



#### AERIAL DUMPING OF RODENTICIDES ON THE FARALLON ISLANDS

or

#### **HEY HEY RODENTICIDES AWAY**

The draft EIRS by Fish and Wildlife Service as a Rodent Mitigation Measure in the Farallones proposes three choices: the aerial broadcasting of toxic rodenticide pellets or doing nothing.

Rodenticides are highly lethal to birds, mammals and extremely lethal to fish and other aquatic life. They are very dangerous and persistent environmental poisons with Brodifacoum lasting as long as 4 months according to Wikipedia.

According to Wildcare, evidence from similar projects powerfully demonstrates that aerial rodenticide dumping exacts an extremely high toll on "other resources" including non-target wildlife.

Wildcare also states evidence that indiscriminate distribution of rodenticides will neither eliminate a rodent problem, nor prevent the problem from returning inevitably leading to more and more applications.

Can you imagine the toxic soup our ocean will be after repeated rodenticide distributions?

It is WildCare's position and mine that, if control of mouse populations is necessary, then responsible, non-toxic and environmentally sustainable approaches must be used.

The aerial broadcasting of toxic rodenticide pellets over the entire landmass of the Farallon Islands does not fit these criteria, and should not even be considered in the eradication proposal.

Please help maintain the integrity of the incredibly fragile ecosystem on the Farallon Islands, and be active in expressing rejection of the proposal to aerially spray the islands

Thank you for supporting environmental responsibility and supporting wildlife by rejecting this proposal. More environmentally sensitive alternatives are the best choice for the balance and well-being of all.

This is our playground and fishing grounds. Imagine surfers frolicking in toxic soup and the impact to our fishing industry. Here in West Marin we are talking about our close neighbor. Take action now!



"Vintage Rohan: You laugh, you suffer. All in very small spaces."

ROHAN outside the Book Exchange in Bolinas, a bookstore where no one works and you pay what you consider a fair price for the books. Pretty good books are a dollar; good ones are two bucks;

excellent ones, you shell out five. It's one of my favorite uncapitalistic places on earth. There's a piano. There are stuffed animals for the kids. And, of course, there are books, thousands of books, not just on tables and shelves inside the store, but also outside, where they are stacked rain or shine. I've been in Bolinas working on a new book, and Rohan was kind enough to drive up here from her home in San Francisco's West Portal district so that we can talk a little about herself and her own new collection.

Actually, she tells me, her husband drove her here. She's nervous around highways. I look up and down the block. Downtown Bolinas isn't that big. "Where is he?"

Rohan shrugs and laughs. "Must be around here somewhere." Husband vanishes in a postage-stamp town: It could be a moment out of Rohan's own stories—funny, unexpected, a little bit mysterious.

Though we've never met in person, I've been reading Rohan's compressed, poignant, exquisitely beautiful stories for years. As we walk toward the beach, we talk about the waves and the light, but, literary geeks that we are, soon it is all writing. We both have great affection for, and often write, very short stories. We agree that, done right, there's enormous power in brevity. Think Jorge Luis Borges, Grace Paley, Emily Dickinson. If you can say it in fewer words, do it. Kafka, also a master of brevity, once wrote that a book should be an ice pick to break the frozen sea inside us. Lots of times while reading Rohan's new book, Goodnight Nobody, I felt that icy jab—when the pain endured by fictional characters is so real that it becomes my own.

Here's one example, out of literally hundreds that I could give. There's a story, called "Out of the Ashes," about a little girl named Esther whose grandfather spontaneously combusts. The story is funny—and then isn't. One night in Dublin, Esther's grandfather catches fire and burns to death while watching television. Rohan's narratives are often like this: On the one hand, they are hilarious and irreverent, even fantastical. The next moment, the consequences come home to roost. Here is Esther's

mother, pleading with Esther's father to stop asking how and why it happened. "Let him rest in peace, can't you? Everyone making him out to be some kind of freak when the poor auld man got an ending, a frying, you wouldn't wish on your worst enemy."

Vintage Rohan: You laugh, you suffer. All in very small spaces. Goodnight Nobody contains 30 stories, each with an average length of about 1,500 words (by comparison, this piece is about 800). But Rohan doesn't want to be pigeonholed as a writer of brief stories. "I love writing short short stories, but I don't limit myself." She's finished one manuscript for a novel and is hard at work on a second one.

We continue our walk along the shore, touching on Rohan's Irish childhood in Dublin and her move to San Francisco 20 years ago. She remains deeply connected to Ireland, returning at least once a year, but this is home to her now. "I think every immigrant has two hearts, one for her country of birth and one for her adopted country. I write out of my Irish heart."

This gets us talking about loneliness. Rohan tosses off a sandal and digs her foot in the sand. It makes no sense, she says, that she should feel lonely. She's happily married, has two wonderful daughters and many great friends—hell, she even likes her own company. And yet she searches for the loneliness in others: "It's a writer's way of looking out for people," she says. "You know what I mean?" I say I think I do.

We walk back up from the beach and end our conversation where it began, on the rickety bench outside the Book Exchange. Still no sign of the husband. (Later, I do meet him. His name is Padraig, he's also Irish, and, like Rohan, he is full of laughter and energy.)

"Know why else I write?" Rohan asks with sudden intensity, perhaps brought on by all the books looming around us. "It's like pinning down these ghosts that float around in my head. Nothing holds my attention like writing does, nothing gives me that sense of stillness, of rightness. Isn't that awfu!?"



