
Chi Gong Coming To The Community Center





WASHINGTON, May 16, 2013 - Following the Marin County coast is an exercise in rejuvenation while rediscovering the joy of the unspoiled marvels that remain unchanged. It fulfils the desire to commune with and enjoy that which remains both genuine and timeless.

From the wonders of Muir and Stinson Beach through the charms of Bolinas, we continue on the road up the Marin County coast to the mystical and romantic Manka's Inverness Lodge.

Just past Stinson Beach is an estuary, Bolinas Lagoon Preserve Changing with the tides, the lagoon becomes a swampy wetland at low tide and a glistening pond at high tide. The passing days are as dramatic as the scenery and abundant waterfowl around it.

Be careful not to miss the turnoff to legendary Bolinas, a hamlet barely as big as a postage stamp, a town so discreet the locals take down the vay sign to discourage all but the discerning from finding it.

But Bolinas is as real as the illusion of its past, a hippie hidea ns unchanged in many ways for more than 40 years.





Prehistoric Dog Lovers Liked Seafood, Jewelry, Spirituality

An analysis of ancient dog burials finds that the typical prehistoric dog owner ate a lot of seafood, had spiritual beliefs, and wore jewelry that sometimes wound up on the dog.

"Dog burials appear to be more common in areas where diets were rich in aquatic foods because these same areas also appear to have had the densest human populations and the most cemeteries," lead author Robert Losey, a University of Alberta anthropologist, told Discovery News.

The discovery negates speculation that dogs back in the day were just work animals brought along on hunting trips.

"If the practice of burying dogs was solely related to their importance in procuring terrestrial game, we would expect to see them in the Early Holocene (around 9,000 years ago), when human subsistence practices were focused on these animals," Losey continued. "Further, we would expect to see them in later periods in areas where fish were never really major components of the diet and deer were the primary focus, but they are rare or absent in these regions."

For the study, Losey and his team researched dog burials worldwide, but focused particularly on ones located in Eastern Siberia. Siberia appears to have been an ancient hotbed of dog lovers, with the earliest known domesticated dog found there and dating to 33,000 years ago. Dog burials in this region, however, span across a more recent 10,000-year period.

The researchers found that most of the dog burials in this area occurred during the Early Neolithic 7,000-8,000 years ago.

When pastoralists later came through, they did not bury dogs, although they did sacrifice them from time to time.

"I think the hunter-gatherers here saw some of their dogs as being nearly the same as themselves, even at a spiritual level," Losey said. "At this time, dogs were the only animals living closely with humans, and they were likely known at an individual level, far more so than any other animal people encountered. People came to know them as unique, special individuals."

The burials reflect that association. One dog, for example, was laid to rest "much like it is sleeping." A man was buried with two dogs, one carefully placed to the left of his body, and the other to the right. A dog was buried with a round pebble, possibly a toy or meaningful symbol, placed in its mouth. Still other dogs were buried with ornaments and implements, such as spoons and stone knives.

# Limbo Characters

#### Uncommon Youth

By Charles Fox (St. Martin's, 289 pages, \$25.99)

. Paul Getty III and Charles Fox met for the last time over lunch in 2001. Both men were confined to wheel-chairs: Fox from multiple sclerosis, Getty from a 1981 drug-overdose-induced stroke that left him paralyzed and nearly blind at the age of 25. They sat by the swimming pool of Getty's Hollywood estate, the air hot and "jasminepool of Getty's Hollywood estate, the air hot and "jasmine-scented," as Getty's former wife, his mother and various people tended him. Though Getty communicated only in "small, indecipherable clicks," one of the entourage trans-lated for Fox: "He says he wants you to write his story." "Young Paul" Getty had first tried to persuade Fox to write his biography in 1975. "The biography of an eighteen-year-old?" the incredulous writer had replied. The irony is

that, despite the intervening decades, little of the life described in "Uncommon Youth: The Gilded Life and Tragic Times of J. Paul Getty III" occurs

much beyond that age.
By 15, Young Paul, the
grandson of the oil
magnate J. Paul Getty
("Old Paul"), had set fire
to one school and been kicked out of another. He had been given acid by the girlfriend of his drugaddicted father, J. Paul Getty Jr. (known as "Big

Paul"). Set free in Rome by neglectful parents, Young Paul posed nude for an Italian magazine and sold drugs while living with his girlfriend, Martine, and her twin sister, who fancied themselves filmmakers.

