A BETTER WAY TO BE HUMAN?

Pioneering author/business guru Paul Hawken spoke to a big gathering at *Commonweal* on Sunday afternoon; he was compelling and challenging and the full recording of his talk will soon be available on *Commonweal's* New School site; www.commonweal.org/new-school.

Until then, here are a couple quotes - scribbled in a notebook, so don't hold me to verbatim translation - your results may vary:

"Bolinas is of course an extraordinary place. With the people who live here, I think that if you got cut off from the rest of the world, you'd do quite well. I'm not sure about the rest of us, though."

"There should perhaps be some sort of disclaimer for presidential candidates, like there are for many medications. So I drafted one: Warning: Do not vote for this candidate if you are old or might get old; or if you are concerned about climate change, acidification of the oceans, or if English is your second language. Voting for this candidate may cause ecological collapse, economic meltdown, and loss of basic human rights. Voting for this candidate may result in headaches or nausea."

"People have asked 'Are we perhaps going back into another dark age?' And I reply, Don't worry too much about that - this is it, already. We're in it, now. We couldn't have a time of greater ignorance. In previous such times, great teachers were not intending to start new religions or philosophies, but social movements. They were thinking, There's just got to be a better way to be a human being."

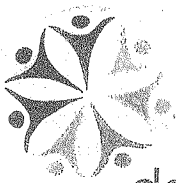

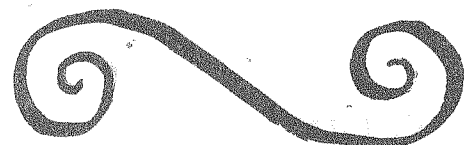

Search for "Raul Midón" on YouTube, and you'll find a clip of the New York-based vocalist, guitarist, and songwriter appearing on "The Late Show with David Letterman" in 2006. Performing "State of Mind," the title track from his 2005 debut album, Midón unleashes a silky, soulful tenor and dazzling percussive guitar style—a syncopated flamenco- and jazz-infused approach in which bass, harmony, and melodic lines emanate from the fretboard in one slap-happy storm. If that weren't enough, Midón busts out his improvisational mouth horn technique, in which he creates a bebop "trumpet" solo entirely with his lips, earning himself a spontaneous burst of mid-song applause from the audience in the process. It's a virtuosic performance, and one that reveals what has made Midón such an exciting artist to watch over the past few years. 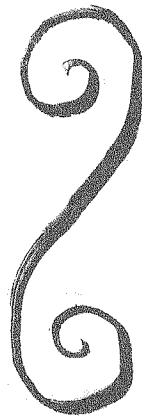
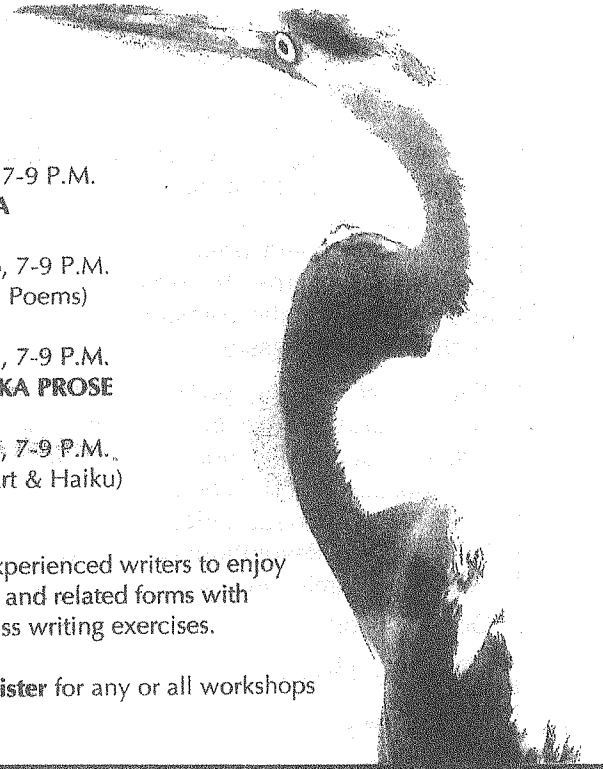
