


If it had not been for the lagoon, neither the herons nor the egrets would have returned year after year to raise their young in the tall trees of the canyon.























Dear Hearsay News,



Bolinas Community Center Board Meeting May 18, 2013

Directors and staff present: StuArt Chapman – President, Eleanor Lyman – Vice-President, Susan Tacherra – Treasurer, Lia Korula Sabbatini – General Manager, Randi Arnold – Development Director, Steve Wrenn, Jenny Pfeiffer, Jeff Manson, Susie Stewart, June McAdams and Maitreya Rose. President's Report: Beginning with the singing of the *Bolinas Community Center* song. Minutes were approved with some amendments.

Treasurer's Report: All in all we are doing fine. Gave a general overview and talked about each event having a separate line. Spot on with our budget.

Manager's Report: Art & Garden took in \$7,728, total expenses \$1,700 plus salaries. Made about 5,000. It was a beautiful event. Not as well attended as last year and it was decided not to have event on earth day weekend. Go back to one talk a day. Discussed the possibility of using Memorial Day for the event. BBQ and Blues, \$1,900 net. Suggestion to have someone on the board to take over advertisement for events. StuArt volunteered to follow up with the Hearsay. He does the sign board at the nursery and the blue board by the library. He will put up a sandwich board at Brighton. We need a Volunteer coordinator. Discussion to advertise in the Hearsay for an internship. Discussion on cost various projects. We took in 1,400 from the Free Box Follies. Working on permanent sound booth. It would take around 1,500 to get the sound booth up so that a tech would just press buttons and it's on. Want to get rid ofborrowed light board and getting our own that will work with existing dimmers, new dimmers, and Dance Palace dimmers. Need more dimmer packs.

1,900 from BBQ & Blues + 1,400 Free Box Follies = 3,300 now in sound and light fund.

Kitchen update. At \$17,000 at the kitchen fund, \$450 on upgrading kitchen lights. Sinks all cabinets to side all taken out. Leaving the stove alone now. Installing new hand sink, a three compartment sink, and a third separate vegetable sink, all by commercial code per the county. Have top for sink. Under counter frig. Middle counter is 30" x 8' work space. StuArt is working on the good bye song for the existing kitchen. The floor needs to be fixed but due to budget constraints only the flooring under the new sinks is being replaced. FRP has been installed on walls and the total bid for the sinks, floors and walls is \$7,200. Jenny motioned to accept this bid. The motion carried. We discussed having lockable storage, locking the piano closet. Renters need to have their goods secured. Suggestion to keep the piano out. Kids should be able to use it. Put it out in hall. That will allow for more locked storage. Jeff will look into

piano tuning and a latch. StuArt will work with Jeff. Need to sell the speakers. Jenny will check with her son. New class Chi Gong ancient Chinese movement, 10:00am Mondays with Susie Stewart.

Discussed Memorial Day and jobs folks volunteered for. Lia out of office June 11 – July 11.

Development Director's Report: Discussed the grants applied for. MCBG for kitchen remodel was declined. Bothin grant proposal request for funding the Sound & Light Project was declined. Received 2,500 for Martine's once monthly Friday Night youth group from the West Marin Foundation.

New Business: ADA compliance. Ayn is exploring the options. Discussed the big heart in the back of the community center. Maybe do it again. Give people more opportunities to be

Ask the Naturalist

ALCHAEL ELLIS

Q: Rumor has it there might have been a waterfall at the Golden Gate during the last ice age, when sea level was at its lowest. Is there any evidence for this? [Cisco, Oakland]

A: Well, there is no incontrovertible evidence for a "waterfall" at the Golden Gate, but there very well could have been one in the past. The earth has undergone a number of ice ages over the last 2.5 million years, when the cooler, wetter climate caused the formation of large sheets of ice in the polar regions and at higher elevation, followed by the melting of this ice. This oscillation has caused sea level to periodically rise and fall by as much as 200 to 400 feet over periods of several thousand years.

Some 20,000 years ago, the San Francisco Bay was not a bay, but a broad valley with a river, which we now call the Sacramento, draining the Central Valley through the Carquinez Strait and heading out to the Pacific through the "Golden Gate." Except it didn't meet the ocean at the Golden Gate, as it does now. Instead, it ran for another 27 miles across a broad plain past a series of hills (now the Farallon Islands) before draining into the Pacific. In fact, the now-flooded San Francisco Bay is the exception; for most of its life, the "Bay" has been a river valley.

