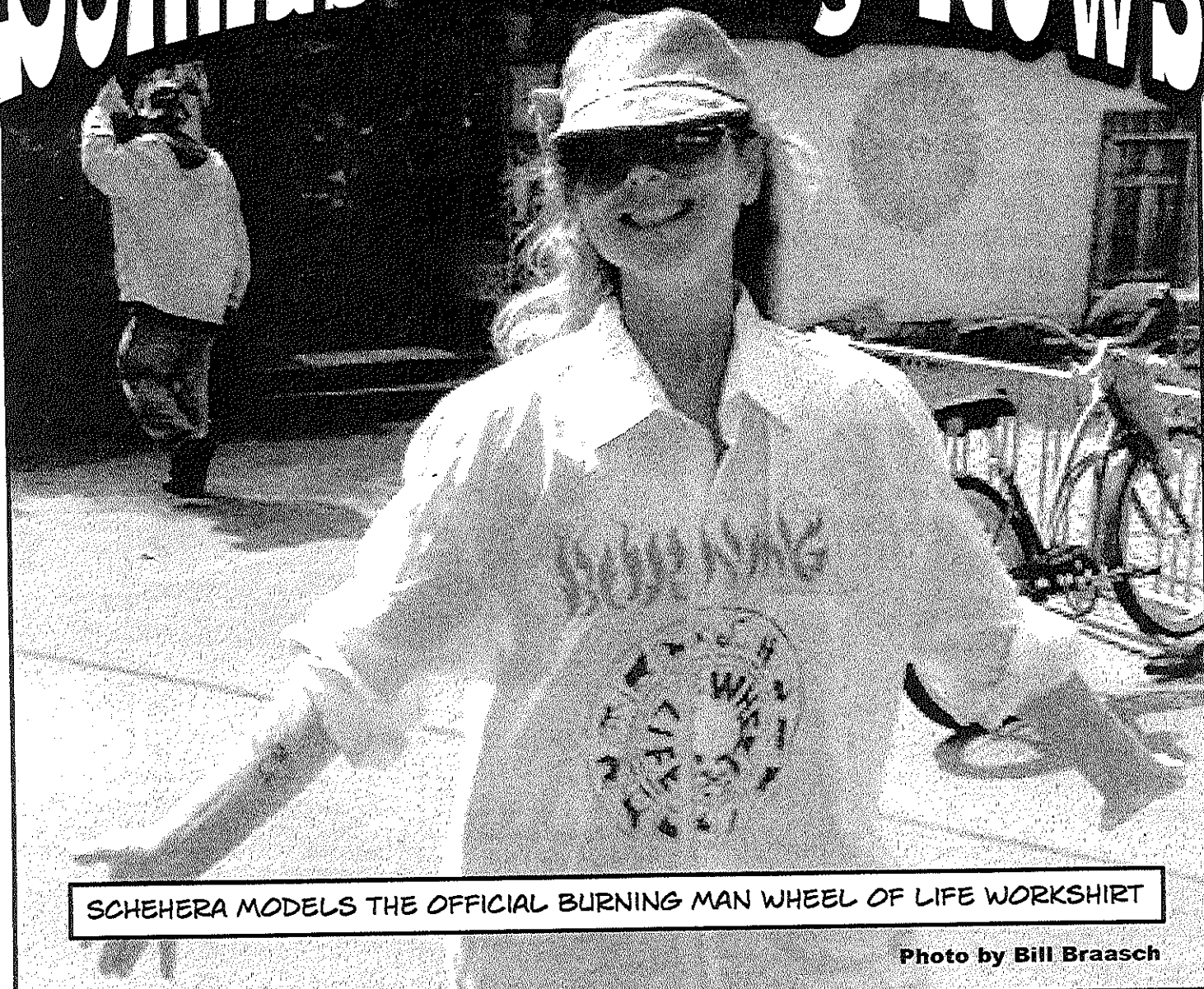

The West Marin Fund (WMF) is pleased to announce our fourth round of small grants for nonprofits, serving the WMF's service area: Muir Beach, Sausalito, Bolinas, Olema, Nicasio, Point Reyes Station, Inverness, Marshall, Tomales and Dillon Beach.

This round responds to an informal survey of many grantees, and is a one-time, maximum \$5000 grant to support:

Professional training, consultant help, work site improvements

Proposal are due by October 15, 2014

The pool of funds for this round is \$50,000. Grant requests can cover a broad range of strategies or products. Examples include:

- Staff or board training in fundraising, strategic planning, development
- Consultant assistance with grant writing, IT, bookkeeping or legal issues
- Workplace improvements like energy conservation or white boards/smart-boards

Up to 10% of grant awards can be allocated for reasonable administrative or overhead costs, but grants are not intended for salaries alone. Priority will be given to proposals that result in improving an organization's capacity to provide service to West Marin.

