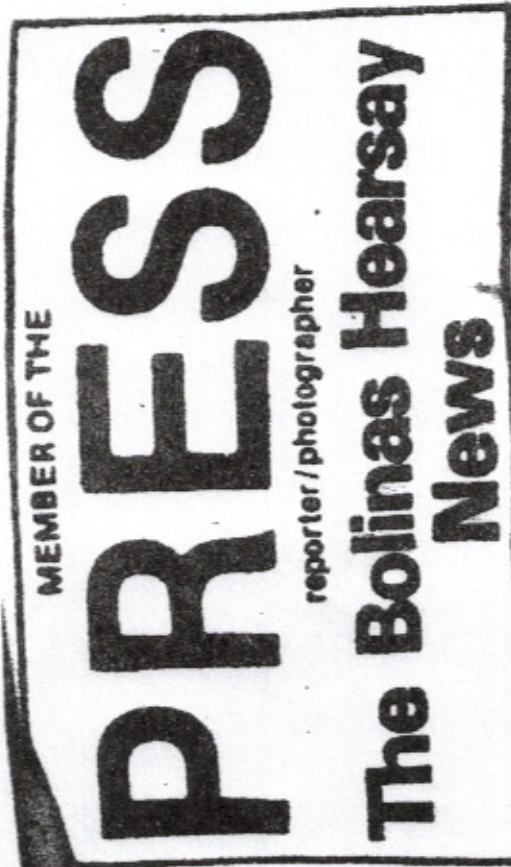
The Bolinas Community Center will be closing the Free Box from Monday June 10th to Thursday June 13th.

Our right to solar energy

I am writing to alert the public that a panel of state senators recently gutted common-sense legislation to protect everyone's right to make their own solar energy without the utility getting in the way—and free ourselves from crushingly high electricity prices. It's called the Solar Bill of Rights (S.B. 288) and it would have ensured that everyone can make and store solar energy on their property without punitive fees designed to discourage solar. The utilities lobbied our lawmakers to kill these provisions, and lawmakers on the senate appropriations committee obliged, without any public notice or discussion. This is a great example of how the utilities will do anything to protect their monopoly, even as they raise electricity rates on consumers.

I ask you to contact your state senator and ask them to resurrect the Solar Bill of Rights. Let's insist that our lawmakers stand up for our right to make energy on our property without red tape or punishment, and free ourselves from the expensive utility monopoly.

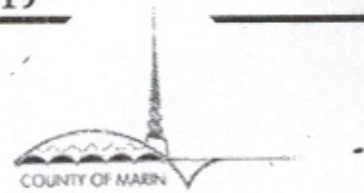
PACK YOUR BAGS

Rebecca Mead's article on how Airbnb is negatively affecting Barcelona and countless other communities was most

welcome ("Airbnb Moves In," April 29th). I've watched my beautiful rural part of Marin County, California, become hollowed out as techies and foreign investors buy up houses, only to list them on Airbnb for forty-five to fifty weeks a year. Over-tourism in Barcelona is also being fuelled by the growing cruise-ship industry. Huge vessels, each of which disgorges as many as six thousand passengers, can drive locals away and bring neighborhood streets to a standstill. Unsurprisingly, anti-cruise-ship demonstrations have occurred in Barcelona, Venice, and Palma de Majorca. But it is not just historic port cities that are in trouble: I recently discovered that Florence, which is more than an hour from the coast, is so deluged with cruise-ship passengers who are bused in from Livorno that for most of the year it's nearly impossible to comfortably visit the Uffizi Gallery and the Accademia.

Measure A Keeps Preserving Farms and Ranches County awards grant to Marin Agricultural Land Trust to preserve ranchland

San Rafael, CA – Marin County Parks understands the value of farming and ranching to the local economy and to Marin's history. Over the past five years, Parks has awarded 12 grants to help purchase agricultural conservation easements to preserve over 7,000 acres of working farms and ranches through its Farmland Preservation Grant Program.

Now, Parks is doing it again to preserve the 758-acre Ielmorini Back Ranch in the hills between Nicasio and Novato.

The Marin County Board of Supervisors on June 4 approved a grant agreement between the County and the Marin Agricultural Land Trust (MALT) worth \$1,516,000, which will be matched with private funds to purchase the easement over Ielmorini Back Ranch. The County's funding contribution comes from the Farmland Preservation Grant Program, the result of a quarter-cent sales tax on purchases made in Marin known as Measure A.

