FELDSOTT

A Bolinas resident for over 40 years – AKA Keni Feld

“Songs Chants, Whispers and the Forgotten” is the name of the exhibition of Keni Feld’s latest works at the Meridian Gallery, 545 Powell St in San Francisco. It will be up from July 11 – Aug 24, 2013 whereupon it will travel to New York City and then to Miami. The show is curated by Peter Selz, the former chief Curator of MOMA New York.

Painting and Shamanic work have been the two centers of Keni’s entire working life. Keni studied in Chicago Institute of Art and has a MFA from California College of Arts and Crafts in Oakland, CCAC, and has been a recognized artist from the early stages of his painting career.

This exhibit is probably the most highly charged and challenging show I have ever seen on the West Coast of America. It is magical, mysterious and demanding. It is a portrayal of life and death and the journey of our ancestors and those that came before them. It is a show that bares our human inclination to deny what is a part of our species’ basest instincts; death by violence and life through our reverence of our ancestors and their wisdom which is inherently sought by all of us. You must look closely at this work. It is worthy of more than the cursory gallery glance. It is the essence of your humanity. Look for the codes. The paintings are raw, bold and alive. They are not the usual display of novelty or beauty.

Keni is a man who walks with the wolves.

A man who has a destiny finally apparent.

‘Cries, Chants, Shouts and Whispers: Songs of the Forgotten’: Artist comes out of ‘self-imposed exile’ with ‘spirit medicine’ works for healing

Whether barely out of his teens and showing his paintings at San Francisco Museum of Modern Art or working to restore intellectual property rights to indigenous people in the Amazon rain forest, artist Yisrael K. Feldsott has followed his own path, however winding or magical it may be. So although his recent works — monumental canvases like “Crack in the World” and “Law and Order” that capture both primal rites of passage and war-riven chaos — run counter to art-world trends, that is far from a worry.

“It’s not very PC to say it, and in the art world, there are some very strong boundaries,” says the artist, 59, walking through some of his oldest and most recent paintings at his sprawling Bolinas home and studio, just a short stroll away from a bluff revealing — surprise — a staggering view of San Francisco.

“You’re not supposed to talk about spiritualism, and the only healing that’s admissible in art is art therapy. But I absolutely feel like my work is a medicine. It’s an energetic medicine like homeopathy and certain kinds of plant medicine, so it has a certain kind of energetic vibration, resonance, and I believe if you come into the field of it, it affects you.

“A large part of my work is about awakening spirit,” says Feldsott, who became well versed in shamanistic belief systems in his travels and work in Mexico and Peru. “So it is a spirit medicine. I’m not trying to be didactic or control what’s awakening, but I’m interested in the moment when someone

goes, ‘Wow,’ and feels something.”

After his early success in the ‘70s, Feldsott wearied of art-world politics, went into “self-imposed exile” and stopped showing. A chance early-2000s encounter with the curator of the Fundacion Guayasamin in Quito, Ecuador — and his respect for namesake artist Oswaldo Guayasamin — brought about his first exhibition in decades and eventually led to an opportune meeting with Peter Selz, founder of the

Berkeley Art Museum, who curated Feldsott’s current exhibit.

The survey of 40 years of painting and art making includes recent pieces such as “Bearing Witness,” a large-scale, passionate work riddled with helicopters and bisected by a river of skulls. Its paint drips almost resemble blood and tears.

Revealing “Witness” in his studio, Feldsott knows a painting is done when, he says, “it begins to vibrate,” comparing

his work’s effects to that of homeopathy. “I believe if you try to square off with your shadow and the darkness and look at it with your eyes open and with an open heart, that is actually healing,” he says. “It actually uplifts your spirit and mobilizes you and inspires you to express yourself.”

