More Doors Open for Food Assistance in Marin

Starting June 1, newly eligible clients can apply for CalFresh

San Rafael, CA – People receiving financial assistance from a federally funded program won't have to wait much longer to be eligible to receive <u>CalFresh</u> food benefits after a change in state law.

As of June 1, people receiving <u>Supplemental Security Income</u> / State <u>Supplemental Payment</u> (SSI/SSP) can apply to receive CalFresh benefits with assistance from the <u>Marin County Department of Health and Human Services</u> (HHS). Also known as the <u>Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program</u> (SNAP), CalFresh provides qualified applicants with an electronic benefit transfer (EBT) card that may be used like a debit card in participating grocery stores and farmers markets to supplement food purchases.

As of June 2018, 3,182 Marin County residents received SSI/SSP. Of that number,1,417 individuals (44.5 percent) were 65 years old or older and 2,427 (76.2 percent) were people with disabilities. Marin HHS expects 3,000 residents to be newly eligible to CalFresh food benefits with this program expansion.

SSI is a needs-based program that provides a monthly benefit to individuals who are blind, elderly, or have a disability. For disabled people who have never worked, or those who haven't worked enough in the recent years to qualify for Social Security Disability Insurance, SSI may be the only program available to them.

"CalFresh is the best tool we have for fighting hunger and improving nutrition among lower-income residents," said Social Service Division Director Jesse Paran. "Some of the recipients are on fixed incomes and don't have many additional resources for food aside from the CalFresh contributions. We're thankful that this expansion is likely to increase participation and improve the health of our most needy residents."

HHS staff is prepared to help older adults and people with disabilities who receive SSI apply for CalFresh. Approximately 9,500 Marin residents receive CalFresh benefits. In 2018, there were 4,263 children and 1,488 older adults who received the benefits.

CalFresh benefits stretch household budgets, allowing individuals and families to afford nutritious food, including more fruit, vegetables, and other healthy options. Food benefits for one person range from \$15 to \$192 per month, with a national average of \$105 to \$110 per month for older adults and people with disabilities.

Households that already receive CalFresh and have a member of the household that has been excluded because they receive SSI do <u>not</u> need to re-apply or contact HHS. Also, if SSI applicants choose to apply for CalFresh, their SSP benefit will not go away and will remain the same.

"As a community, we are rapidly aging and aging into disability," said Eli Gelardin, Executive Director for the Marin Center for Independent Living. "People over 60 will soon account for a third of our overall population. Social isolation, food insecurity, access to transportation and housing make a significant impact on health and wellness. Food is a form of medicine, and the expansion of CalFresh will ensure that thousands in Marin will have a better quality of life."

The CalFresh application process includes:

- Completing an application by phone, online, or in person.
- Providing proof of income and expenses, if needed.
- Completing an interview by phone or in person.

Counties determine eligibility in 30 days or less. If the applicant has very little to no resources, eligibility can be expedited.

Reasonable accommodations and services in multiple languages are available for applicants. Additional state-funded nutrition benefits are also available to households participating in CalFresh that experience a drop in benefits due to the state now counting SSI income in the CalFresh case.

Tony

Sloan Kettering Hospital means a lot to New Yorkers. Clark's Bar does too. It was a hangout for the "in" crowd. Clark's Bar was at 55th and 3rd. My place was a block away and I went to Clark's regularly at noontime for a salad and a hamburger. They made beautiful hamburgers for thirty-five cents. I met a woman there. We got involved and then uninvolved if you know what I mean. We still talked, but she held a grudge. She knew I was a painter, and she challenged me, "You could do a lot with your talent. Why don't you do something worthwhile? Like teach the children at Sloan Kettering Hospital?

I knew nothing about the hospital which was on the east side, not far away, 68th and York Ave. I thought it over. I don't know what made me do it but I went up there and applied. They accepted me as their resident painter for the children's ward. (I have an honorary degree in child care. When I was onboard ships I took care of the children. I love children, they're honest and

they're fun.)

My job was to paint anything they wanted. I sat with them. They were the boss, whatever they wanted I would paint. I never disappointed them, although one time I brought scissors, and

sharp scissors were a no-no in the children's ward.

There were a lot of beautiful people volunteering. They called us Blue Bells. I never met such wonderful people. It was good for me. I was there for two years. The director was happy I was there. My job was to keep away the sadness. We had a big play room adjoining a ward with about 40 kids. I went there about 4:30 and stayed to about 6 or whatever. I enjoyed it. I felt good. But the hospital administration weas a pain. They insisted I have a doctor. I said I don't need a doctor. We got to arguing and I left after two years.

Long before that I was at the hospital one evening, and a nurse says, "Tony wants to see you." Tony was in bed, about 12 or 13 and dying of leukemia. He was pale and thin and had a long

equine face. He looked like a horse.

"Hi, Tony." I said to him. "What you want me to do?"

He handed me a big glob of clay and said "Make me a horse."

"Holy mackerel" I thought, "What a challenge."

I wasn't really a sculptor but I had pretty good hands, and I knew what a horse looked like When I was 9 years old I was a real cowboy on our ranch in Hollister. I had my own horse and I could ride like the wind. My brother and I took care of a hundred and ninety-five head of cattle. I knew what a horse looked like.

I had this big blob of clay. My fingers mingled with the clay. I was intimidated. Tony wouldn't keep his eyes off me. I had no idea what I was doing. All of a sudden this beautiful horse appeared. I'm not going to get into the spiritual stuff, but a miracle did happen. I couldn't believe it. It was a beautiful horse with flared nostrils and mane streaming in the wind. I handed the horse to Tony. He grasped it in his hand, "Oh, thank you, thank you." he murmured faintly. It wasn't that dramatic or anything. I stayed with him for a while longer. He just held on to that horse. I'm there for all the kids, but being with Tony was special to me. Finally I got up and said goodbye. I shook his hand and said "I'll see you tomorrow."


I went back the next day. When I walked into Tony's room, there's a nurse and no Tony. We


never talked about death at the hospital.

She was a pretty, Filipino nurse. She had a tear in her eye and didn't answer me, just shook her head sadly.

"I guess the horse took Tony to a better place." I said to her.