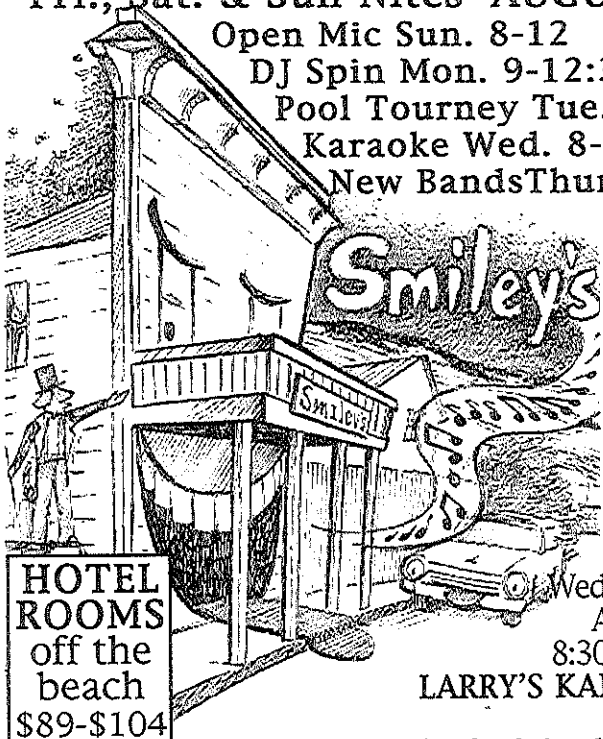

The Karmic Firewind

Yes, I'm taking off for Burning Man with Amelia and Bill and the Wheel of Life.

Using a Tactic Unseen in a Century, Countries Cordon Off Ebola-Racked Areas

The Ebola outbreak in West Africa is so out of control that governments there have revived a disease-fighting tactic not used in nearly a century: the "cordon sanitaire," in which a line is drawn around the infected area, and no one is allowed out.

Cordons, common in the medieval era of the Black Death, have not been seen since the border between Poland and the Soviet Union was closed in 1918 to stop typhus from spreading west. They have the potential to become brutal and inhumane. Centuries ago, in their most extreme form, everyone within the boundaries was left to die or survive, until the outbreak ended.

Board Members present: Charles Whitefield, Bryan Lee, Dylan Squires, Jane Mickelson.

Patricia Hickey has sent an official letter of resignation effective today. We wish her well and appreciate her service.

Others: Angela Calpestri, Angela Vernon, Vic Amoroso, Amber DiStasi, Jennie Pfeiffer, Erica McCrea

Community Expression: The board expressed appreciation for Don Smith and sends healing wishes. Perry Hooper wishes to use the Downtown Park for their 2-year granddaughter's birthday party on July 27th. 10-12 2-year-olds and about 10-20 adults. No need to vote because there's no special usage needed and it is a public park. Angela Calpestri with information on a Tuff Shed: [Angela spoke with the distributor who sent her data. For an 8 x 12: about \$4150 and 10 x 12 \$4600, installed on owner-built foundation. [Bryan] This is something we can do in the spring with Measure A funding. [Dylan] For an extra \$450 you get more room. [Bryan] I'd go for that, too. [Dylan] We could do the installation in January. [Angela] Should I look any further into more features? [Dylan] If you're going to be storing hotdogs and other perishable foods, you'll need a refrigerator or freezer. [Bryan] We can stub out for a future connection for a sink when we install the bathrooms. [Dylan] We can write it into the January disbursement. [Angela] Jeff Clapp has started the mound. He sunk the rubber and the foundation and began moving the mound mix over to it. We should get a cover for it if the rains will damage it.

Downtown Park: Maintenance Report. Action Items:

[Angela Vernon] Irrigation seems to be working great. I'm going to be away from much of August and it would be good for someone to keep an eye on it. When it goes to the red light, it's important to turn it off until it refills. [Charles] It already set on maximum flow. [Angela] Everything on the system is on minimum watering. [Dylan] Is this something that one of us could do? [Angela] Yes. [Dylan & Bryan offered to meet with Angela to learn the system for the irrigation to cover the three weeks of Angela's absence.] The cobblestones have been moved. [Angela] Someone's occasionally turning off the BPUD water. [Charles] We need to take the handles off & store them in the shed. Vote on design procedures for use of parks; plan for installing signage

as per usage [postponed]. Make key for point person for opening park (electricity hook-up, using cob oven, etc.) Action Item: vote on finding a manager for DT park. [no vote taken at this time.] [Dylan] I'll call Arn and talk with him about being the point person for using the special facilities (cob oven, electricity.) No vote necessary. [Charles] We can use the kiosk that was donated to the park to display the ordinances.

Irrigation Report: [Bryan] The contractors are coming out soon and the bids will be open August 1st. We now have the funding and we don't have to match anymore which freed us up for the entire sum. The issue is that we can't pay for anything outside the park boundaries with the grant monies: the water source and line coming up the hill will not be included in that funding. It's one of the bid items. [Vic] Since the line isn't included it can be shared with other projects in future. It couldn't be used for drinking water but it can be for other uses like showers (for the possible pool.) [Dylan] I move we give authority to Bryan to sign the license. [Jane] I second. All aye. [Erica] Is the money still available for the picnic tables? [Dylan] That was reallocated for another project but we can budget the picnic tables in with another project later this year.

