept and did his best to keep warm. He also bought a car where he often stayed for hours again for the warmth. He loved just going for a ride and accompanied me everywhere allowing for great conversation.

Finally he bought toys to entertain himself including the car, a boat, a Segway, flashlights, knifes, silver; and every tablet that he could find online. A trip to the hospital, of which there were many, included a virtual sound system to entertain the staff. I understand he DJ'd the food distributions in Bolinas as well. I believe he made many new friends here in Wisconsin and carried memories of many old friends from Bolinas and points elsewhere with him into the next life...

Sheriff's Calls items tend to run no longer than 40 words, and they range in subject matter from the trivial ("BOLINAS: At 2:49 a.m. someone complained about loud hot-tubbers") to the disturbing ("WOODACRE: At 9:51 a.m. a woman reported finding the body of her cat with a broken back in her backyard. She believed her son had killed it, and was afraid he would now go after her dog"). Some are about intoxicated or otherwise disturbed people ("BOLINAS: At 3:22 a.m. someone heard a group of drunk people near Smiley's. The people later told deputies they would wrap it up"); some are about family disputes ("BOLINAS: At 9 a.m. a man and woman were heard swearing at each other over a dog that had died during the night"). Many prompt more questions than they answer ("MUIR BEACH: At 11:31 a.m. three men in

suits were knocking on doors, asking if people spoke French"), while some shimmer with the particularities of Northern California life ("DOGTOWN: At 1:59 p.m. someone said two kayakers were harassing seals in the lagoon. Deputies found them acting within the law"). Taken together, they conjure a detailed portrait of life in West Marin, especially the lives of its unluckiest, and nosiest, citizens.

BOLINAS: At 3:08 a.m. a woman who had taken a taxi home from a hospital reported that the taxi driver had become stuck in a ditch outside and was now yelling at her.

STINSON BEACH: At 7:49 a.m. a ranger asked for help with a woman who was having problems with an innkeeper, though he or she was notably vague about it.

FOREST KNOLLS: At 11:20 a.m. a farm stand owner reported receiving an anonymous letter criticizing his high prices.

Newspapers typically publish police blotters that are written either with an absence of style or an overwhelming amount of it. In the first category, you have papers like the San Jose Mercury News (sample item: "1200 block of Sesame Drive, 9:30 a.m. May 5 Cash and jewelry were stolen from a residence. Entry was made through an unlocked rear window"). In the second category, you have proudly hammy papers like the New York Post, which occasionally slather their crime reports with hardboiled slang. (A recent Post item starts out, "A straphanging sicko groped a woman in a Bedford Park subway station, police said.")

The Point Reyes Light goes its own way, delivering its blotter with a deadpan detachment that nevertheless manages to convey mood and emotion. The column is by turns sad and funny, precise and mysterious. Reading it is a bit like eating a bag of assorted, subtly flavored jellybeans.

STINSON BEACH: At 8:04 a.m. two bicycles disappeared through a back door, leaving tracks in the sand.

SAN GERONIMO VALLEY: At 10:07 a.m. a deputy smelled smoke on Nicasio Valley Road, then walked through the redwoods and found a stump covered with smoldering embers. He took a picture of it to deliver to firemen.

Elliott became the Light's editor in 2007, and has written the Sheriff's Calls column since 2008. Now in her mid-30s, she arrived in Marin County after growing up in Oregon and studying writing at the Jack Kerouac School of Disembodied Poetics at Naropa University in Boulder, Colorado. (The university was founded in 1974 by an exiled Tibetan monk; the poetry program was started with the help of Allen Ginsberg and Anne Waldman.) She didn't have a background in journalism, but the Light's publisher at the time hired her anyway.

BY THE BEAUTIFUL SEA

"So exhilarating are the air and water that ladies crossing the beach are seen to flip a handspring."

Quoted by JACK MASON LAST STAGE FOR BOLINAS (1973) Speaking of time, you've lived in Marin for many years. But now you are moving. Why?

Yes, I am moving to Sonoma County. I've had it with Mill Valley. It's become so crowded, so much traffie, and so little responsibility has been devoted to the carrying capacity of the area. We are seriously overpopulated just with respect to water. As far as I'm concerned, every successive group of supervisors and commissioners have been bought off by developers. I saw some of that with my own eyes. I first came here in 1965, and loved it, and then moved to Zen Center in the city. I returned in 1983, as my daughter was getting mugged for her lunch money in the Fillmore.

Twenty-five years ago I participated in a series of meetings called 'Take Back Our Town.' Over 700 people showed up, and we wanted to use water as the basis of determining population. Wanted to cut down traffic. We even ran people for office, but the developers outspent us six to one, and have been building ever since.

Now traffic has reached critical mass, IT money is coming in and bidding houses for hundreds of thousands over asking price, all cash. It feels like the town is filling with people who ruined and fled the last place they lived. I walk on the marsh path with a plastic bag picking up organic yogurt cups and Kleenex and all sorts of trash our newly enlightened denizens fling away at will. I've seen people in Whole Foods yelling at a young mother for being too slow to move her cart due to trying to corral two children, and so many times people honking and screaming at one another in their cars for no reason—IN MILL VALLEY! Well, they're all stressed because it takes so much money and so much work to live here. Couple that with the entitlement that dictates that we are entitled to the best of everything and you have a toxic broth in a paradisiacal setting. I have friends here who are not that, but we are like the proverbial frogs in the water that is being heated slowly. Meanwhile I am spending too much time in traffic, and it's maddening. The water issues will only get worse.

I feel I've spent 40 years fighting for this great place, trying to preserve it, and I'm going to spend what is likely my last vigorous decade not fighting anymore, perhaps helping others, and leave before I get cooked. **




