Far West Fest Round Up

Love Field was once again the site of the 8th annual Far West Fest. The weather was similar to last year - overcast in the morning, clearing to sun during the day and in the late afternoon fog rolling back in over the Inverness ridge.

Sofi Rox invited me to open the festival by singing some of my Bolinas songs on the acoustic stage. As soon as I began to sing a funk band started a sound check on one of the main stages. As I tried to voice a tender ballad a trombone or saxophone would blare from across the field. I found the distraction to be jarring at first, but then I saw the humor in the cacophony.

After all Love Field is a baseball field and to chatter (verbally taunt or distract the opposing batter) is part of baseball. Fans and players alike participate in chatter. "Heybattabattabatta" is an example. The blat of a trombone might be appropriate chatter for a music festival.

The fortune wheel was near the kid's zone. Albert was set up beside me with his feathered medicine wands on a ground cloth. He looked like a native shaman wearing his hand sewn goatskin shirt bedecked with feathers and beads. Across the field we watched a dust devil, a mini tornado, sweep through the vendors' row and blow pop-up tents twenty feet into the air.

"This is Miwok ceremonial ground," Albert commented. I felt safe and secure with medicine wands nearby.

Meanwhile I was busy with the fortune wheel. Even though I've simplified the process, running the fortune wheel still requires a lot of psychic energy. A number of people returned from previous years to tell me how much their fortunes had meant to them.

Over the years I've tried to eliminate any negativity from the fortunes. But sometimes totally cryptic answers appear. For instance, when Dylan Squires spun he got "Dissolve the King."

"Yes sir!" I answered, and I grabbed Coyote Peace Puppet and headed over to dance to the music.


Silver Quest

The whole story started April 2002 when Silver spoke in the name of Bolinas residents who were losing their properties, allegedly due to false delinquency. In retaliation for speaking truth to power, for questioning their authority the county officials violated Constitutional/Civil rights including ethnic discrimination, speech association. Within days, Silver's property in Bolinas was fraudulently deemed delinquent and 33 of other violations of Federal and State Laws including perjury extortion, fraud, assault, battery, threats to life ensued and continue until now. The Marin County Board of Supervisors and Supervisors individually were informed about the violations since July 2007, last time, May 8, 2013, they took no constructive action, did not help but abated and accompliced the violators: Former Tax Collector/Treasurer, Public Administrator, Registrar of Voters, County Clerk, Michael J. Smith, His successor, Roy Given, Liz Clark, and other 12 Civil Servants from the Civic Center. Lawyers Silver has talked to have advised him to make it a Class Action suit.



Ah, summer in Bolinas. If the fog licking your ears has you dreaming of more salubrious climes, may I recommend a light tome of desert travel to warm the soul?

California Desert Trails (1919) written by the late J. Smeaton Chase (born in London, 1864-passed in Banning, CA, 1923) is an almost lyrical and wholly engaging travel guide to the flora, fauna, geology and history of the Colorado desert of Southern California, before the era of freeway and air conditioning.


Part desert primer, part adventure tale, we join Smeaton and his trusty steed Kaweah on a series of treks over old desert trails, sometimes solo, sometimes in the company of others. There are, at pleasing intervals, narrow escapes from flash floods and dehydration, spectacular sunrises, alkaline waterholes, abundant agriculture, hermits, hidden canyons and badlands, mining speculators, overbearing heat, beautiful oasis surrounded by palms, cemeteries – all bracketed by random philosophizing largely in tune with modern sensibilities.


Never pedantic (as are most of the other travel guides of the era), he writes with verve and yet still informs. For example, our local artists will appreciate his keen eye for color -- his concise descriptions and explanations of the desert palette and geologic forms are most instructive, yet he does not belabor the topic in ways that a casual reader would find tiresome. His work is also refreshingly non-patronizing – he is generous with admiration and affection for the native tribes, families, and wanderers of the region, again, in contrast with many of his contemporaries. Finally, the author's self-deprecating jocularity serves to 'keep things moving' in a way that only a native of Britain lost in the desert could possibly hope to achieve.

I am confident this work will earn a treasured place in your library, if for no other reason than the endearing impression the author quietly conveys of himself throughout the book. For – truly – who among us can withhold affection for one proudly bearing the name 'Smeaton?'



I'm excited about the possibilities.


