Burning Man Symposium •

It was wonderfully ironic that Sunday's Burning Man Symposium took place at Fort Mason right next door to the San Francisco Art Fair which happened on the Marina Green.

The Art Fair was all about beautifully rendered art objects for sale.

Burning Man was all about interactive art that has no price tag.

Burning Man represents the new Art Spirit that is arising, like a phoenix, from the ashes of the old. Not that the old is bad either, but it's frozen in a different cultural

The new Epoch of Art is decommodified and participatory. It's more about sharing than having.

The decommodification of art might be where we might start working our way out of this dead-end of "Late Capitalism." Culture becomes more important than cash. We re-enchant the world. Life becomes a gift.

But back to the Symposium. It was fun and inspiring to be around so many "crazy artists" (creative enthusiasts)

I felt like I was back in Art School and had wandered into the Sculpture Department. I heard talk of TIG welders, CAD laser cutters, mild steel, mirror stainless, powder coating and saw plans of the conversion of stock vehicles into art car mobile sculpture.

There is an emphasis on public art at Burning Man and the vastness of the desert that compels one to think big.

At the Symposium there were workshops on the dirty details of art making, like contracts and fund-raising.

"To burn or not to burn" was the title of the fire guy's presentation. "You build it and then you burn it, so you don't have to store it." Dave laughed. "But burning art is also a lot of work."

He went on to describe the necessary site preparation, safety and crowd control steps. And cleaning the playa after the burn is also arduous. Burning Man prides itself on its "Leave No Trace" principle, one of 10 basic Burning Man principles.

There was a philosophical buzz at the Symposium that centered on the decommodification of art (Decommodification is another one of the 10 principles) There was a feeling of joy and release from the marketplace.

Art for Art's sake at Burning Man.

Bill and I received an art grant to bring the Fortune Wheel back to Burning Man. This year we're calling it the Wheel of Self Reflection to reflect this year's theme: Carni-

We'll be running the wheel but we'll also be undertaking a scientific investigation of the bio-psychic field at Burning Man. After last year's experience with the Wheel I've developed a thesis. I believe that the combined psychic energy of the 69,000 Burners gathered in the Black Rock Desert exponentially increases the synchronicity and serendipity of the messages received through spinning the Wheel of Self Reflection.

Burning Man presents a unique opportunity for people to receive "synchronous information" from the collective bio-psychic field at Black Rock City. Perhaps a doorway to Higher Intelligence opens when a random generator is set up on a charged psychic field.

I could go on to speculate how I feel the bio-psychic field links up to Planet Mind and Galactic Consciousness, but I'm not gonna get that far out.~







excerpt The Peyote from -> Clubhouse

Meanwhile I thoroughly inspected the Peyote. I set the largest and most perfect buttons aside. I wanted to make some plaster molds from them for casting. I experimented with eating small sections of Peyote. I discovered that eating a piece of carrot with a piece of Peyote helped with the taste. The sweetness of the carrot disguised the astringent flavor of the Peyote. Nevertheless I was not able to force much Peyote into my system before it said, "Stop, or I'm going to puke."

Finally I bought a couple of kilos of strawberries from the street vendor and began to make jam. I washed and cleaned the strawberries and Peyote, then simmered the mixture in a big pot with some water and a bunch of sugar. I cooked the mixture all day until it became an homogenous mush. That evening after the jam cooled, I decided to try some. I was alone in the painting studio, and I had a jar of jam beside my painting palette. Every few minutes I would eat a spoonful of jam. It looked like apple butter and tasted like strawberries except with an extra zing that made you mouth pucker. But the jam was delicious and in no time I worked my way through half the jar.

I had a big canvas on my easel. I didn't have a specific idea in mind. I just let my brush and the paint do its thing. I knew that Peyote was noted for its visuals, and painting under the influence seemed like a good way to experience them.

I watched myself in the studio mix paint on the palette while eating another spoonful of jam, then daubing the paint on the canvas, smooshing the color around with my brush. There was something that reminded me of colors of dawn's early morning: soft peaches, delicate pinks, warm yellows and light blues. The colors spoke of love and new beginnings. Occasionally bright sparks of vivid, fluorescent color jumped up from the corners and shadows.

I watched my brush whirl around a blob of magenta. I watched the color spin around my brush, and then noticed how the rest of the world spun around that whorl. I was filled with a feeling of blissful connection to the whole of existence.

As I concentrated on the whirling color, a figure appeared in the periphery of my vision. It was an Indian, a North American Indian wearing a single feather in his hair with the most incredibly beautiful blanket folded over his arms. He didn't look at me personally, but looked straight ahead with dignity and repose. I was thrilled and convinced that he was a spirit guide sent by Peyote. Never in all my days of tripping on LSD, DMT, mushrooms and mescaline had I ever experienced such an apparition. I felt protected, guided and loved.

Whenever I took my eyes off the canvas and actually looked to the periphery, the Indian would disappear. But as soon as I focused again on the canvas, he would appear again in the corner of my eye. I saw the loving consciousness of the plant spirit, and knew that I was home, plugged directly into the Soul of the World.

I studied the vision as closely as I could without looking at it. He was a Pawnee or Sioux from North America, not a Huichol or Zapotec from Mexico like I expected. He stared straight past me, but his circle of awareness included me, and I felt great love and dignity flowing from him into me. I was filled with profound respect and love for my guide and for Peyote. My field of vision had softened and colors were pulsating on and off the canvas like the lights of a Ferris wheel. It was difficult to keep my attention on the canvas. It was difficult to keep my attention anywhere. My mind and my self merged and melted with the colors. I laid my brush down, then I laid myself down on a blanket on the floor of the studio and let myself be overcome by the radiant color. Gradually everything faded into sleep.