In support of its mission to permanently protect Marin's agricultural land for agricultural use, MALT purchases easements over working farms and ranches to preserve them as undeveloped open spaces and ensure that economically viable agriculture persists in perpetuity.

The easement deal adds to a large block of MALT-protected ranches that are classified as essential to regional conservation goals created by the Bay Area Open Space Council's Conservation Lands Network. Upwards of 83 percent of all land in Marin is classified as open space.

Craig Richardson, Parks' Senior Open Space Planner, said Marin County Parks is leveraging Measure A dollars to not only preserve agricultural land from potential development but to protect essential habitat for several species. The northern spotted owl, the California red-legged frog, the foothill yellow-legged frog, and the western pond turtle are special-status species that would find suitable habitat on the Ielmorini property, located about halfway between Stafford Lake and Nicasio Reservoir just east of Petaluma-Point Reyes Road.

Thanks to MALT's presence and efforts in the county, the Measure A Farmland Preservation Program has racked up an impressive track record of helping to conserve Marin's farmland. Since the inception of the grant program in 2014, it helped conserve 12 working farms and ranches with over 17 miles of streams, 1,815 acres of forested habitat, 4,886 acres of grassland/rangeland and 28 acres of wetlands, all in rural West

Marin. All the properties have deep family roots in farming and ranching but were close to being sold for nonagricultural use.

The Measure A Farmland Preservation Program is supported by a 2012 quarter-cent sales tax approved by Marin voters and is dedicated to protecting and preserving working farms and ranches at risk of subdivision and development.

An agricultural conservation easement does not convey ownership of a property. Instead, it conveys certain rights to the easement holder and/or obligations to the landowner. In this case the easement ensures that economically viable agriculture at Ielmorini Back Ranch will continue while balancing protection of the natural resources of the property, in perpetuity.

All told, more than \$14.1 million of Measure A Farmland Preservation funds have been used to preserve just over 7,000 acres of local agricultural lands since the grant program was initiated in 2014. With the addition of Ielmorini Back Ranch's 758 acres, MALT has protected a contiguous swath of approximately 14,383 acres, or 22 square miles, and more than 54,000 acres in all throughout West Marin.

A quarter-cent retail transactions and use tax, Measure A not only is intended for farmland preservation but also for care of Marin's existing parks and open spaces and to support regional community parks projects and programs. Fifteen percent of the tax proceeds are set aside for the acquisition of property rights to protect agriculture, and 5 percent is devoted to enhancing values on easement-protected lands via grants.

"MALT is proud to partner with the ranch's owners, Doug and Cathy Ielmorini, and their four children, to support their family dairy operation, protect important habitat and safeguard these productive rangelands for agriculture forever," said MALT Executive Director Jamison Watts. "We are grateful to Doug and Cathy for their partnership and look forward to the years ahead as we work together to steward these precious resources."

"What's next on your agenda, Conceito Bandito? You leave me tied naked to a telephone pole till morning?" He would be capable of it.

"No. I feed you. How does that sound?"

"Intravenous or regular?"

"You're disgusting, Gillian. Regular, of course. The Watson House, the best Bolinas has to offer. Have you ever been there?"

"Nope."

"Wait and see." We got back on the horse and trotted slowly down the beach to the part that belonged to the state, then walked the horse slowly past the empty parking lot to the road. It was a fifteen-minute ride into Bolinas and we got there just as the sun was setting; it seemed as though the entire world were lit in red and gold.

We stopped in front of a small dilapidated Victorian house and tied up the horse as I looked around. There were a number of hippies wandering in and out of the house and a discreet sign said "The Watson House," but it offered no further information as to what it was.

"What is this place?"

"A restaurant, dopey. What did you think?"

"How do I know? Hey . . . by the way, I have to call my neighbor and tell her I'll be late. She's taking care of my little girl."

"That's okay. They have a phone inside." He swung slowly up the steps to the house and opened the screen door without knocking. It had the look of a private house belonging to a large family and certainly no suggestion of a restaurant about it. Vast quantities of laundry hung on a clothesline, and a strange assortment of bicycles and motorcycles stood outside, while two cats and a dog played in the grass. It had a friendly, homey look to it which appealed to me and seemed well-suited to Chris Matthews.

