Jan's Birthday

Wow! It was wonderfully inspiring to help Jan Broek celebrate his 70th birthday at the Community Center on Saturday night.

I love it that Jan chose to rock out with his friends at the Community Center to celebrate his 70th birthday. It was epic to see Jan standing on stage in front of his band with his long gray hair hanging past his shoulders. It was like watching a combination of Neil Young and Willie Nelson.

Jan's band was remarkable. His wife Mesa sang back-up vocals. Mesa's first husband played lead guitar. Jan's son Jericho played bass and Will Kahn played rhythm guitar. Marcos played some tasty drums and Zeno adding embellishments on the steel drum.

It was a family affair on stage. Jan even had his baby granddaughter up there with him. The band really rocked and got everybody dancing.

All of the songs Jan sang were originals including "Pirates of the Sun" and "Revolution of Love." I've heard Jan sing the songs before, accompanying himself on acoustic guitar. But with a full rocking band the songs had a magnificent, stadium quality.

Jan looked like he was in creative ecstasy for the entire night. The man might be 70 years old, but up there on stage singing his heart out he looked ageless, timeless. His delight in delighting his friends made me feel delightful.

Thank you Jan, keep on rocking!

At Jan's 70th birthday party I presented him with a certicificate granting him full permission to "plunge into the Dharmakaya and experience full Tatva." Those were the words Jan gave me 10 years ago to calligraph a certificate for his 60th birthday. I thought it appropriate to renew permission.

Dharmakaya and tatva are fascinating words. Here are the definitions:

Dharmakaya

- 1. The dharmakaya (fa-shen) is the experience of the transcendence of form of the five senses and realization of true thus need
- 2. the Buddha body in its self-nature, which is the same as the dharma body;
- 3. The Dharma body (fa-shen) is considered to be the eternal indestructible true principle, the Buddha's original body.
- 4. The Experience is timeless, permanent, devoid of characteristics and free from duality. It is the spiritual body of the buddhas, their true nature, which all buddhas have in common. Various names are applied to the Dharmakaya depending on whether it is being taken as the true nature of being (dharmata, dharmadhatu, tathata, bhutatathata, shunyata, alaya-vijnana) or as the true nature of the buddhas (buddhata, buddha-nature, tathagatagarbha).

The word Tatva is comprised of two words, Tat (meaning that) and Tvam (meaning thou). Tatva basicially means thatness, that is, the real being of anything. It is generally translated as meaning quality. Further, Tat represents the Godhead and Tvam the individual, giving a meaning (which fits in well with Hermetic Philosophy) of "That (which is the Universe) art thou." This is similar to the Hermetic axiom of "As above, so below", and is directly related to the concepts of the Macrocosm (Tat, Godhead) and Microcosm (Tvam, individual).



Peter Lee Obituary

Arthur Carroll Brownlie, also known as "Peter Lee" passed away quietly in his sleep on December 1st 2011 at his home in Point Reyes, California. Born Arthur Carroll Brownlie Jr. on December 24,1919 in San Francisco; Peter was the middle child of Genevieve Keys and Arthur Carroll Brownlie and brother to Gordon Brownlie and Laura Montijo.

Peter was proud to be a fourth generation Californian and his family was an integral part of Bay area history. Peter's Great Grandfather, Thomas Brownlie, was born in 1816 in Bonkle, Scotland and came to America in 1842. He settled in Arkansas and served under the command of Colonel Yall in the Mexican American War and was present at the engagement of Buena Vista. After resigning from service Thomas Brownlie went to California and was among the one of the first families to settle in Vallejo. His Grandfather, Alexander Brownlie, was the first child of European descent to live in Vallejo. He was a civil engineer with the US Naval Yard for 13 years on Mare Island and worked as a lighthouse inspector on the Pacific Coast for the US Government. Peter's maternal Grandfather, James Keys, was the Sheriff of Solano County in the early 1900's. Peter often talked of his wonderful memories of riding horses on his Grandfather's ranch in Hollister, California.

Peter became a prolific painter and his interest began at Pacific Heights Grammar School in San Francisco, Ca. Peter said he watched the Golden Gate Bridge being built from his Spanish class window and loved to say: "I don't know how to speak Spanish, but I know how to build a bridge."

Peter joined the Merchant Marines in 1937 and served until the end of World War II. During that time he learned the art of Sumi painting in the Orient and continued to work on his art. After working on the ships for over 15 years and traveling around the world, Peter moved to New York City to further pursue his passion for painting and the arts. His best friends were Frank and Trudy Fuetch, who he knew for over 65 years. They all lived together in New York City in the early 50's where Peter remained for over 35 years. He married Babs Lemon and they had twin daughters, Liz and Brey. Peter became a very successful furniture designer and manufacturer, with a factory in Harlem and a showroom in Manhattan. He worked with top interior designers and with celebrity clients, such as Ginger Rogers, Liza Minnelli and John Lemon.

In 1987, Peter went back home to San Francisco, and to his first love, painting. He became known as the "cake decorator" because of his massive layering technique, creating rich textures, his paintings are of urban and rural downtowns and famous landmarks all across America. His whimsical and colorful scenes of San Francisco captures the vibrancy and energy of the city.

In 1996, Peter moved to Bolinas, California where he continued to paint the surrounding towns of Marin County. In 2011, Peter's collected works and the West Marin culture were chronicled in a documentary film by Wendy Elkin, titled "Painting Bolinas."

One cannot ignore the essence of the unique and genuine relationships Peter, an extraordinary fine art painter, had with everyone in town and beyond. Peter can't easily be summed up, but he was a Merchant Marine, Inventor, Designer, Painter, Cowboy. Entertainer, Husband, Father, Grandfather, Friend, but most of all, he was bigger than life. He lived by the motto "Enjoy yourself, it's later than you think" and loved to sing Broadway show tunes. More colorful than his paintings, Peter truly lived his life to the fullest and his paintings will live on for generations to come. He will be deeply missed by his daughters, Liz Prael & Brey Brownlie, his grandchildren, Katie and Luke, his amazing friends, Trudy Feutsch, Wayne & Wendy Elkin, and countless more. Beginning to End

Ron Garrigues is having an exhibition at his gallery, Varnish Fine Art, in San Francisco, from February 25 through March 31.

The show at Varnish is a retrospective of his environmental works from the last quarter century. The title is "From Beginning to End" and consists of 99 pieces in 3 different media which follow a time line of sorts:

 33 clayboard drawings of the Big Bang (representing the beginning)

 33 sumi-e brush paintings on Chinese silk, (the tipping point, as the next billion people are added to the planet by 2025 AD)

• 33 bronze castings of skulls (the end, the 6th major extinction in the 13.6 billion years since the Big Bang.)

"We live in interesting times." Ron remarks. "Draw your own conclusions."

Ron started sculpting in 1960 at the age of 30. He had a show at the California Palace of Legion of Honor within one year, an auspicious start for an unambitious person. The show at Varnish coincides with the 50th anniversary of his solo show at the Legion of Honor.

Ron is a 100% autodidact, having never had an formal art training. Instead he sought out mentors to learn from: Richard Whalen for wood sculpture, Peter Voulkos for bronze casting and Arthur Okamura for charcoal drawing, clayboard and monotype. Ron is now working on sacred objects, "A necessity for all."
