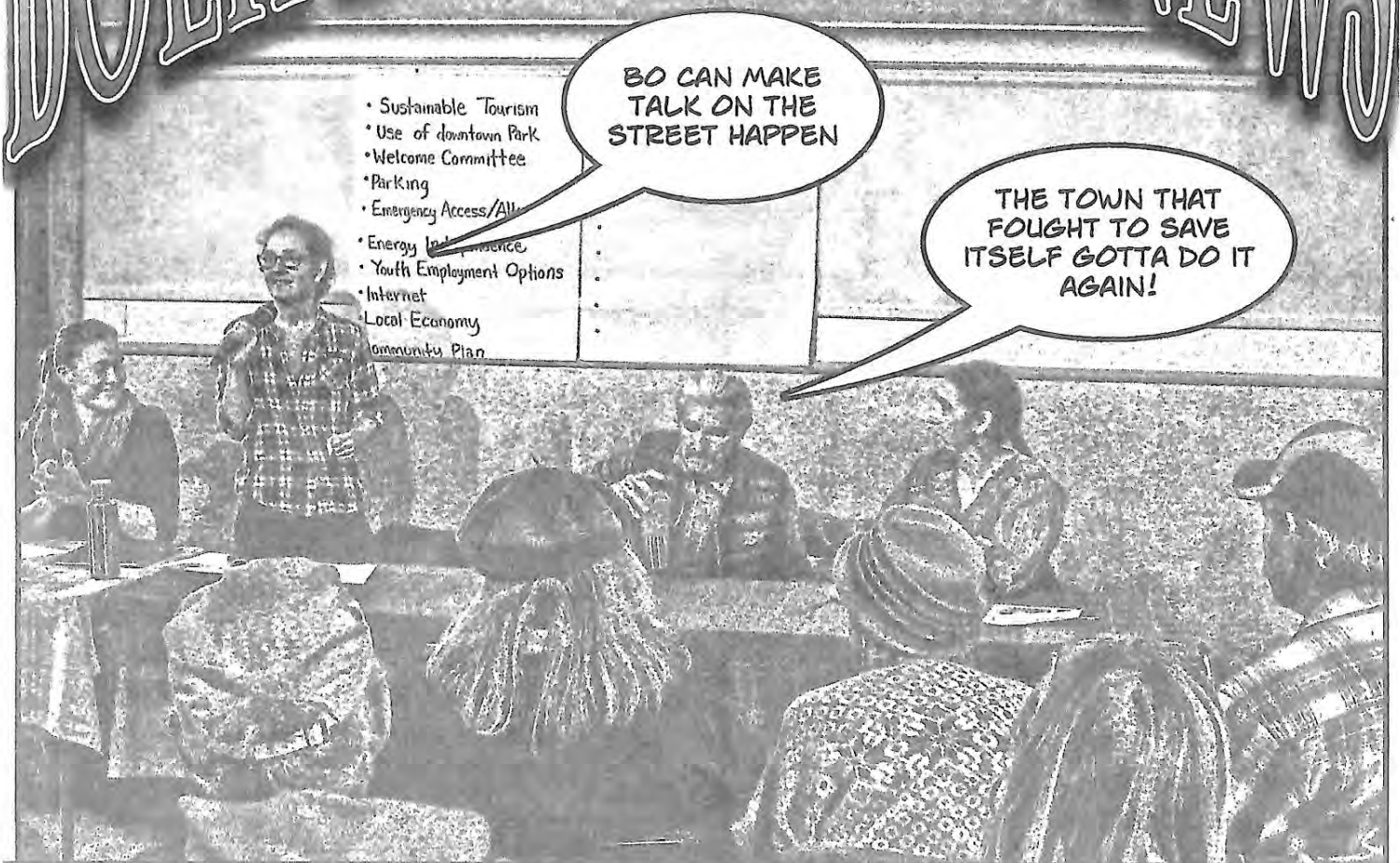

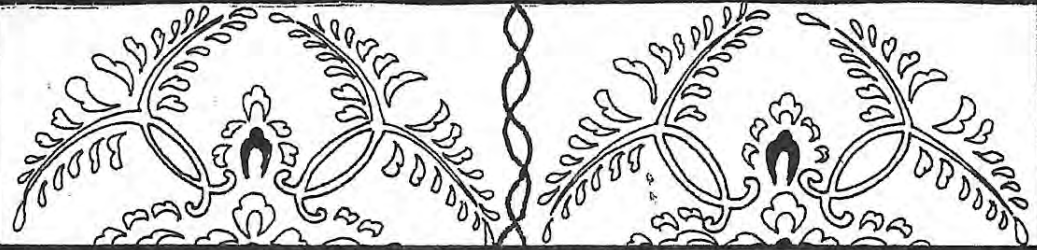

I noticed that there will be a discussion on housing soon and I have an idea to place on the table. I have developed a similar program in Madison Wisconsin but that is another discussion and I understand that space in the Hearsay is limited.

