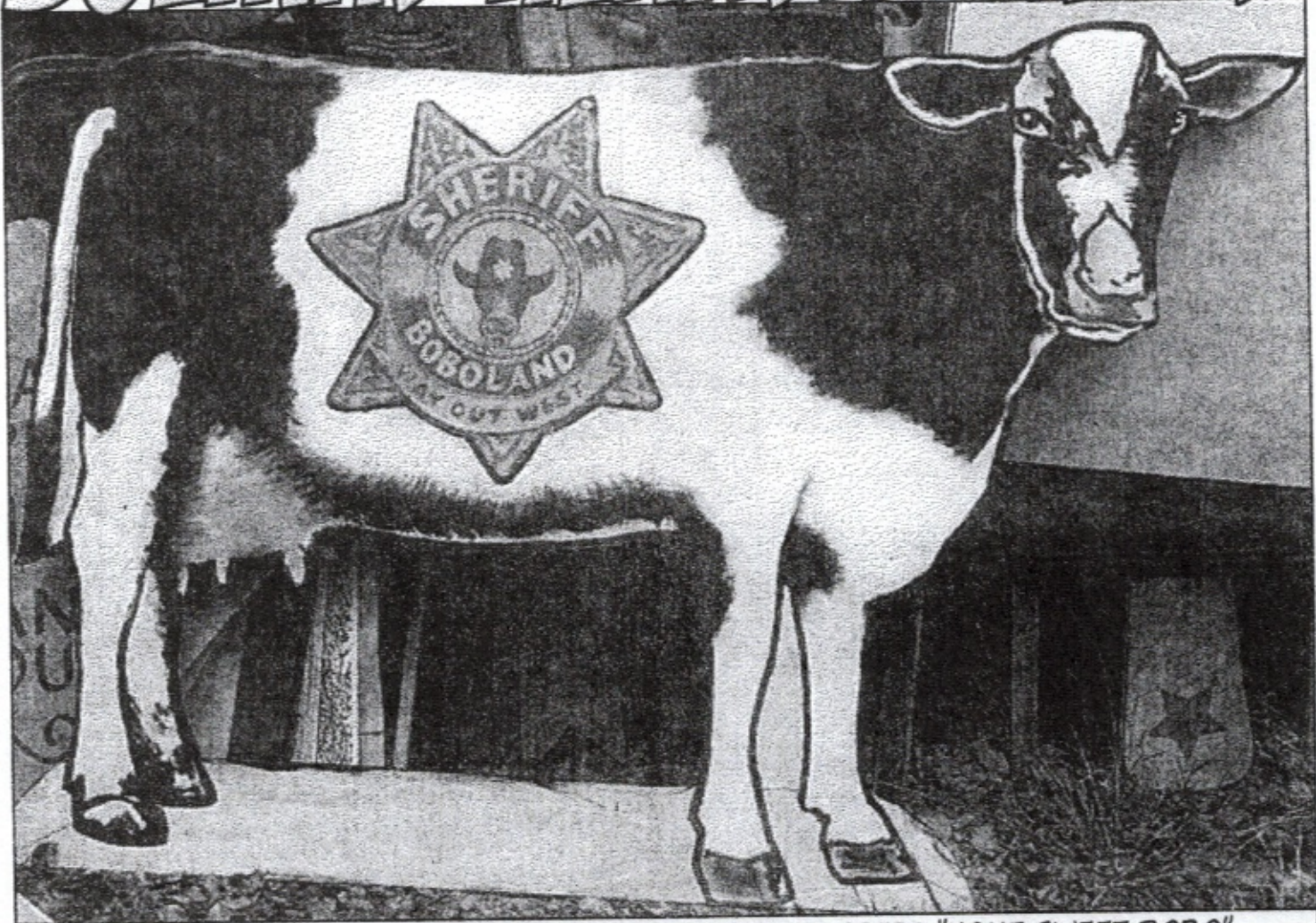

The School Site Council is enormously proud to present our new after school program for our 5th-8th grade students, Bolinas Stinson Young Stewards of the Land. This program grew out of a desire to give our older students exciting, rich, outdoor experiences of learning, opportunities for mentorship from local specialists and college students, and a place to be seen growing into engaged and valued members of our community.

