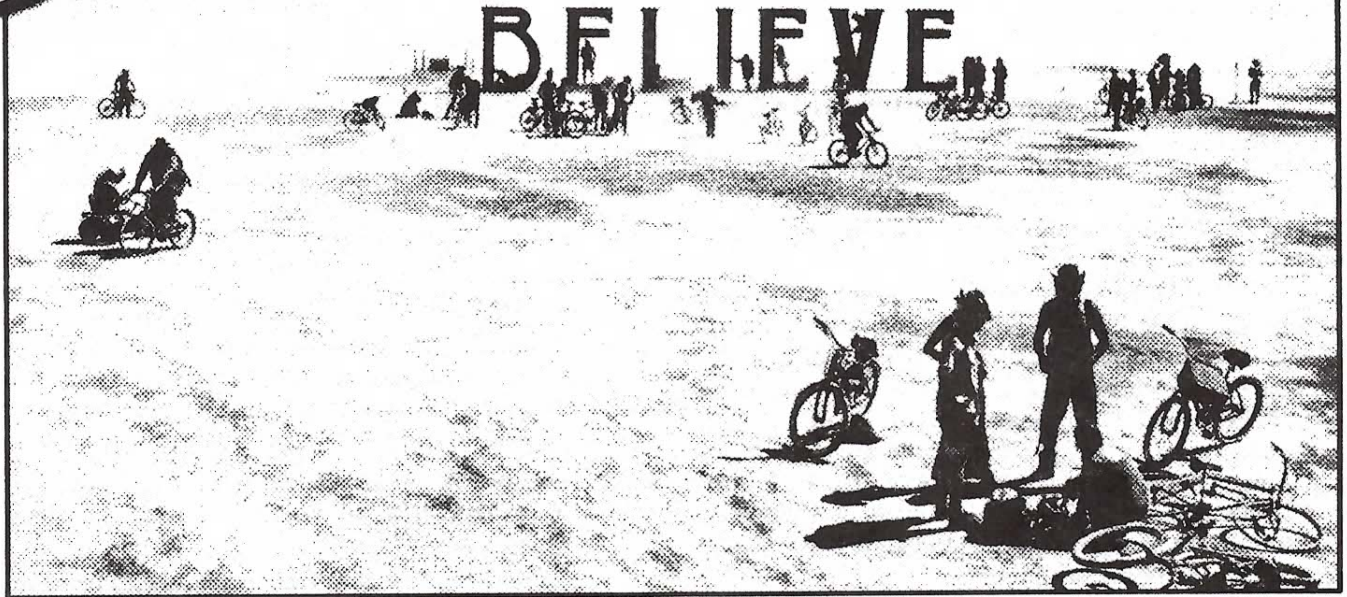

Report from Burning Man

Wow! Burning Man! How to describe it:

- Super hippie carnival freak show light show
- World's biggest beach party on the "Playa" (Spanish for "beach") the huge white alkali salt flat of Black Rock Desert, Nevada.
- A vast empty canvas where 68,000 creative souls create a community of inventiveness and play
- A theater of the absurd where everyone is allowed to express their inner child, be that artist, fool, slut, shaman, sparkle pony, techno-genius, pyromaniac steam punk gear head gender blender or whatever.
- A psychedelic, hallucinogenic experience, produced without the use of drugs
- A chaotic symphonic movement of bikes, bikes, bikes and outlandish art cars, constantly in motion hither and yon
- A Bacchanalian rite, a Dionysian celebration
- A sand box for adults, a petri dish for neo-humans
- "Describing Burning Man is like trying to tell someone about sex or acid who has never done it." said our hostess, Tiffany, a sweet red-haired Tarot reader from Portland. Our camp, "Burning Tarot" was near Center Camp, the hub of Black Rock City, the official name of the instant city of Burning Man (population 68,000)

Also sharing our camp was Cary, a Yoga teacher from Portland, and Steve, an official photographer for Burning Man. Tiffany and Steve had collaborated for a number of years on a Tarot photo project, where they invited Burning Man participants to pose for the major and minor arcana of the Tarot Deck.

Bill Braasch and I set up the Fortune Wheel facing one of the two streets that ran by the Tarot camp. For two or three hours a day we would invite people passing by to spin their fortune. Bill would handle calibrating the wheel, setting the astrological sign and day for each person. I became the "cosmologist" interpreting the fortunes.

It was fun to give people instant psychic readings based on where the wheel stopped and their fortunes. Most had come to Burning Man seeking some kind of meaning and rejuvenation. I would riff on their fortunes until their eyes widened and they "understood" how they could take their fortune and their Burning Man experience back to their lives in the "real world"

Report from Burning Man continued

It was richly rewarding and I felt like I was channeling the true essence of Burning Man. I always wore my Burning Man outfit - a Hunab Ku tunic and a big white pyramid on my head. Pyramid energy is known for sharpening razor blades. Likewise I felt like my insights were sharpened. Plus the white pyramid was a great insulator against the fierce desert sun.

Across the street from the Tarot camp was the Champagne Lounge, where they served free champagne from noon until two. A guy with a megaphone would stand on the roof of the Champagne Lounge and invite people to come drink champagne. "Come in and get some ice-cold champagne." he's call out through the megaphone. "It's noon and time to get drunk."