Election up-date: Possible Action Item: appointment of Angela Calpestri to fill balance of Patricia Hickey's term on Mesa Park Board. [Unnecessary at this point] Further information needed about appointment and timing. Postponed for next meeting or September.

Treasurer's Report: NA

Other: [Jennie] School board is going to be doing long-term planning in getting general organization bond on the ballot this fall. I'm interested in the issue of sea-level rise and have our local non-profits get together to discuss planning for this eventuality. And to discuss fund-raising to buy Star Route Farms for a campus on higher ground. Part of it is the road issue--our roads are in jeopardy of even small sea level rise. There will be more meetings coming up.

Realtor bids bad deal at Bolinas tax auction

There was little interest in most of the 27 parcels on the block in Marin County's annual auction of tax defaulted properties this week until spirited bidding erupted for a vacant lot in Bolinas.

The 3,600-square-foot lot on Maple Road with an assessed value of \$4,000 had no water connection, so county officials wondered what was up as bids escalated at a frantic pace, spiraling above the county's minimum \$11,500 price to cover back taxes and penalties.

"We were pretty perplexed," said Sandra Kacharos, the county's property tax collection division chief. "We visit all these parcels so we knew it was vacant."

The drama intensified as Yuba City realty broker Jeff Helm faced off in a bidding war with another man for Bolinas parcel 191-122-13. When bids topped \$130,000, Helm agreed to end the competition and cap the price by tossing a coin to decide who would get the right to buy the land.

That's when another man jumped into the bidding war, jacking up the price another \$20,000.

But Helm, who held documents including a photo of a home on a Maple Road lot, was all smiles as the last man standing. He handed tax officials a check for \$150,000 and headed for the planning department to find out if the lot and home had any permit issues.

Oops!

Turned out the lot was indeed vacant, too small to build much on and lacked a water connection anyway. The house in Helm's photo was of the residence next door.

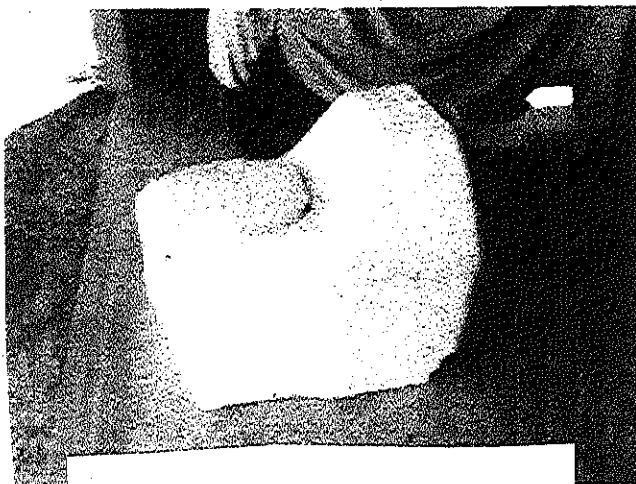
"Not very cool," said the 41-year-old Helm, adding he was given bad information by a title company that involved a parcel number mixup. "I buy trust deeds all over the state," Helm said, adding it is the first time he has been left holding the bag after a decade in the business.

Helm said title company executives are scrambling to untangle what happened, and hopes that erroneous information he received will result in voiding the sale.

Good luck, said county finance chief Roy Given, Marin's top tax official. "All sales are final."

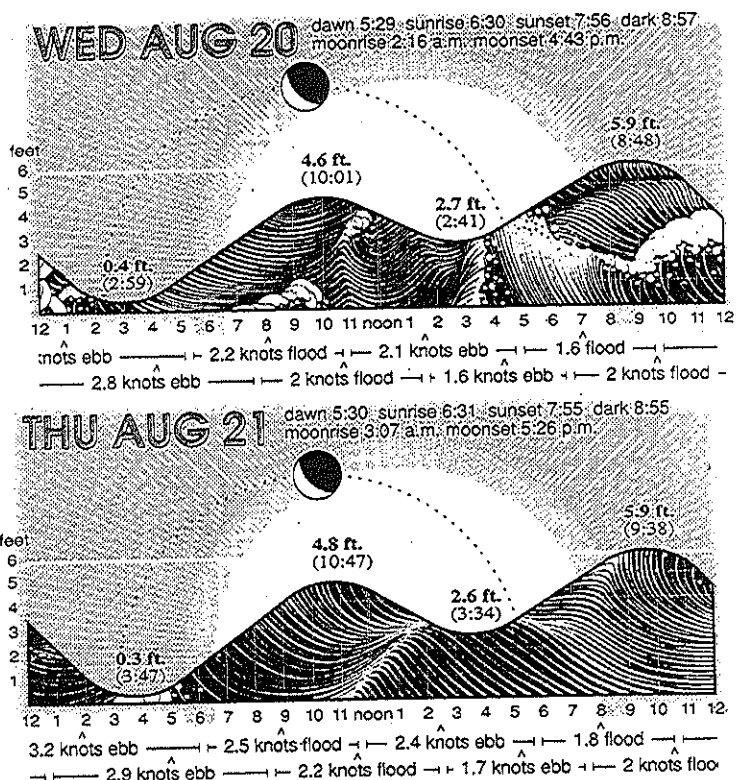
