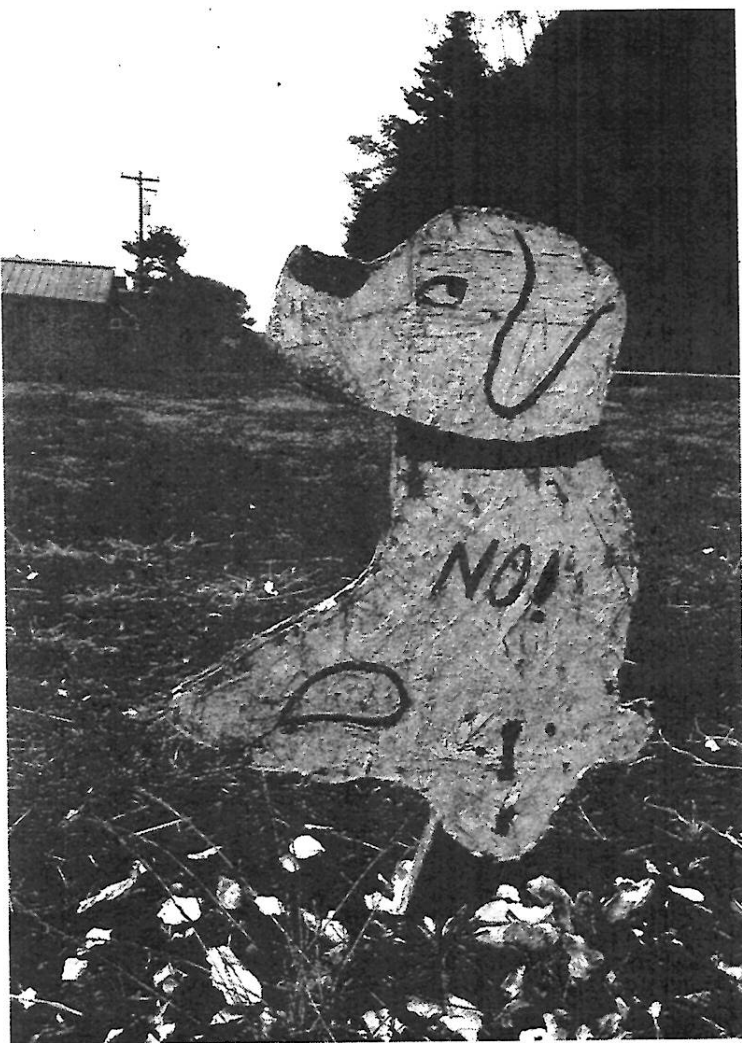

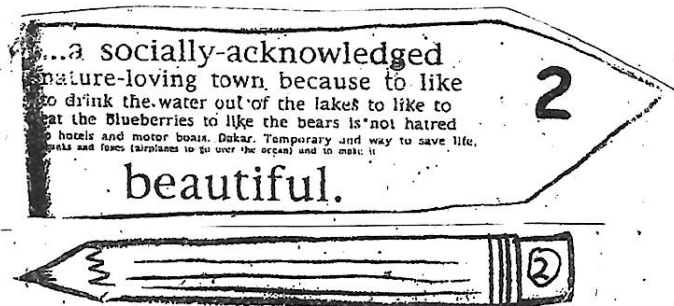

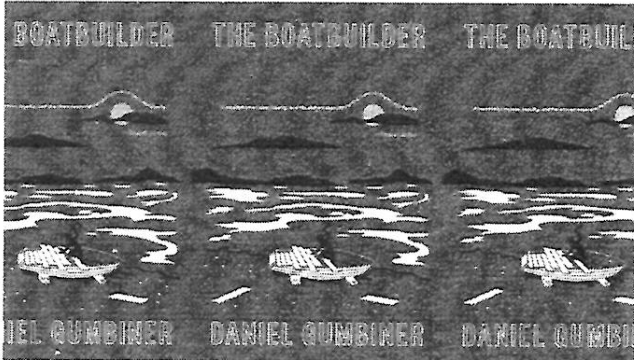

**The Boatbuilder**  
 by Daniel Gumbiner McSweeney's



Eli "Berg" Koenigsberg is not in a good way. He has a brain injury from a concussion, he's addicted to opioids, and he's breaking into homes to steal the drugs he needs. Berg is a passive twenty-seven-year-old, not really sure how the past brought him to the present, but he knows enough to get himself out of San Francisco and to move up to **Talinas**, a fictional town in Northern California. When *The Boatbuilder*, a debut novel by Daniel Gumbiner, begins, Berg is house-sitting and beginning to get to know people in this community. Over the course of the novel, which takes place over the following year, he will become part of this place, as he moves from one job to the next, one home to the next, always conscious of his addiction and his pain, wanting to escape both but struggling to do so, as the two are intricately joined.

The reader goes on this winding journey with Berg. At first, I wasn't sure I wanted to tag along. The lost, drug-addicted 20-something is, sadly, a bit familiar. But I found myself drawn into Berg's story, wanting to learn more about him and this community in which he finds himself, willing to follow all the twists and turns. Gumbiner writes beautifully, and he creates a unique world here. There's something so gentle about Berg, in his awareness of the world and the people around him. He cares. He has a sense of humor. He wants to turn his life around.

The novel begins with an E.B. White quote to his wife: "I have had an entirely new feeling about life ever since making an ax handle..." This idea of returning to the basics is reminiscent of several religious philosophies, including the Shakers, whose motto begins, "hands to work." A thread of spirituality runs through this novel from Berg's rabbi

grandfather to the way in which Berg seems to gain strength from his belief in this community. And communities like this exist. Almost twenty years ago, my sister-in-law decided to move to a similar place in Northern California. She is still there, and she has found, I think, exactly what she longed for: a group of like-minded individuals who love and support each other. A family. This, by the end, is what Berg finds as well.

## California Burning

Fire Report as of Monday afternoon, July 30, 2018.

California is disappearing in smoke and flames. Global warming sits on us like a smothering blanket. Out my window I see two fires and there are at least seven ongoing fires in the state. Triple digit heat is unrelenting. Leaves are falling from the trees ahead of schedule as a result of a six-year drought with only one year of significant rainfall.