Bill and I became regulars at the Lounge. We never drank enough to get drunk, but it was great fun to party and talk with people from all over the world. A DJ would start playing music and soon we would all be dancing. I took my sketch pad to the Lounge and made sketches of the crowd to entertain myself. They commissioned me to do a drawing of the Lounge from across the street. I did so. It wasn't a great drawing but they really liked it and promised to bring a big bottle of champagne to the Gushing Woman celebration on Saturday.

Six years ago I started Gushing Woman in Bolinas as an alternative to Burning Man. This year I decided to celebrate Gushing Woman at Burning Man. On Saturday we performed the complete ceremony in front of the big blue statue of Gushing Woman, with the Bliss Mister, the Easter Island tissue dispenser (surrendering to the bliss) and the sacrifice of the watermelon of abundance. Kathy brought over a bottle of champagne from the Champagne Lounge and we ceremoniously popped the cork and toasted Gushing Woman, the Divine Feminine and the beautiful, sparkling consciousness of water. I strummed my guitar and we all sang "The Best One Yet"

And you know what? It was the Best One Yet.
Burning Man and Gushing Woman together at last.

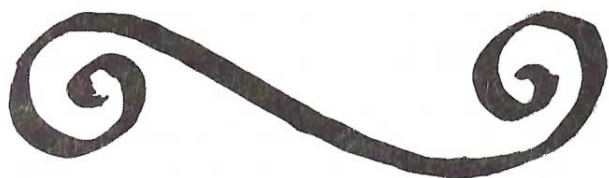

Please, reduce or eliminate your outdoor watering -- turn off automatic irrigation systems and hand water only as needed, preferably late in the day or early evening to reduce water loss due to evaporation. Make every effort to use your household appliances such as laundry machines and dishwashers only when you have full loads. Limit the length of showers to a few minutes. Check your toilets and faucets to make sure you do not have any leaks.

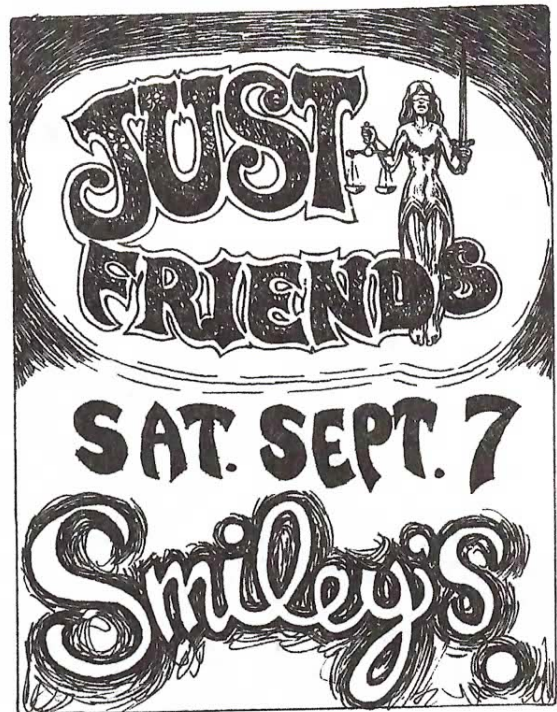

BOOK REVIEW *Ten Years on the Hippie Trail* by Ananda Brady

The hippie movement ultimately became tarnished by hard drugs and STDs; but at its best, it championed more equitable societies and more fulfilling spiritual paths. Young Brady, restless in his native Kansas, was a fun-loving but serious seeker who traveled the world to find purpose and meaning in life, enduring brutal conditions, narrowly escaping death many times, and usually not sure what was going to happen next. He not only survived each of the ensuing outrageous or hair-raising adventures, but he learned and grew from each — in understanding about psychology, society, and spirituality. Recounting a low point, he reflects that “Buoyant spirits are the only things that separate the journeyer from the derelict, the spirit from the ghost”, and then he presses on. This positive attitude, along with an engaging personality, generous heart, and respect for everyone he encountered, opened doors for him worldwide that many travelers would never even know of, let alone step through. The result is a delightful and insightful book full of quirky characters, spectacular romps, and powerful lessons — a rare and rewarding mélange of fun and wisdom in one richly detailed and expertly crafted volume that you will have trouble putting down and will emerge from with much food for thought and valuable teaching.

Stinson Beach and Bolinas Community Cleanup Sept. 9th-Sept. 13th



Stinson Beach and Bolinas residential garbage customers may place cleanup materials from their homes at the curb for collection. You must follow all listed requirements to ensure collection. Items must be at the curb the night before your regularly scheduled collection day.

Who May Participate:

- Residential Customers
- Multi-Family Complexes:
 - Complexes with central collection bins must request cleanup week collection service. Call 800-243-0291 no later than September 6th, 2013.
- Businesses may not participate.