**First Three Facts:**

Any person in Bolinas or anywhere else in the US can secure a dry place to stay and three meals a day by simply committing a crime of that justifies incarceration.

Citizens of a community in good standing deserve the right to have the same opportunities for shelter and the additional freedom that comes with obeying the laws.

The Bolinas regulations regarding water and sewer permits have served the community well with regard to growth, planning and development and should remain in place.

**My Idea:**

Allow micro homes (8 x 16 feet max – just a bit larger than a jail cell) on lots **without** sewer and water. These units would not have running water, gas, septic, or electricity (although 12 volt systems and solar power to charge them would be allowed as well as a small propane cooking and heating system).

Each "micro home" would reside on a 20 x 20 foot lot (i.e. a 100 x 100 garden lot could contain 10 micro lots and a 10 x 100 foot common path (No Vehicles).

The homes would be stick built to STRICT standards using sustainable materials and designs approved by a governing body or the community. They would also have to be damn cute and no additional clutter, trash, storage, or vehicles could occupy the lots or common space. The units should cost a couple of thousand dollars and could be built by most individuals with a little help. The unit must remain owner occupied and the owners must occupy the units for a minimum of 180 day per year. (i.e. no rentals or vacation units). The land trust could own units and provide them to worthy occupants at their discretion. If state permitting requires the units could be on wheels or skids and permitted as a campground with additional local statues attached.

Units could contain "porta potties" and gray water systems as long as the owners demonstrated the ability to dispose on the materials properly in approved facilities. The community could also provide a public facility for showers, laundry, and other activities like exercise or entertainment.

Much more to discuss but there is an outline for consideration.

**The Weekender**

This last weekend was one of the strangest and most inspiring weekends I have ever experienced in Bolinas.

It was strange because I came to town on Sunday and only spent two and a half hours here, all of it inside the community center. I didn't even visit my property! Instead I made a beeline from the city to the community center to attend the "Important Community Meeting" at 5pm that was announced in the Hearsay and on signs about town. A lot of people showed up for the meeting, the place was seriously buzzing with anticipation. It was more or less a call to action to save our beautiful and unique community from an unaffordable housing crisis.

Mark Butler courageously called together the people of Bolinas and acted as the evening's emcee. The BoCan group and the Bolinas Community Land Trust presented current initiatives and possible housing solutions. Then an open discussion ensued. People expressed genuine curiosity, anger and hope in their questions and comments. It was an amazing thing to witness: a good ol' fashion, free expression, and civilly minded town meeting. Those in attendance seemed unanimously concerned that too many residents who rent their homes are being priced out and pushed out of the community they created, nurtured, were born into, work within, and are raising families in.

In our current market economy everything is a commodity, even our homes. Homes were once considered to be sacred places; warm, welcoming, places of respite, hubs of self care, shelters for families and friends, places we grew up in physically, psychically and spiritually as humans. Homes have coolly become houses, and in some circles they are chillingly called investment properties. The common catchall phrase for this semantic, perceptual, and real problem is gentrification. SF is being ravaged by it and Bolinas is feeling the pain of it too.

For the last 4 years I worked for California's largest affordable housing provider, the John Stewart Company (JSCO). My role was supporting the employees of the company as their human resources manager. John Stewart attended Stanford with Tony Serra and they played on the football team together, in the world of affordable housing he is considered to be a visionary simply because he believed communities that were mixed (economically, racially, and so forth) were healthy communities. As many of us already know diversity is needed for a healthy ecosystem to sustain itself and the same goes for communities of people. Even though I wasn't directly engaged in the management, development, or fund raising of projects for affordable housing; I nonetheless developed a pretty strong understanding of how affordable housing real estate operates. I learned there is an enormous, growing, and desperate need for both low-income and middle-income housing all over our state. Meeting this basic need - the need for safe, affordable and community centric housing - is hard to achieve because 1) red tape and government regulation often kill initiatives, and 2) communities afraid of change often fight vehemently to ward off the very help they need. Fortunately, the residents of Bolinas on Sunday night showed themselves to be the exception to the rule (I wouldn't expect anything less from us). As Mark Butler said at the start and end of the meeting we are The Town That Fought to Save Itself and it's time we do it again! Applause and cheers broke out, change is being welcomed. What a joy to be part of such an incredible, enlightened, thoughtful and progressive community.

And concerns beyond housing were addressed at the meeting too. Issues such as sustainable tourism, downtown parking, energy independence, the creation of jobs, and reviewing the community plan for future sustainability. It was announced that these meetings will be ongoing, possibly monthly, and that action committees will be formed.

I think it's safe to say that affordable housing solutions, and a sustainable future will be the talk of the town for some time to come.

## The Community Meeting

On Sunday over 200 people (that's roughly 10% of the permanent population of Bolinas) showed up for the Community Meeting about Housing.

Evie explained at the beginning that the meeting's purpose was to raise community awareness, to foster dialogue and to "make talk on the street happen." The focus was kept on housing, and avoided the recent tagging tragedy.