Above, right over my house helicopters sound like tanks rumbling on some stairway to heaven. They pick up buckets of water from irrigation ponds and drop buckets full of water on a fire that is at least 6,000 (now 12,000) acres with very little containment. Compared to the amount of burning acreage the helicopters seem like noisy little mosquitoes. We really need several fire-fighting 747's to put out the two fires.

The state has two such firefighters but they are likely deployed to Redding, a city of 40,000 situated at the head of the Central Valley, where the summer's triple digit heat accumulates and mixes with strong winds to produce what one scientist likens to a microwave oven, or a blast furnace to my thinking.

This hell is California's foreseeable future.

We were warned. Science nerds and policy wonks knew what was coming. They tried to come to agreement for all of us. Out of a conference in Rio de Janeiro in 1992 came the Kyoto Protocol, under which countries agreed to separately determine targets to reduce greenhouse gases. That was all the best minds could do, hu-

man nature being what it is. So what if global warming was global? Apparently, the people running the US and some other governments could not conceive of the global nature of the problem, nor the corresponding need for a global solution.

Even if the Kyoto Protocol had been based on a realistic appraisal of the situation, the US Senate would never ratify it anyway. It's puny targets were never adopted because the US was unhappy about the fact that third-world countries were not made to share the pain; instead, they were to be compensated for all the years of exploitation by rich countries.

Ordinary citizens and politicians alike got another chance to understand what was at stake when, in 2006, Al Gore explained the science be-

hind global warming so that all of us could understand it. He made it easy in the Oscar-winning documentary, "An Inconvenient Truth."

Again we rejected the science and the truth. In 2009 President Barack and Secretary of State Hillary Clinton negotiated the US into the much-ballyhooed Paris Climate Accord. Every country in the world would be singing off the same sheet of music—at least until President Trump decided it "wasn't good for the United States." No climate agreement "could be good for the United States"; that's the point. World-wide climate agreements are for the world. They offer a way for humans to save themselves.

So, the real inconvenient truth turns out that we are too stupid to save ourselves.