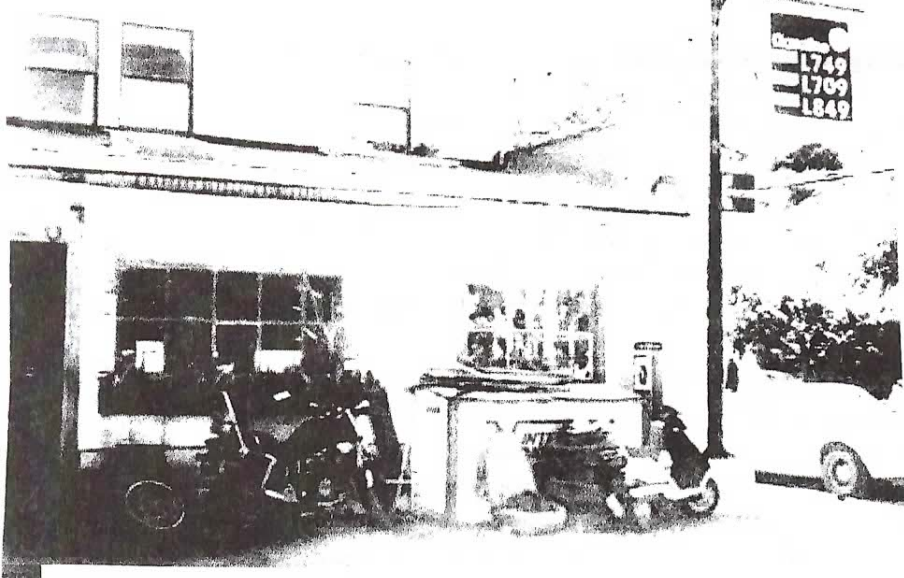

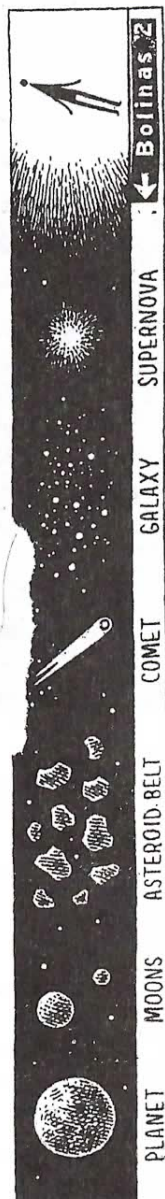
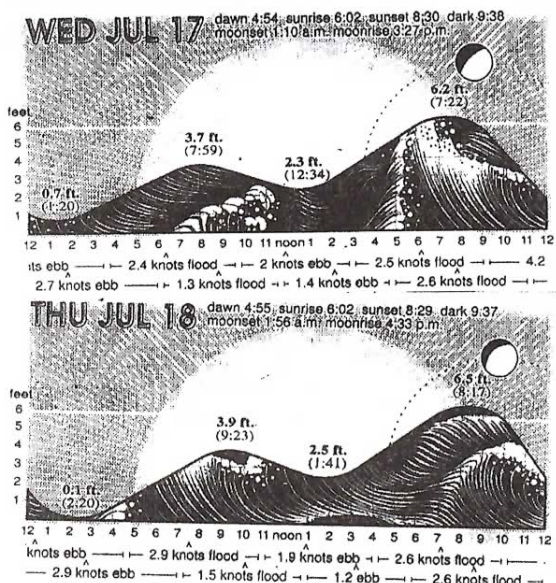
First, July 24-26, the historic Bo-Gas Building will receive a new roof. We received \$23,000 to re-roof and do repairs to drywall caused by water damage. The roof work will be done by Westec Roofing (who also did the Firehouse roof) as their company passed the bid process and can work with the complicated HUD Davis Bacon paperwork requirements.

Secondly, we received \$9,000 to do out door improvements to the Gibson house, including new sheds and funds for yard clean up. This will greatly enhance our tenants' lives by providing much needed personal storage and a better outdoor environment.