The program will meet on Fridays from 3-6, beginning this Friday, August 31st, and will be led by Melinda Stone, Professor at USF and community strengthener extraordinaire! Each week, the students will have different experiences led by our local experts ranging from storytelling with Sky Road Webb to making herbal first aid kits with Eden Clearbook to neighborhood apple harvesting and processing to invasive plant identification and clearing and much, much more. The fall session will end with an overnight sleep out at Commonweal Garden featuring primitive skills mistress, Tamara Wilder, teaching fire-making, bow and arrow making, and other paleo games.

In addition, Melinda Stone's USF students will be present for each week's session, giving our students personalized attention and mentorship as they learn alongside them and help hold the structure.



Report on the 54<sup>th</sup> Annual Fishing Derby,

August 28, 2018

What a great weekend had by all at the 54<sup>th</sup> Annual BRBC fishing derby. We had a total of 103 participants of all ages. The conditions were a little different from last year. The anglers had to deal with a nice southwesterly swell hitting the sandbar both Saturday and Sunday but once outside the conditions were better. All the captains did great job getting the crews through the surf and fishing.

We did have a couple of incidents over the weekend to get the excitement going.

Friday we had one loose boat floating in the channel off its mooring but with the help of Eric Swanson and Jim Danse it was safely tied to an open buoy.

Saturday President Bob MacDonald had engine trouble while out with his grandchildren but with the help of Jeremy Dierks, Bob Heffelfinger and Rupert Dixon the kids were moved to Rupert's boat and Captain Bob towed him into to the channel.

The total fish count was 109 salmon, one lingcod and two rock cod. There were seven categories and 22 awards were given out. We also distributed 18 great fish awards to children under 8 years old. First place finishers each selected a salmon rod and reel valued at 350.00 dollars and second and third place winners were given a rod and reel valued at 225.00 dollars.

The director's award this year was awarded to the Bob Heffelfinger, Eric Swanson, Rupert Dixon and Jeremy Dierks for their efforts of saving the loose boat in the Channel and helping president Bob get his boat back in through the channel and to his mooring.

As always, the derby finished up with a great crowd on the deck enjoying the barbecue provided by Anna Gades, Richard Pedemonte and crew, and the bartender services of Michael Fitzpatrick and Phil Binley.

I would also like to thank all the volunteers for all their hard work during the derby for doing registration, food prep and clean up. ## Sugar Mountain

Tom Clark and I edited the one-shot magazine Sugar Mountain in the spring of 1970. We were both living in Bolinas, California, a small coastal village an hour north of San Francisco. Joanne Kyger and John Thorpe were there when I arrived from New York in October 1969; Bill Berkson, Jim Carroll, and Lewis MacAdams were soon to appear. Charlie Vermont, Clark Coolidge, Scott Cohen, and Harris Schiff were living in San Francisco and Berkeley and were frequent visitors; Anne Waldman, Joe Brainard, Alice Notley, and Ted Berrigan came for short periods. Suddenly there was a poetry community (by 1971, Robert Creeley, Bobbie Louise Hawkins, Aram Saroyan, David Meltzer, Ebbe Borregaard, Philip Whalen, and Donald Allen were all semi-permanent residents) and Sugar Mountain reflects the beginning of it all.

It was a kind of miracle for so many poets of different stripes (Black Mountain, Beat Generation, New York School, San Francisco Renaissance) to interact and collaborate on a daily level, dissolving the borders between life and poetry, and much of it had to do with the magic of Bolinas, situated on a fragile cliff overlooking the Pacific with the lights of San Francisco blinking in the distance. The beautiful cover photo of the young Alice Notley evokes the feeling of freedom in the air. The title came from a song by Neil Young, with the enigmatic refrain, "You can't be twenty on Sugar Mountain." Bolinas was a place you never wanted to leave, but by the end of the 1970s many of the poets had moved away; On the Mesa, an anthology of Bolinas poets, published by City Lights, appeared in 1971, another glimpse of this short-lived but very lively and intoxicating world.
