


PRIMO SINGERS FEATURED IN "DEJA VU" MUSICAL SHOW



Let's Get the Park Finished

I am happy that the Park is moving forward on its next phase. This is too unique of an opportunity to let fighting and name calling distract the community from working together for the next generation.

It is my understanding that the Eucalyptus grove above the park is unstable because the trees have grown too tall. To do nothing would be asking for a judgment against the park and BCPUD in a future lawsuit.

Instead, the recommendation is to maintain the root structure of these trees by cutting them to a level where the stumps will still live, continuing to suck up water and also allowing light in encouraging newly planted and existing oak trees take over the hillside.

Having a local crew, like the Oakanders and the Downtown Park volunteers, is a huge benefit because they care about the outcome and our community. An out of town crew might just "get the job done" and not care about the particular concerns of the neighbors and the community.

It is good to remember why this acre is called Burnt Park. It was a commercial restaurant site that burned down, then neglected for decades. It is quite extraordinary the amount of work that has been done to make this site ready to become a common area that the Downtown lacks (at least at high tide) in my opinion.

Thank you Downtown Park volunteers, the Mesa Park Board and all of the contributors, including the very generous donation of the site.





The Bolinas-Stinson Beach Library Improvement Society (BSBLIS) has just announced the inauguration of a special grant program with a specific focus on the literary, educational, and literacy enhancement of the Bolinas-Stinson Beach communities. 





"I liked what he had to say," she said. "He reminded me of Glenn Beck, only furrier."


The Doberman's canine identity finally became clear when he lunged at a man in the front row and wrested a hamburger from his right hand, taking two of the man's fingers with it.



Bobolicious weds health to flavor

In Bolinas, a town long endeared for its love of chilled beverages, one woman with a blender is pioneering new ground. Through her new shop, Bobolicious Smoothie Lounge, which opened last October, local dietician Julie Augustyn is using frozen fruit and her extensive knowledge of food combining to create healthy, flavorful blended drinks in a trendy downtown environment.

Augustyn, a native of New Jersey who first moved to Bolinas years ago, describes her current venture as the perfect combination of art and science. "As a dietician, I promote food first," she said. And by the steady flow of customers on a recent weekday morning, so does her community.

"Wood Glue-It's a good one," said one young customer named Thor, who was wearing a backwards baseball hat. He had come to pick up a smoothie for his friend's mother, who was recovering from oral surgery.

Wood Glue, a curious and mouthwatering concoction of coconut water, pineapple, acacia fiber and maca root, is but one of the many refreshing and playfully titled smoothie varieties available nowhere other than at Bobolicious.

Augustyn said she got the idea for the business years ago, while in college, but doubted it would ever come to fruition. Early last year she noticed a "For Rent"


sign downtown, on a space that is owned and managed by the Bolinas Commu nity Land Trust. "As soon as I saw tha I thought, 'If I don't give it a go now, I'l never know." Augustyn pitched her idea to the trust, and the shop was approved for development.

With help from a local architect and cabinet maker, who each donated their services pro bono, Augustyn was able to get Bobolicious up and running in just over nine months. "In fact, it's been very much like having a baby," she said. "For the first few months we were busy just learning about the business and its quirks and trying to meet the community needs as they fit within the confines of health and safety regulations."

So far, despite the requisite obstacle of "learning the ebb and flow of weather and tourists in a small town," feedback has been abundantly positive.

"I don't necessarily look at it from a want-to-own-my-own-business perspective," said Augustyn, who had previously been commuting daily to San Francisco, where she worked at a hospital. "But more from an I-want-to-be-a-biggerpart-of-my-community perspective." - Jeremy Blackman

Bobolicious is open from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, and from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. all other days.