Arianne Dar spoke about what the BCLT (Bolinas Community Land Trust) is doing to encourage affordable housing in Bolinas. A recent letter to homeowners suggested ways to address the problem of no affordable housing including 2nd units and senior and property caretaking.

Don Smith from the BCPUD added that he is working with the County on septic issues concerning 2nd units and offered the possibility of the County waiving fees on 2nd units in Bolinas if certain deed restrictions were applied.

Arianne said there is some progress in the development of mobile units as 2nd units. Perhaps used units will be forthcoming from the County. Someone in the audience pointed out that the current unregulated development of Mesa lots with a fence, a trailer and a porta-pottie is not sustainable. Arianne answered that a "house on wheels" would be tied into the septic system.

Arianne also touched on the purchase and conversion of the College of Marin Marine Biology Lab, but said it was a long shot. The Weber property is currently off the market.

She talked about the Tachera property and how the legalization of the former trailer park was blocked by the Williamson Act which sets strict limits on housing on land zoned agricultural.

"The BCLT needs some land that is zoned multi-family," she told the crowd. "We have a water meter."

Concern was expressed about population increase and density. Arianne noted that the number of school kids has dropped from 270 to 104 next year. "The town can't live on weekend use alone."

A local tradesman said that County fees are 20x higher than in the 70's. "14 months and \$20k for a simple foundation!"

Question was raised about how to differentiate between long time locals and newcomers. Lesa Kramer, the BCLT's Executive Director, explained that Federal Funding requires income verification and prohibits discrimination. She encouraged anyone interested to get on the BCLT's waiting list, either by filling out a form at BO-GAS or signing up online at [bolinaslandtrust.org](http://bolinaslandtrust.org).

The County so far has nixed composting toilets, but County Health has given the green light to a pilot project involving honey wagons and the sewer farm. John Hulls from Pt. Reyes has been studying pathogens in night soil by placing microchips in compost piles. Results have been encouraging.

Discussion arose about airbnb, the online vacation rental service. The County is investigating placing limits on it. Remick said that he has asked the County to give the money from the transit tax on vacation rentals to Bolinas instead of depositing it in the County's general fund.

Evie spoke BO-CAN (BolinasCAN@gmail) and suggested that work could be done on individual issues by small groups. She envisioned a monthly BO-CAN meeting and a big yearly Town Meeting. A list was drawn up of some of the issues to be addressed:

"It's up to us!" Mark Butler exclaimed. "The town that fought to save itself gotta do it again!"

## Story of the Wheel of Life

Today after I put the Hearsay to bed I'll install a display about the Wheel of Life at the Post Office. The display tells the story of the Wheel and its association with Burning Man. The following story about the origin of the Wheel is from the display. You can see more at the PO.

"I've decided to take a sabbatical." I told Greg, my boss at Scenic Designs, a small firm in Santa Rosa that specialized in carnival art.

We'd started out as a team painting carnival rides at county fairs all over the West Coast. But like a bad marriage our relationship crumbled as the business grew.

My title at Scenic Designs was Art Director and I did it all: ride painting, sign painting, silk-screening and running the crews in the field. It was physically hard, artistically challenging, unrelenting labor and I had burned out. I needed to take a break, and instead of quitting I decided it was more appropriate to take a sabbatical.

"Sure you can take off." Greg chided me, "But too bad you never made your fortune wheel. You had a big shop with all kinds of equipment and you never took advantage of it."

He was right and his words stung. I had designed my own carnival game, a fortune wheel based on a 16th century woodcut. I dreamed about having my own carnival game. But I had never built my dream wheel. Greg was right. I was a loser.

Humbled and hurting I took off on my sabbatical and went to visit my friends, Ed and Maile, on Orcas Island. "You've gotta help me make my fortune wheel." I said to Ed after I got to Orcas. I told him about my "sabbatical" and the remarks of my former boss. I showed him the full scale plans I had drawn.

"Sure, I'll help you make it." Ed answered. "If we can take it to the Barter Faire in Tonasket, Washington after we build it." I agreed, and we got to work. We bought most of our materials at the Exchange, a local recycling station. We cut the big wheel out of an old real estate sign. And we made the two smaller wheels from recycled plywood. The axle was a pillow block assembly from a ventilation fan. We built the stand from scrap lumber.

Ed and Maile helped me paint the wheels using all the colors of the rainbow. I painted "Wheel of Life" on the wooden banner at the top, and then stood back to admire the finished product. It was beautiful, like a dream come true. There was even a category of "Dreams" on the big wheel.

We roped the Wheel of Life to the top of Ed's truck and hauled it over the Cascade mountains to the Barter Faire in Tonasket, Washington.

We set up the Wheel of Life at the Barter Faire. It was an instant success. Everyone stopped by and spun their fortune. We advertised "\$1 per spin or trade." And we wound up with cookies, candy, crystals, smoked salmon, handmade soap, magic mushrooms, weed, woolen goods and enough money for gas home.