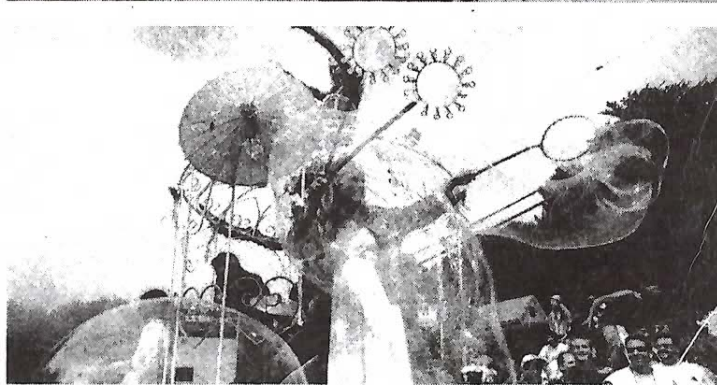
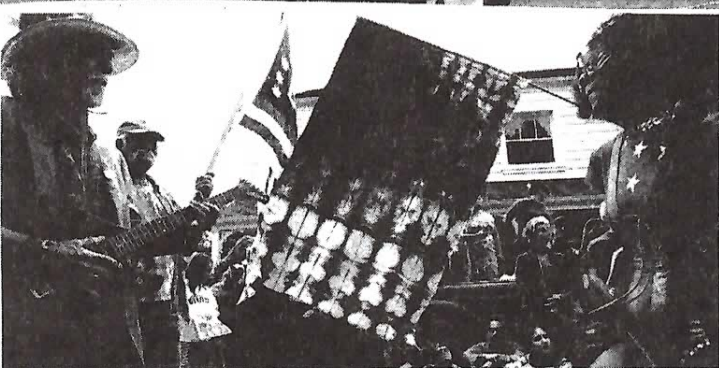
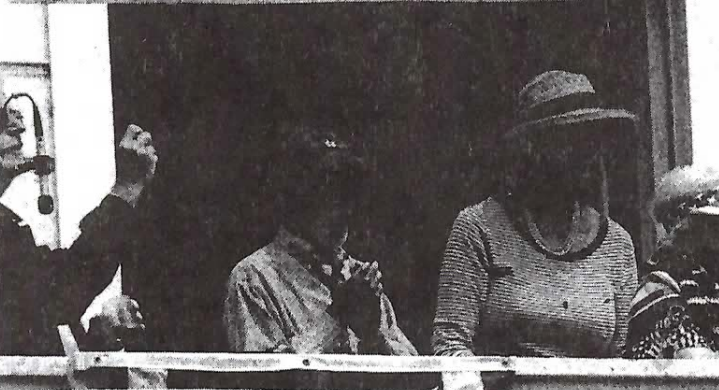

MESA PARK BOARD MEETING
 June 10, 2013 7:00 PM

Call to Order: 7:08 PM

Members present: Dylan Squires, Charles Whitefield, Jane Mickelson, Patricia Hickey

Others: Vic Amoroso, Angela Vernon, Shari Fae Dell, Jodi Angel

Community Expression: [Angela] question about implementation. Have the new ordinances for the parks been implemented? [Patricia] We may have to hire the county legal office to help. [Vic] I understood you were going to issue permits for vendors. [Patricia] In terms of vending, if we set up a process where vendors would come in and get permits, would it become a flea market area?

