



In the nineties, I ran a program called Home is a Habitat, through the wonderful alternative classroom known as Pine Gulch.

For two consecutive years, the children intimately explored a local habitat known as "Coastal Scrub". Along with researching and becoming familiar with its plant and animal citizenry, the students spent hours on what we came to call "Our Sacred Land".

The Pt. Reyes Bird Observatory (now Pt. Blue) had given their permission for us to use what is known as "Miwok Meadows" for this ground of learning, land which was under their purview, but outside of their gridded research area.

Once a Miwok village site, this area had come to be occupied, at some point, by a group called "The Church of the Golden Rule" who had cleared the land for agriculture.

I'm uncertain the date at which they abandoned their efforts, but the habitat was well on its way to recovering itself, and I was thrilled when we were given permission to carry on our studies there, as I'd always sensed it was a special and magical place.

At the end of our experience and study, we created a musical play (also called Home is a Habitat) wherein the children brought the habitat to life on the stage and shared what they had learned.

Many poems were written by the children during this learning adventure, some shared in a calendar we produced, to help fund the project. And, we entered the River of Words contest that had been created by Robert Hass, then Poet Laureate of the U.S.

My son Tobi, submitted the above poem, which brought an award and the honor of reading it, along with other finalists, at the Library of Congress in Washington DC:

Please join us on Sunday, June 24th, to offer our gratitude to this creek, which provides the water for our town, and for A Remembering of the First People in Miwok Meadows.

And, you'll understand why a 10-year-old boy from Bolinas would write a poem about the love of this place... We'll meet in the parking lot of the Pt. Blue Field Station

(Pt Reyes Bird Observatory) on Mesa Rd. at 9 AM.

Editorial: We have too much to lose with Trump's offshore oil drilling plan

Marin is not a hotbed of support for reopening California's coastline to offshore drilling.

Our bay and beaches have already witnessed the environmental damage that oil spills can create.

President Donald Trump's plans to open the door even wider to that threat doesn't make sense, from environmental, economic and energy standpoints.

But Trump is pushing forward, according to a report by the National Parks Conservation Association, a nonprofit organization that is already hardly a big fan of the administration.

Secretary of the Interior Ryan Zinke has issued a list of 47 areas where energy companies could purchase oildrilling leases between 2019 and 2024. According to the report, areas of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and the Point Reyes National Seashore could be included among those sites.

Trump and Zinke's plan reverses long-standing policy that kept California's coastline free of new drilling sites. Drilling in state waters has been banned since the 1969 Santa Barbara oil spill where the release of 4.2 million gallons of oil killed wildlife and damaged the recreation and fishing industry.

In 2007, Marin got a taste of the damage that a much smaller oil spill can do when the Cosco Busan oil tanker accident caused 54,000 gallons of bunker fuel to spill into the bay. The spill fouled 69 miles of shoreline and killed 6,800 birds.

"With this administration you have to assume the worst. They will keep their finger on the scale in favor of oil and gas exploration," warned Rep. Jared Huffman, D-San Rafael.


For old-timers across Marin, Trump's venture into reopening California's coastline to oil drilling is a reminder of President Ronald Reagan's interior secretary James Watts' similar proposals.

The political backlash to that plan fueled the drilling moratoriums that have been in place for decades.

No one should be surprised that Trump is reviving that plan. He knows that he is not widely popular across the state, so what does he have to lose? What does he have to gain?

The right question to ask is what does the environment and the economy have to lose? Far too much. That's why the unfolding of the leasing process deserves sharp public focus from Huffman and state and county officials.

Fin whale washes up in Bolinas after ship strike

Almost a year to the day since a spectacular 79-foot blue whale washed up on Agate Beach, a 58-foot fin whale wound up on nearby Brighton Beach after meeting the same fate: death by ship strike. On May 22, the dead fin whale was spotted hung up on Duxbury Reef, according to a letter by Bolinas resident Kent Khtikian published in the Hearsay News last week. Researchers with the Marine Mammal Center and California Academy of Sciences found the whale's skull, vertebrae and ribs fractured. It was one of two fin whales, which are among the fastest species in the ocean, that washed up in the Bay Area in the same week, bringing the total to five since March. The species is listed as endangered, with the population in the North Pacific at about 1,600. Several years ago, the Cordell Bank and Greater Farallones National Marine Sanctuaries spearheaded efforts to alter shipping routes based on whale habitat and establish voluntary speed reductions outside San Francisco Bay between May and November. Greater Farallones Superintendent Maria Brown said around 45 percent of ships cooperated in 2017, up from 29 percent in 2015. By reducing speed to 10 knots from the usual 15 or 20, whale mortality rates go down significantly, even when one is hit. Mr. Khtikian wrote, "You may also want to bear in mind, when you are deciding to purchase a less costly import over a domestic-sourced product, that in addition to the perils that they pose to whales, the 16 largest ships emit as much sulfur oxides as all of the world's 800 million motor vehicles."