"Hi, gang. What's doing?" Chris walked straight into the kitchen and sniffed into a pot on a brilliantly clean, museum-piece stove. There were three girls in the kitchen and a man. The man wore his hair to his waist, tied neatly back with a leather thong. He was wearing what looked like a pajama top over his jeans, and it probably was, but what struck me most were the bright, kindly eyes that stood out above his beard.

Without moving a single muscle in his face, his eyes seemed to smile and say a dozen welcoming things. The girls were all pretty, young, and simply dressed.

"Gillian, this is Bruce . . . Anna, Penny, and Beth. They live here." Bruce and the girls all said hi, and Chris shepherded me back to a little room decorated in cheerful Victoriana and Tiffany lamps.

"What is this place, Chris? It's neat."

"Isn't it? It's actually a hippie commune, but to support themselves they run a restaurant, and it's the best goddam food this side of the bay. You should try the escargots, they're terrific."

"I will." And I did, and they were. And so was the coq au vin, and the homemade bread, and the salad, and the mousse au chocolat and the tarte aux fraises. It was a royal repast. Chris had been right,

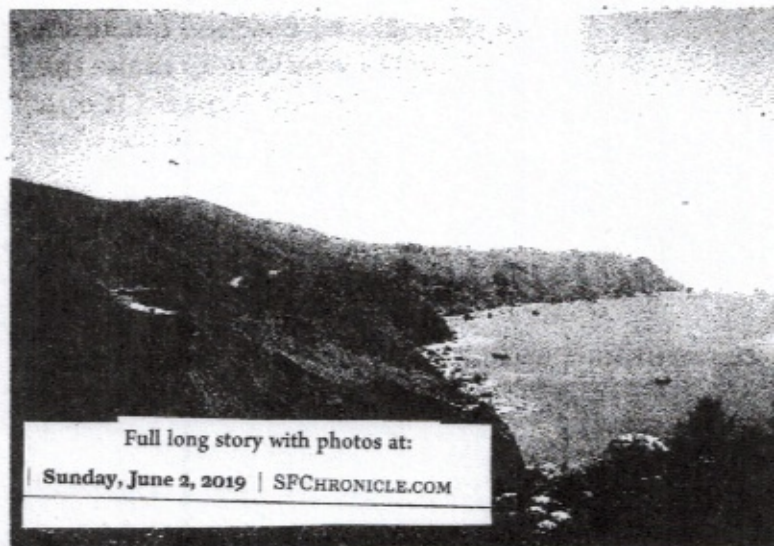
the food was superb. But there was more to it than that. The friendliness of the place was endearing too. I had been right on the way in—it had the feeling of a home with many children in it. There were twenty-seven people living there at the time, and each one contributed his or her efforts to the restaurant. They drifted in and out as we sat there in the candlelight at one of the eight small tables. Everyone seemed to know Chris, and a few stopped and sat at our table for a few minutes before going into the kitchen, or back upstairs.

"Do you come here a lot?"

"Yes. Especially in the summer. I rent a small shack in Bolinas and sometimes I just come by to bullshit with the gang. Sometimes I come here to eat. But only on special occasions." He was teasing me gently, but he had a nice way of doing it. His smile lit up his face as he did, and his eyes said that he meant no harm. He was a gentle man.

How heritage shaped a farm in West Marin

Shao Shan Farm reclaims a lost identity through Chinese crops

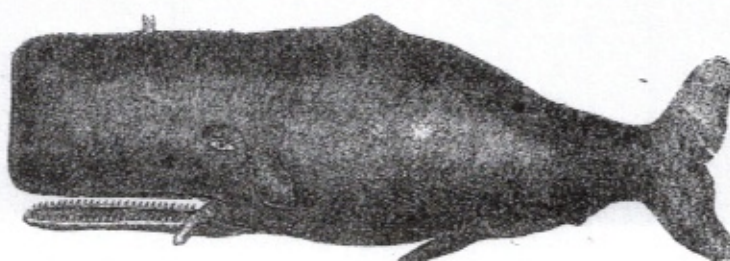

A drive through West Marin feels like a roller coaster, soaring down roads that twist and wind along the frothy coast and steep ridges. The ride flattens out in the small town of Bolinas, where the road becomes unpaved right around the corner from the fire department. That's where you'll find Shao Shan Farm, an organic Chinese heritage vegetable farm so new that there's no official sign yet.