Downtown Park: Vote to permit Bolinas Reunion event at Downtown Park on June 29th; [Shari] No one can serve liquor without a license. [Patricia] moves to allow, Dylan 2nd. 4-0 aye. [Jane] There's been a request to hold a wedding in the DT park in October. It's a back-up plan for a couple who are hoping to marry on Mount Tam. If the mountain access is closed due to high fire concern or bad weather they are required to list an alternate venue. [Vic] No alcohol on premise. [Jane] I will e-mail him & tell it's a public park and that they may use it if they follow the rules that apply for all. Will use letter-head, send a link to the ordinances. [Vic] The BPUD received word that there was a significant leak in the sprinkler system. [Charles] We need a new lock box for the system, and a list of people who know how to handle water emergencies. The water system is not going to be on forever. Once the plants are established that system will be turned off. [Jodi] I've observed that the ground around the plants is not bermed up to prevent the water from flowing away. It runs off the edges of the peripheral plantings. [Charles] The drip irrigation is supposed to eliminate that problem; the water absorbs before it can run off. [Patricia] There was supposed to be a group of volunteers to oversee the park. [Charles] I think we should try to get the folks at RDI to come in and apply some of the learning they're getting out there as a showcase. [Dylan] I can talk with them about making it part of the up-coming 9-month intensive.

Maintenance Report: [Dylan] Suki's son came out and mowed a couple of weeks ago. [Patricia] We have reimbursed Suki for the initial payment.

Irrigation Report: [Patricia] Bryan will be having a conference call over the final permitting this coming week. [Vic] You're going to need working capital to borrow against the grant funding. Can you borrow from the DT park account to pay your vendors? [Dylan] There is a sum set aside already. [Charles] We need to trench and lay pipe, plumbing connections from the water source up to the park; but there's not much else to do until the bathrooms need to go in. We're aiming for next fall. [Patricia] That is an excellent reason to apply for Measure A funding. They haven't released the means for applying yet, but as soon as that comes around we should act.

Treasurer's Report: [Patricia] Christine billed our liability insurance to Mesa Park, but it should be paid in part by DT park to cover their inclusion on the policy. [Dylan] It needs to be split half and half. DT park had a heavy month in maintenance. The play area and the cob oven in the pavilion are the final expenses. [Jodi]

Expressed concerns about the location of the play boat area for child safety. [Charles] The boat is moveable if necessary. [Dylan] We received a \$5,000 grant from the Pincus Family Fund towards the children's boat in the play area. Want to close the skate park account; incorporate it into the MP account and set it aside for maintenance of the skate park. DT park maintenance has been high this month due to labor cost preparing for July 4th.

Up-date on election status: [Jane] Transmittal 3 not needed at the moment because we didn't get the renewal on the parcel tax measure. We need to recruit park users to get out the vote: soccer clubs, Little League parents, etc. [Shari] I went into the archives of the Civ. Center library to see if there were stories about the MP and there was nothing. [Dylan] It would be nice to put things in the Hearsay each week to create communication with the community. [Patricia] How about asking for ideas from the town about the park? [Dylan] I can set up an e-mail address for the MP, with an auto-reply that it's only checked once per week, and a password for access.

Other: [Charles] The blue dumpster was taken away by the company because too much garbage was being thrown in with the recyclables. It came primarily from the Sunday food give-aways and also from trucks

coming and off-loading job-site waste. The keys have fallen into the hands of folks who should not be using them. The company is looking into getting us something better to take its place. By Friday the dumpsters should be emptied so we can put our stuff in; and it should have a combination lock. They'll let me know soon. But right now we only have the green dumpster. [Jane] How was the trash pick-up after the BCLT event? [Shari] The BCLT drafted about 20 people to clean up after the big event at the DT park. They did a really good job.

Approve Warrants: Patricia move to approve, Jane second, all aye.

Approve Minutes: Patricia move to approve, Jane second. All aye.

Next meeting: July 8, 7 PM in Firehouse.

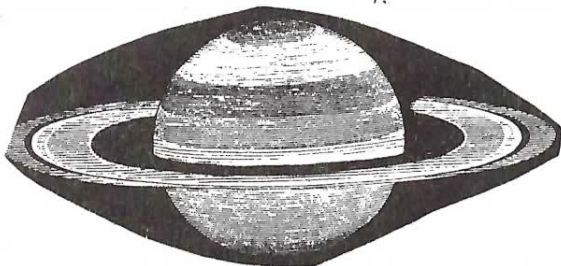