The deepest part of the Bay, at 350 feet or more, is just west of the Golden Gate Bridge. To the east, bedrock at Racoon Strait (sic) between Angel Island and Tiburon is only 140 feet deep. So in just over two miles, the ancient river dropped more than 200 vertical feet. This most likely would have created a series of cascades, if not a waterfall. And right under the bridge is an extraordinarily deep hole in the ancient river channel (download a colorful 3-D map of the Bay floor at bit.ly/BayFloorMap). The existence of the hole is a bit of a conundrum to geologists, some of whom suspect that a good-size waterfall may have created this large cavity in the bedrock. The sheer volume of water passing through this narrow cut in the Coast Range must have been immense. Today, runoff from nearly 40 percent of California's land area drains out through the San Francisco Bay. During ice ages, there would have been even more water in the river to carve out the canyon. Waterfall or no, these rushing waters would have been an impressive sight,

As sea level rose at the end of the last ice age about 8,000 years ago, seawater invaded this river valley, creating the modern San Francisco Bay. Evidence of the old riverbed can be seen during winter storms when large waves break

Last weekend we were lucky enough to get to spend the weekend with some friends in Bolinas, a tiny town on the Pacific coast north of San



MARIN COUNTY

BASS LAKE, BOLINAS

RATING: B

"The lake was great," says regular user Dave Smith, of San Leandro, about his visit to Bass Lake, near Bolinas, this year.
"It was during spring break, so there were a lot of people on the trail that day. But we weren't the only ones who were naked in the water. Several people were skinny dipping besides us." Others, who don't necessarily go nude, love Bass too, which, by the way, does not have any bass San Rafael resident Marie described her November visit as "awe-inspiring" on a message board. She said the walk to get there "was worth every minute"... the water while cool was exhilarating. I can't wait to go back." And Cindi, of San Anselmo, found the setting to be "rejuvenating," awesome, stunning, orgasmic ... I would do it again and again." Bass doesn't attract as many nudists as it did 10 years ago. "When I first went, everybody was nude," says Smith. "Today, though, you have to feel pretty comfortable with your own nudity to swim that way at the lake.

Directions: Allow about an hour for the drive from San Francisco's Golden Gate Bridge. From Stinson Beach, go north on Highway 1. Just north of Bolinas Lagoon, turn left on the often-unmarked exit to Bolinas. Follow the road as it curves along the lagoon and eventually ends at Olema-Bolinas Road. Continue along Olema-Bolinas Road to the stop sign at Mesa Road. Turn right on Mesa and drive four miles until it becomes a gravel road and ends at the Palomarin parking lot. On hot days the lot fills quickly, so come early. Says Smith: "We once saw hundreds of cars." A sign at the trailhead next to the lot will guide you down scenic Palomarin Trail to the lake. For directions to incredibly beautiful Alamere Falls, 1.5 miles past Bass Lake, which empties onto a beach at the sea, please see "Elsewhere

RCA BEACH, BOLINAS

In a 1998 movie, visiting Jamaica was How Stella Got Her Groove Back. But if you'd like to revitalize your life, all you may need to do is spend an afternoon at awe-inspiring RCA Beach. Even though the site is isolated, don't try to have sex on the sand; rangers ticketed at least one person for engaging in public sex here last fall. A single stopover at this relaxing oasis of tranquility will probably inspire you to keep coming back, "It hasn't changed in decades," says regular visitor Michael Velkoff. One problem: the cove is exposed to the wind. The good news is that there are lots of nooks that are sheltered from the wind. Some nooks, though, provide good shelter from the periodic breezes. Plus there's so much driftwood on the sand that many people build windbreaks or even whole forts. Suited and unsuited men and women and families visit the shoreline. The beach seems far bigger than its one mile length because everyone is usually spread out on the sand. Adds Velkoff: "We'll see six people on a Sunday. Everybody's 30 yards apart. It's amazing.

Directions: From Stinson Beach, take Highway 1 (Shoreline Highway) north toward Calle Del Mar for 4.5 miles. Turn left onto Olema Bolinas Road and follow it 1.8 miles to Mesa Road in Bolinas. Turn right and stay on Mesa until you see cars parked past some old transmission towers. Park and walk .25 miles to the end of the pavement. Go left through the gap in the fence. The trail leads to a gravel road. Follow it until you see a path on your right, leading through a gate. Take it along the oliff top until it veers down to the beach.

Or continue along Mesa until you come to a grove of eucalyptus trees. Enter through the gate here, then hike .5 miles through a cow pasture on a path that will also bring you through thick brush. The second route is slippery and eroding, but less steep. "It's shorter, but toward the end there's a rope for you to hold onto going down the cliff," tells Velkoff. ormo

"Freedom," 2,367, I

The word freedom—which for centuries referred to an absence of tyranny and the importance of self-determination—finally lost all meaning Tuesday. It was 2,367 years old. The cause was John McKenzie, a regular commenter on the Daily Caller Web site, who wrote that the Founding Fathers guaranteed his freedom to carry shoulder-launched missiles when picking up his son from daycare. Born in ancient Greece, where Aristotle wrote about the value of voluntary choice, freedom as a word and a category proved crucial to human progress for millennia, helping to topple dictators and abolish slavery.

Freedom had shown surprising resilience recently, even as it was used in increasingly bizarre contexts. Among them: The freedom to teach scientifically disproven theories, to avoid taxes, to obstruct access to voting and contraception, to prevent citizens from marrying, to dump toxic chemicals in reservoirs, and to exclude gay people from an organization in which members wear green sashes, sew on badges, and learn about basket weaving and theater. There were no close survivors.
