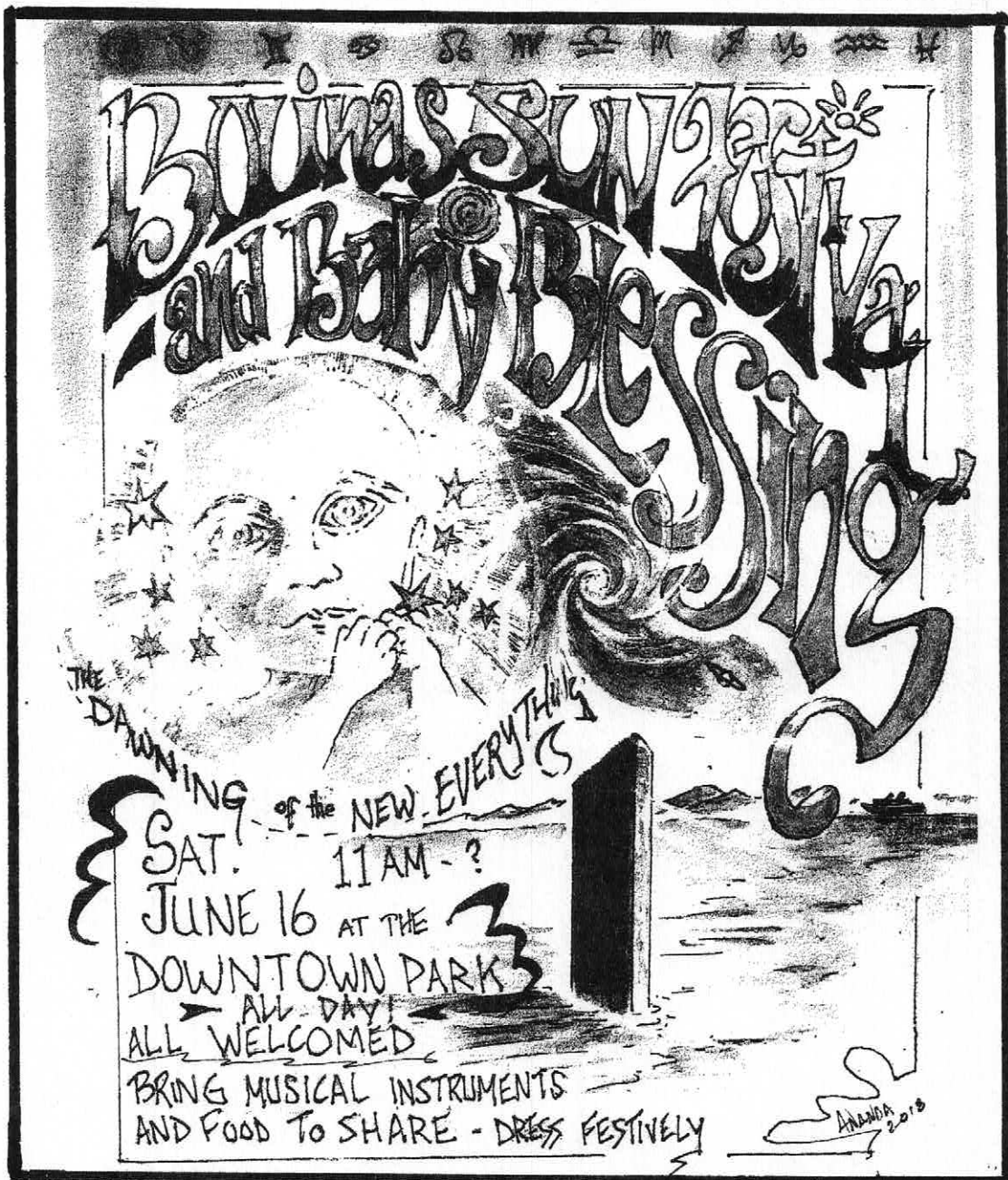

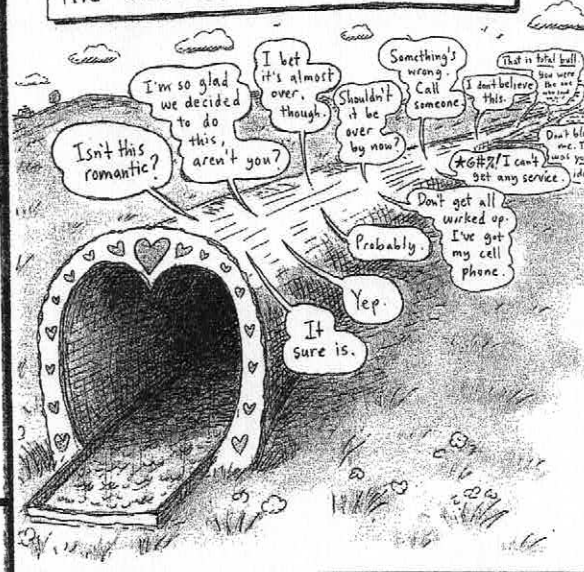
Bobo Connection!

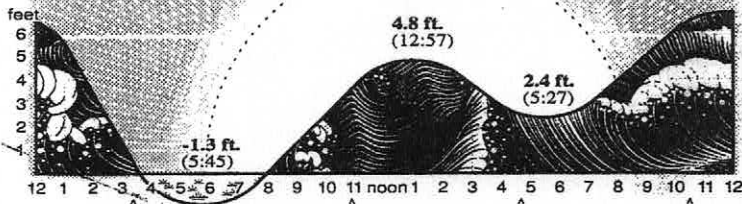

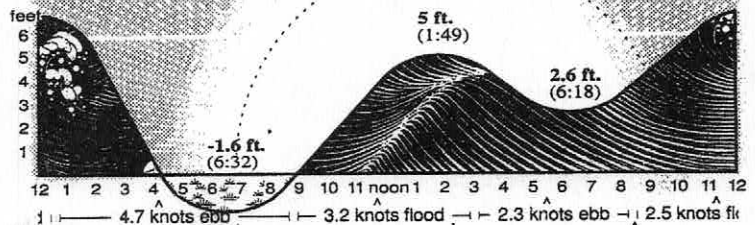

It's coming up this Saturday, all day in the park, no beach etc. etc... So I made a poster for it and nobody seems to quite get it. "The other thing that was a big, big crop here was hay [late 1800s-early 1900s], because you think of the city, and the city was powered by horses, so hay was a really important product. "My fear is that real estate is going to overtake farming, and right now Bolinas has a working green belt all the way around it, from the Point Reyes National Seashore that has leased ranches, with Bill Niman all the way around to the Moritz property on the edge of Dogtown, it's a continuous swath of working land, and my personal goal is to see that permanently protected as working land. It's a bit of a long shot, but actually, the USF purchase is very helpful in that cause."

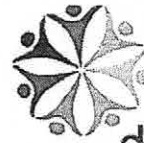

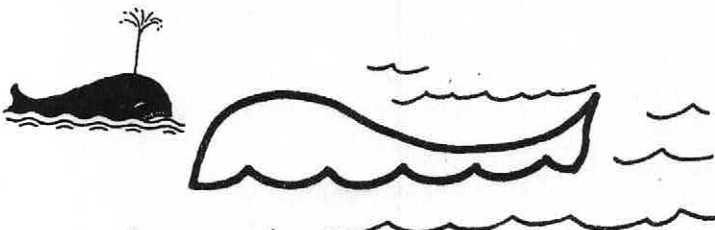