From Martin Luther King Jr.'s speech delivered at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., on Aug. 28, 1963:

When the architects of our republic wrote the magnificent words of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, they were signing a promissory note to which every American was to fall heir. This note was a promise that all men, yes, black men as well as white men, would be guaranteed the unalienable rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.
It is obvious today that America

has defaulted on this promissory note insofar as her citizens of color are concerned. Instead of honoring this sacred obligation, America has given the Negro people a bad check, a check which has come back marked "insufficient funds." But we refuse to believe that the bank of justice is bankrupt. We refuse to believe that there are insufficient funds in the great vaults of opportunity of this nation. So we have come to cash this check—a check that will give us upon demand the riches of freedom and the security of justice.



This returning to, I decided, was something special. I'd never had a place like that growing up, but I wished for it. This year my husband and I made a pact to spend one long

weekend a month in Bolinas, a quintessential funky surf-hippie-artist community an hour north of San Francisco, with our two young boys. We rent a cottage on the Bolinas Lagoon, with a ladder that we can lower from a rear deck right into the channel. With the outgoing tide, I drop in with a surfboard and let the current whisk me out to the ocean. When the water hits its low point, our son Felix, 2, makes sand cakes in the muck and walks around looking for hermit crabs, seals, and birds.

The main street in town has a western-style saloon, grocery, art museum, and the wonderful Coast Cafe, a bare-feet-and-damp-hair kind of place with surfboards on the ceiling and fishing buoys serving as decor. This being the Bay Area, it also features fresh-caught fish, hard-to-find bottles by the local winemaker Sean Thackrey, and perfectly chilled drafts of Lagunitas beer. Our younger son, Teddy, is just 6 months old, but he's been there enough times that Rudolfo, one of the staff, commented on how he's grown and asked if we'd moved there permanently.

The house we rent isn't fancy — we all sleep in the one bedroom — but the views are big. Late in the day, as dusk creeps across the silvery calm of the lagoon, I look out the big picture windows and observe more than the wisps of fog drifting in or the golden hills of Mount Tamalpais State Park. I see something of our future in the timelessness here. In returning to the same places over and over, we mark ourselves against this unchanging watery backdrop. Felix's first hermit crab and seal sightings are behind us: ahead are his first swims and surfs. To feel at home makes you big-hearted. That's the promise of a place like Bolinas.



**President's Report:** The meeting began with a buoyant rendition of the Bolinas Community Center song led by StuArt. Minutes were approved after a motion made by Steve and seconded by Stacy.

Treasurer's Report: Stacy gave the treasurer's report. The cash flow for the time of year is typical; no fund raising events scheduled around this time creating a lack in general funds. It was suggested that a simple event be scheduled, end of June-early July, to relieve financial stress. Suggestions made: flea market, free-box talent show, Bolinas Cultural Event, or a bake-off cake walk in the downtown park. It was also noted that membership is down compared to this time last year. It is expected that Labor Day will bring renewal numbers and new memberships up.

Manager's Report: StuArt will be touching up the building's signs and murals for re installation to their proper homes on the sides of the Community Center. Talk was had about new squares created for the heart on the back of the building. Julie Augustyn will not be available this year for Labor Day BBQ, she has offered her assistance with notes and information gathered from previous years' experience. A committee will be formed to take Julie's place and to share the duties involved, volunteers were Eleanor, Susan and Don. Don offered to do the over the hill shopping. Lia will check with the Blue Heron to make sure we can use the walk in fridge there again. Susie will pick up the chicken that Don Smith will prep and cook. Lia made the suggestion that permanent signs were made this year for various areas so that they can be re-used from year to year. Last year's Labor Day



logo will be used this year with the updated information. June will be in charge of desserts. StuArt will MC. StuArt and Magi will form the music committee. We will again have two stages and Magi and Zoro will be working with the sound equipment. Steve Hodges will set up the stage. Jan will be in charge of beer retrieval and the Green Team. Labor Day t-shirts with the dancing dogs from the 80's were suggested with Buzz to provide the silk screen. (Also, to hire him to make a silk screen of the Food Festival logo for aprons and bags for that event.)

This will hopefully balance the cost of the shuttle, driver and gas. Permits and road closures have been worked out. There is a painting party scheduled for September 28<sup>th</sup> to complete any touch-ups on the building and to paint the storage shed. Inquires will be made with Pine Tree to replace the drains. The sprayer is coming for the new sinks. Black Water Gold will be playing at the Food Festival.

Don Smith is working on finding a CD player system that will be mounted to the wall, allowing for a permanent, protected location.

Recommendations for a light board were inquired about, that would accommodate both old light packs and new.

New mirrors are going to be brought in for the dance classes.

Development Director's Report: Village and Beach donation request is already doing very well having brought in \$2500.00. The County has given a donation for the care of the restrooms of \$1500.00. Randi has been filling out information to apply for donation cards from Home Depot. Home Depot donates gift cards which would be helpful with the purchase of paint and lumber for the storage shed and possible kitchen door. She is also looking into grants from the ADA to upgrade the bathrooms.

#### Other topics of importance:

Uncle Sam made a stellar appearance in the Fourth of July Parade, raising \$128.00 in photo opportunities from the throngs of visitors. The suggestion to sell beer next year was made, but decided against since the local authorities have already told the Lion's Club that it was not a good idea. A motion was made to be the fiscal sponsor for the Patrice Daley theater group. Susie made the motion to approve, Eleanor seconded and all were for.

A motion was made to borrow money from kitchen account to purchase safe chair rack, rack is on sale at this time and it will save a fair amount of money to buy it now and then replace the money back to the kitchen account. Susan made the motion to make the loan, Eleanor seconded and all in favor. In the future all requests to borrow funds over \$500.00 will be made in writing, before brought to a vote.