Requirements:

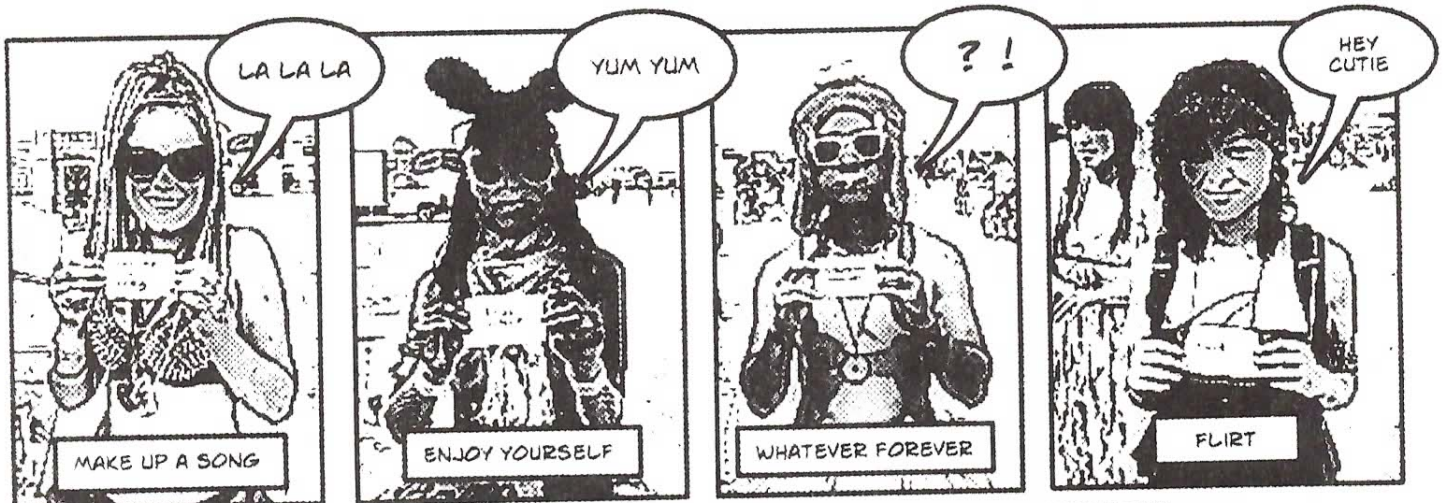
All requirements must be adhered to during cleanups:

- **Excess materials will not be removed.**
 - A maximum of 14 bags, boxes or cans may be placed at the curb.
- **Loose items will not be collected.**
 - Loose items will not be collected. All material must be contained.
- **Oversized, heavy or prohibited items will not be removed.**
 - No rock, dirt, bricks, concrete, tires, wood or asphalt.
 - Items must be less than three feet in any dimension and must weigh less than 60 lbs.
- **Hazardous waste will not be collected.**
 - No hazardous waste will be collected curbside: no propane tanks, televisions and computer monitors or "e-waste". Visit www.unicycler.com or call 800-243-0291 for e-waste collection and hazardous waste information.

Special Handling:

- **Appliances & Bulky Metal Items**
 - Call Redwood Empire Disposal at 800-243-0291 by September 6, 2013 for collection of large metal items and appliances, such as washers, stoves, microwaves, water heaters and refrigerators. A \$30 fee is charged for collection of any refrigeration unit.
- **Recyclable Items**
 - Keep all recyclable items separate from cleanup debris. Recycle in your blue cart or at a recycling center. Consider donating usable goods to a thrift store or other reuse program.

Bolinas-Stinson Union School District: A New Look for the Front Yard

District residents passing the school office building on the Bolinas campus may have noticed a rather dramatic change; there is very little of the original vegetation left. After years of struggling with gophers, moles, diseased plants and the ever-problematic issue of watering, we have decided that it is time to re-landscape the entrance to our school. While the beloved "Granny Bourne Garden" (especially the roses) is largely gone, it will be replaced with a newly designed native plant garden that is representative of our local flora. Installation of the new garden will include participation from our students, staff, parents and community members. In addition to making the entrance to the school more attractive, this project will provide us with a new teaching tool and a model for our school and community. The District has saved some of the old rose bushes and other plants that have graced the garden for the past years. It is our hope to finish this project before the rains begin in late fall and early winter.

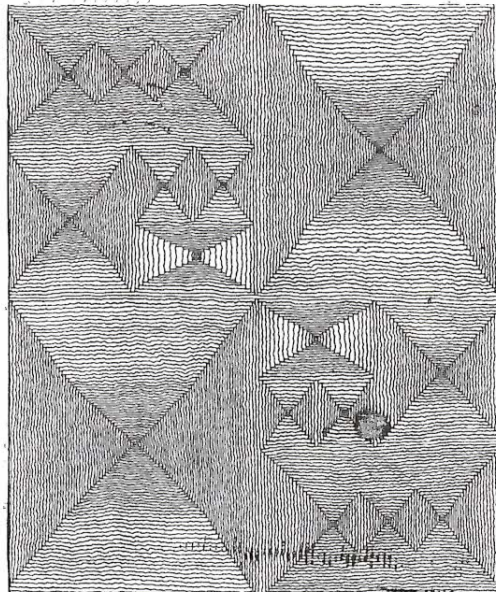