The trio fantasized about faking Young Paul's kidnap-ping. They thought the grandson of the wealthiest man in the world at the time would fetch a lovely ransom. "People came up to me and made kidnapping proposals," Young Paul later told Fox. On July 10, 1973, while drunkenly bellowing through the streets, he was abducted by miscreants who demanded a ransom of \$17 million.

This was when Fox entered the Getty orbit. A 30-year-old freelance magazine writer assigned to cover the kidnapping, he paid the twins \$600 for their story. They equivocated; it *might* have been an inside job, but if it were, they insisted, the money would go toward building a better world. Fox also met Marcello, a fellow who did "10minute paintings" to which Young Paul signed his name for a commission ("like painting money," Marcello said). He confirmed that Young Paul had goaded others to abduct him to get at his famously penny-pinching grandfather's wealth, with good reason. "If he can get to his money, he will be a rich man," Marcello said. "Very rich. He will do

great things for his generation."
"Uncommon Youth" is told almost entirely as oral history, based on interviews conducted for the most part after Young Paul was released from his five-month captivity. (Fox died last year, and the book is published posthumously.) Through these interviews we meet a cavalcade of incompetents and the morally bankrupt. We hear from Young Paul's mother, Gail, who is shown as perhaps having encouraged the kidnapping, presumably because she wanted money herself. We hear from Fletcher Chace, a former CIA operative who worked as a troubleshooter for Old Paul and whose attempts at stealth come off as buffoonish.

While still a teen, J. Paul Getty III had tried acid, set fire to one school and been expelled by another, and posed nude for a magazine.

As the case dragged on, out came the nutballs and competing fake kidnappers. Fox's retelling offers a colorful view of the decadence and rot of the era, with the never-ending parties at Big Paul's Marrakesh compound featuring Marlon Brando and the siblings Fonda and freeloaders by the score living off Getty largess. Young Paul called them "limbo characters, the strange, beautiful people that die

young," which would have made an apt title for this book. Old Paul is the only person in "Uncommon Youth" to show dignity and common sense, to inspire any interest beyond prurience. We learn that he returned his children's letters with the spelling corrected. That he had paintings by Chagall and Monet in his bedroom. That he was a workaholic, a slow driver, that he kept a lion named Nero on his 6,000-acre estate outside London and yet was so nervous that he could not bear to watch a grown son water ski. That when Young Paul, age 13, showed up at his grandfather's door dressed like a slob and insisting, "You have ruined this planet," Old Paul simply laughed it off.

He urged his son to settle things quietly with the kidnappers, but publicly refused to pay the initial ransom demand. This was prudent. "I have 14 other grandchildren," Old Paul told the press, "and if I pay one penny now,

then I'll have 14 kidnapped grandchildren."
With no money forthcoming, and the novelty of hauling a rich kid from farm to farm wearing off, the kidnappers (who may or may not be the same men who originally nabbed Young Paul; Fox cannot definitively say) decided to send a message by lopping off one of his ears. They were relative gentlemen about it, nursemaids even in Young

relative gentlemen about it, nursemaids even in Young Paul's memory, procuring iodine and the proper surgical tools. But he bled for days. He told Fox that "rats came in and ate the jelly blood off the floor." After the ear was delivered, Old Paul agreed to pay \$2.8 million.

Immediately after his release, Young Paul and Martine married and for a short time lived the golden life of the louche, skiing in the Alps and "riding camels in Morocco," before turning up on Fox's doorstep outside of San Francisco broke, with Martine hugely pregnant. This is when they first asked Fox to write the biography, hoping to when they first asked Fox to write the biography, hoping to secure a new source of funds.

Fox seems to have felt that he might have a hand in saving them, a notion the couple played into. He agreed to meet them at their Sunset Strip apartment, but when he arrived no one was home except their infant son, Balthazar, staring up from his crib. Fox tried again, hanging out with the couple as Young Paul did speedballs of heroin and cocaine. Fox gave up on the book with a heavy heart.

Perhaps it was Martine admitting, some years after the 2001 lunch, that Young Paul had arranged his own kidnapping that brought Fox back to his notes. ("We needed money for our vision," she told Fox. "We thought . . . we are going to make something totally great with grandfa-ther's money.") Perhaps it was his finally accepting that it was not in his power to rehabilitate or burnish the image of Young Paul, who died in 2011. Better to leave a record, even a blemished one, to let the world know that, in his estimation, "Paul was knocked off his feet before ever he found them."


